

CG should hand over power to elected govt as soon as possible

Speakers tell discussion

Speakers at a discussion yesterday appreciated the role of the armed forces during the recent developments in the country and observed that the main duty of the new caretaker government should be to hand over power to an elected government as soon as possible.

They said the armed forces can play a vital role in safeguarding democracy and tackling any national disasters.

They also pointed out that the declaration of state of emergency was needed to tackle the social disaster the nation was facing before January 11.

Some speakers, however, suggested that the army should act as a pressure group and play its role for the national interest.

They also warned that prolonga-

tion of the present situation would prompt the political parties to unit-edly launch a movement against the caretaker government.

Bangladesh Institute of Law and International Affairs (Bilia) organised the discussion on 'Democracy and the role of army in consolidating democratic system' at Cirdap auditorium in the city.

Former military officials, former ambassadors, university teachers and civil society members attended the discussion moderated by Bilia Director Ambassador Waliur Rahman. Three former army chiefs - Maj Gen (retd) KM Shafullah, Lt Gen (retd) Harunur Rashid and Lt Gen (retd) Mahbubur Rahman -- were also present.

The speakers called for forming an independent national security council to safeguard the internal and external security.

Underscoring the need for a national defence policy, Maj Gen (retd) KM Shafullah said an initiative was taken to organise a broad-based discussion for formation of a national security council. Such a national council is necessary to protect the national interest, he added.

"I think the armed forces should play a dominant role in safeguarding democracy," said Lt Gen (retd) Mahbubur Rahman. He, however, observed that democracy should be restored as soon as possible.

The army has no role in ruling the country, but definitely it has a role in consolidating democracy, said Lt Gen (retd) Harunur Rashid.

He said the army can also play a vital role in implementing the election code of conduct. Candidates who would violate election rules should be handed over to law

enforcement agencies, he added. The former army chief also demanded an election free from the influence of money.

Supporting the role of army in consolidating democracy, Brig Gen (retd) Shahedul Anam Khan said general conception about the armed forces has changed a lot recently.

Earlier, it was not possible to discuss the army's role in democracy, he said, but the people have supported the army for its role in the recent developments in the country.

He also suggested using the armed forces and their expertise in consolidating democracy.

Ambassador Harunur Rashid opposed the army's formal role in democracy. The army can come forward only as a temporary measure in response to popular demand, he said.

Prof Kalimullah said the army can play a catalytic role in consolidating democracy and holding a credible election.

Prof Imtiaz Ahmed of Dhaka University said parliament remained inoperative for most of the time during the tenure of the previous elected government.

He suggested that the speaker of parliament should come from the opposition party in order to make parliament vibrant.

Former army officer AMSA Amin said there is no role for the army to play in the administration if democracy prevails. But if democracy does not exist, the army can play its role, he added.

The army stepped in because all the democratic institutions have been destroyed over the years, he observed.

He also pointed out that the democratic values do not exist among 80 percent of people who live in villages; they exist only in the urban society.

Ensure women's rights in light of Islam

Speakers say at workshop

Speakers at a workshop yesterday called on the religious leaders to preach proper teachings of Islam to help ensure equal rights of women in the society.

They also suggested incorporating madrasa education into mainstream to make students aware of the equal rights of women as provided in Islam.

The workshop titled 'Ensuring women's rights within Islamic framework' was organised by Bangladesh National Women Lawyers' Association (BNWLA) in collaboration with The Asia Foundation at the Brac Centre Inn in the city.

Presiding over the workshop Advocate Salma Ali, executive director of BNWLA, said around 80 to 85 percent of total cases, that her organisation usually deals with, are related to domestic violence.

She said although the Muslim Family Law Ordinance was amended in 1961, it is yet to be followed at grassroots level.

While delivering her speech on 'Divorce and rights of women', Advocate Fawzia Karim Firoze, immediate-past president of BNWLA, pointed out that although the Muslim Family Law Ordinance 1961 made some specific provisions, but it did not make them mandatory to help raise the voice of women in reconciliation process.

She also pointed out that the misinterpretation about women's rights occurs due to lack of proper teachings of the holy Qur'an.

