Dubai's poor work condition draws fresh criticism

A deadly blaze in a tower under construction in Dubai this month renewed concerns about the safety of foreign workers amid a spate of allegations by rights groups over labour abuses.

Police put the death toll at two but hospital sources said four foreign labourers died and 57 were injured in a fire on January 18 which broke out in the top floors of the 34-storey Fortune Tower, one of scores of sprawling towers being built in the desert emirate.

Like hundreds of thousands of labourers who work in the United Arab Emirates, most of the workers on the site were Asian nationals, including Indians, Bangladeshis and Chinese.

Images of terrified workers hanging from the windows of the smoke-engulfed top floors of the building covered the front pages of local dailies with witness accounts of labourers falling from high floors.

"I saw at least two people jump.

Some of them (workers) were climbing out of the windows and sliding down the metal poles, and half-way down they would let go because it was burning their hands," Emirates Today quoted a foreman at the site as saying.

The incident led Hadi Ghaemi from New York-based Human Rights Watch (HRW) to question the safety measures taken on the construction site of the Fortune Tower.

"The safety record (for workers) in the United Arab Emirates is very much an issue of concern. This accident shows the need for (tight) measures to be implemented," Ghaemi said.

Most of the injured workers suffered smoke inhalation and burns and have since been discharged, except for a few who were still recovering in the government's Rashed Hospital.

Mohammad Abdullah, a 22-year-old Bangladeshi painter who was still recovering from smoke inhalation, recalled only seeing

smoke sweeping through the 25th floor where he was working, and lights going off, before he fell unconscious.

Coughing repeatedly, Mohammad, who spoke through a translating nurse, said he had never received any safety instructions before working in the tower.

Anger over labour practices and work conditions prompted 2,500 labourers to riot last March at the construction site of Burj Dubai, set to be the world's tallest skyscraper.

Some destroyed vehicles and equipment.

The riot prompted the New York-based Human Rights Watch (HRW) to call on the government to "end abusive labour practices" and describe labour conditions as "less than human".

Dubai ruler Sheikh Mohammad bin Rashed al-Maktoum, who is vice president of the UAE, last November ordered sweeping measures to protect foreign labourers.

But for HRW, the safety of

foreign workers -- who have been powering the UAE's construction frenzy -- is a matter of enforcing existing regulations.

The rights watchdog said that the government had promised in September to increase the number of inspectors to 1,000 within 18 months.

"They have always promised to increase the number" of inspectors, said Ghaemi.

The latest incident prompted the head of Dubai's Civil Defence department to urge contractors to train workers on safety measures.

"Labourers need to know how to use their equipment safely," Brigadier Rashed Thani al-Matroushi was quoted as saying in the local press.

"Labourers are poor people, not educated enough to know how to respond to these situations," he said, referring to the majority of low-wage labourers.

HRW's report said that most of the UAE's 500,000 migrant construction workers come from South Asian countries, while the total migrant worker population is 2,738,000, or 95 percent of the workforce.

But HRW fears that the larger issue is that many fatalities are not reported by employers as work incidents.

"Numbers of the dead people are shrouded in mystery," Ghaemi said, claiming that "companies are not reporting (incidents) as required by law," and that the government is not able to distinguish between on-site deaths and other cases.

The embassies of India, Pakistan and Bangladesh repatriated the bodies of 880 construction workers in 2004, the HRW report said, adding that the government can account for only a few of these deaths "primarily because it appears not to enforce its own laws requiring employers to report worksite deaths and injuries".
