




Did U Know?

'Irfan gets his rhythm back'

Indian cricket team's biomechanical expert Ian Fraser Monday expressed satisfaction over Irfan Pathan's current form, saying the left-handed paceman had found his natural rhythm back.

"Irfan seems to have got his bowling rhythm back. The break from international cricket and the fact that he has bowled close to 70 overs for Baroda in the Ranji Trophy seems to have stood him in good stead," he said.

Fraser assessed Pathan, who joined the squad as its 16th member for the fourth and final one-day against the West Indies, and, Munaf Patel, who is nursing an ankle injury, after their net session at the IPCL ground.

Pathan was recalled midway through the South African tour for his poor form and was asked to play domestic matches to regain his rhythm.

Fraser said "the best way to get back into form would be to go back and bowl in a natural manner which he did today.

"His run-up looked fluent and his action also was smooth. There was fluidity in his motion," he told reporters after the team's optional practice session attended only by skipper Rahul Dravid and opener

Tigers leave tomorrow

Bashar keen on Zimbabwe challenge

Bangladesh captain Habibul Bashar promised to make full use of the opportunity of international cricket against Zimbabwe during their four-match ODI series although there was an increasing debate about the necessity of the tour given the fact that it will mean that the players will miss a chunk of the competitive domestic season at home.

A 15-member Bangladesh team will leave Dhaka tomorrow morning for Zimbabwe to play four one-day internationals against their southern African opponents as part of the World Cup preparation. The matches are scheduled for February 4, 6, 9 and 10 at the Harare Sports Club ground.

"I want to put aside all the debate surrounding the tour and my main objective is to make full use of the opportunity we have been given ahead of the World Cup," said Bashar, who was very successful last year with 18 one-day wins out of 28 matches, yesterday.

Considering the current strength of the Zimbabwe team many thought that it would far better for the players to continue to participate in the ongoing Premier Division Cricket League but Bashar categorically said that it would be a big boost for his boys if they could beat Zimbabwe away from home.

"We won the last series against them by a 5-0 margin at home but I must say they are much better team

in their own conditions. I think it's a big challenge for us to erase the disappointing memories of our last tour," he pointed out referring to the heartbreaking 3-2 defeat they suffered in the last series in Harare in July-August last year.

Although the series has been considered as World Cup preparation, the 33-year old Bangladesh skipper didn't want to concentrate too much on the issue rather stress-

ing that his main objective is to ensure Bangladesh's current supremacy over their Southern African opponents.

"Many might have thought that anything other than victory in Zimbabwe means it would be a setback for us ahead of the World Cup but I consider the whole thing in different way. I think it's a mission for us to rectify the mistakes we made during the last trip. After a 5-0 victory at home I said that we have done only

half the job; mission will be accomplished if we can now beat them in their own den," he said.

Bangladesh named the squad last Thursday but the players have not yet been able to practice as they completed their league program only on Monday.

"We have a get together today (Monday). I think it's not a big issue not being able to practice together because all the players have plenty of match practice which is a big advantage for us," he informed.

Bashar was not fully satisfied with the national players performance in the league but he hopes that they will show their true character in the international arena.

"I think Sakib (Sakib Al Hasan) was exceptional, otherwise most of our batsmen have show a lack of consistency in the competition. But the good news is that some of our key batsmen have finally got some runs," he said adding that his personal target is to make a big score.

Bashar declared himself highly satisfied with the squad and the changes from the previous team, which brought back some old guards like seaming all-rounder Mohammad Sharif and paceman Tapash Baisya.

"It's really a good team because everybody can get a place in the playing eleven. I think performers dominated the squad this time. But I want to make one thing clear; I am not in favour of giving equal opportunity to all the selected players in the tour because I want to go in with my best side to win all the matches," he explained.

Run riot in women's cricket

A scintillating hundred by Ayesha Akhter guided Dhaka to a massive 278-run victory over Narayanganj in the First Women Cricket Championship at the Kalabagan Krira Chakra ground yesterday.

Ayesha smashed a 90-ball 114 that featured 14 fours and a six as Dhaka piled up 334-2 in their stipulated 30 overs. Dhaka then shot out Narayanganj for 56 runs in 11.3 overs to record their second win.

At the Nabin Sangha ground, Salma hit a hurricane hundred as Khulna outclassed Chittagong by 207 runs.

Salma smote 16 fours and four sixes during her 45-ball 104 as Khulna amassed 276-3 in 30 overs. In reply, Chittagong were bundled out for 69 in 23.3 overs. This was the third victory for Khulna.

At the Dhanmondi Women's Complex, Rangamati earned a comfortable 83-run victory over Bogra. Bogra were all out for 64 in 17.1 overs in reply to Rangamati's 147-6 in the stipulated 30 overs.

India to name WC squad on Feb 11 or 12

The Indian squad for the upcoming cricket World Cup in the Caribbean would be chosen on February 11 or 12.

"The selectors, who are to meet in Mumbai on February 3 to pick the team for the Sri Lanka series, will decide on the date and the venue, either Rajkot or Mumbai," secretary of the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) Niranjan Shah said Monday.

That means the selectors have three more matches, the last of the West Indies series here on Wednesday and two of the four-match Sri Lanka series, to assess the players before making up their mind on the final combination.

The first two ODIs against Sri Lanka are to be held at Kolkata (February 8) and Rajkot (February 11) and the final 15-member World Cup squad needs to be sent to the International Cricket Council on or before February 13.

The combination chosen for the first two ODIs against the Lankans, who would play the last two matches of the series in Goa (February 14) and Vishakhapatnam (February 17), would very much be the squad for the World Cup to be held in March-April.

Meanwhile, the BCCI was yet to prepare a final draft for the contracts to be issued to the players for their perusal. "We are still having discussions on the final draft," Shah said.

The BCCI had indicated earlier that the contracts, which are overdue, would be ready before the team departs for the World Cup. The team is slated to land in the Caribbeans on March 1.

Jayantha inspires Sonargaon

M o h a m m a d Ashraful did not get a chance to exercise his last opportunity to bat before flying out to Zimbabwe as Saman Jayantha's blazing hundred ensured Sonargaon Cricketers romped to an emphatic nine-wicket victory against Indira Road in the Kai-Altech Premier Division Cricket League at the Dhanmondi Cricket Stadium yesterday.

There were two more centuries on the day but the Sri Lankan right-hander's proved the only successful one as he put on an unbeaten 161 runs in a second wicket stand with opener Mehrab Hossain (71) as Sonargaon scored 196-1 in 35.2 overs in reply to Indira's 195-9 to follow the league leader Abahani with 12 points after the seventh round.

Away at the BKSP, Mahbubul Karim's valiant century went in vain as Victoria Sporting Club rode on Mahmudullah Riyad's brilliant all-round performance to record a comfortable 83-run victory against Kalabagan Krira Chakra to secure

their fifth win in seven outings.

Out-of-favour Rajin Saleh finally returned amongst runs with an unbeaten hundred but his effort was not good enough to salvage Partex Sporting Club from slipping to a two-wicket defeat against Pegasus in the clash of the promotes at the Fatullah Cricket Stadium.

SONARGAON-INDIRA

Ashiqur Rahman and Obaidul Haque equally shared six wickets as Indira Road managed to score 195-9 after deciding to bat first thanks to a 77-ball 51 by Sumon Barua.

New ball bowler Ashiqur tore apart the top order and completed his ten-over quota with 3-32 while Obaidul picked up three wickets for 24 runs in six overs.

Pacer Sajidul Islam gave Indira Road an early breakthrough removing Al-Shahriar (16) but only paved the way for Jayantha and Mehrab to put their bowling to the sword.

Jayantha, the veteran of 17 one-day internationals, smote seven fours and five sixes during his 98-ball 100 while Mehrab hammered nine boundaries in his 94-ball 71.

VICTORIA-KALABAGAN

Victoria thrived on two half centuries by inform opener Nasiruddin Faruque and Mahmudullah Riyad to put up a challenging total of 262-6 after being sent into bat first.

Faruque hit 61 off 94 balls with four hits to the fence while man-of-the-match Riyad clobbered eight boundaries and a six during his sparkling 56-ball 78 and Hasan-uzzaman chipped in with an unbeaten 41 off 38 balls with two sixes.

Mahbubul Karim stood tall in the chase of the challenging total but didn't get the support he required as Kalabagan were bundled out for 179 in 46.2 overs.

The number three batsman returned to the dressing room as last man out after scoring a 118-ball 108 that featured nine fours and three sixes.

PEGASUS-PARTEX

Pegasus registered their third victory despite Rajin Saleh's unbeaten 112 as they scored 244-8 in 49.4 overs in reply to Partex's 240-7.

Rajin smashed 12 fours and a six

Injury woe mounts for Eng

Crucial tri-series tie against NZ today

England is again set to be without three of its key players for the crunch triangular one-day series clash with New Zealand here on Tuesday.

Defeat will almost certainly end England's hopes of reaching the tri-series finals to cap a disastrous tour, and they look to be missing captain Michael Vaughan as well as opening bowlers James Anderson and Jon Lewis.

The trio were also absent when the English slumped to a nine-wicket loss to Australia on Friday in

Adelaide.

If the much-improved Kiwis beat England again on Tuesday, they will move five points ahead of England on the table with a win worth four points and both teams having two matches left.

That would leave England needing to win their last two games against Australia, an unfathomable prospect on recent form, and the Kiwis to make the finals.

Lewis and Anderson both missed Friday's loss and have been unable to shake off minor niggles.

Interim captain Andrew Flintoff ruled that pair out of Tuesday's game after training on Monday. Vaughan has been given extra time to prove his fitness but is unlikely to play.

Despite the high stakes, Flintoff said it was not the time to be risking key players.

"Anderson and Lewis won't be available," Flintoff said here on Monday.

"With the amount of cricket we've got coming up -- we've got this series and the World Cup -- it is a case of managing them well because we are going to need them further down the line."

Vaughan complained of a twinge in his hamstring at training on Sunday and Flintoff said he would be given until Tuesday morning before a final decision would be made, but added: "Vaughany is doubtful."

Bond, Franklin set for recall

New Zealand are set to recall fast bowlers Shane Bond and James Franklin for Tuesday's crucial tri-series one-day match against England.

The pair missed Sunday's clash with Australia at the WACA in Perth to conserve their energy for Tuesday, knowing another New Zealand victory will almost certainly end England's chance of making the playoffs.

New Zealand thrashed England by 90 runs in Adelaide last week to earn a valuable bonus point that could prove decisive in the battle to see which team joins Australia in the best-of-three final.

Although New Zealand lost to Australia on Sunday, their brave run-chase has them brimming with confidence ahead of the match with England.

The Kiwis looked to have no hope of winning when Australia piled on 343-5 on a scorching hot day at the WACA in Perth but got within eight runs after replying with 335-5.

"When you concede 343 you've got to steel up and be as positive as possible, and the innings just gained momentum," New Zealand skipper Stephen Fleming told reporters after the match.

"We've felt we're getting close for a while and we've had some good games."

Jacob Oram played the starring role, scoring an unbeaten century off 71 balls, the fastest hundred ever made by a New Zealander in a one-day international.