She urged the religious leaders to propagate women's rights, especially the rights after their divorce and dower money in the light of Islam.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT Dismissal of JU teacher demanded

The students of Jahangirnagar University (JU) under the banner 'Jahangirnagar Against Harassment (JAH)' formed a human chain yesterday to press three-point demand including dismissal of the teacher suspended recently for alleged sexual harassment.

The human chain was formed in front of the administrative building at noon and lasted till 1:30pm where students of different faculties joined. Their other demands include formulation of policy against sexual harassment and establishment of allegation cell.

A protest procession was also taken out from university Prantik gate yesterday evening to drum up support to their demands.

The students have been agitating for the last two months soon after the allegation of sexual harassment filed by a first year female student of Bangla department against a teacher of the same department came to light.

The agitators will enforce fast unto death from February 5 if their demands are not met by then.

Road crashes kill 6

At least six people were killed and 25 others injured in separate road accidents in Sirajganj and Keraniganj yesterday and on Friday night.

Our correspondent from Sirajganj reports: At least four people were killed and 25 others injured in a road accident on Hatikumrul-Bonpara highway at Bashbaria Khalkula in Tarash upazila of Sirajganj yesterday.

Police and witnesses said the accident occurred at around 7:00am when a Natore-bound bus collided head on with a Nasimon (locally made auto-tempo), leaving two people dead on the spot and 27 others injured.

Of the injured, two more succumbed to their injuries at Sirajganj General Hospital.

The rest were rushed to several hospitals and clinics in Natore, Bonpara and Sirajganj.

The dead were identified as carpenter Russell, 18, son of Karim Sheikh, and Sohel, 22, son of Minnat Ali, of Kaliganj under Keraniganj Police Station.

Police said the accident took place when a truck hit a three-wheeler tempo at about 10:00pm, leaving tempo passengers Russell and his friend Sohel critically injured.

Later, they were rushed to Dhaka Medical Collage Hospital (DMCH) where they succumbed to their injuries.

Injured RU teacher files case with police

The law and justice department teacher of Rajshahi University (RU) Abdul Alim who received knife injuries near the campus on Thursday night, filed a case with Mother Police Station on Friday accusing unidentified assailants.

Police however failed to arrest anyone in this connection.

Alim in his complaint said on January 22 his departmental office received a letter in which he along with Chairman Rabul Islam and Juiquar Ahmed was warned that if they do not give first class marks to some students loyal to Islami Chhatra Shibir in masters examination, they (teacher) will have to face dire consequences.

Referring to the letter Alim said, "The terrorists made an abortive attempt to kill me."

Prof Rabul, accompanied by other teachers of the department, met with Vice-chancellor Altaf Hossain yesterday and sought impartial investigation of the attack.

He also requested the VC to ensure security of other teachers.

Prof Altaf assured them that university administration would take up the matter seriously.

Meanwhile, some pro-Jamaat teachers of the department are saying that Alim was a victim of snatching.

Talking to newsmen, Proctor Enamul Haque said police are still posted at the residence of Alim, a newly recruited lecturer, who was stabbed by unknown assailants on his way home at Binodpur from the Jubury Teacher's Club on the campus.

He is undergoing treatment at his residence.

Hawkers urge DCC to rebuild newsstand

Dhaka Sangbadpatra Hawkers' Bahumukhi Samabaya Samity Ltd, an association of newspaper hawkers, has urged the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) to rebuild the newsstand adjacent to Dhaka City College in Science Laboratory area.

The DCC and Rajdhani Unnayan Katripakkha (Rajuk) bulldozed the newsstand recently, although the newspaper hawker produced all the valid documents in favour of it, Samity President Md Mostafa Kamal said in a press release yesterday.

He said the Samity earlier filed a writ petition with the High Court after the city corporation had demolished a number of newsstands without issuing any notice. Following the writ petition, the court gave an order not to demolish any newsstands without issuance of notice, he added.

The Samity president said over 100 newsstands were built in Dhaka and its suburbs in 1984 and rented to hawkers who are paying the rent regularly.

He urged the mayor to take necessary steps to rebuild the newsstand adjacent to Dhaka City College.

AR Mallick's death anniversary today

Today is the 10th death anniversary of Dr AR Mallick, an eminent educationist and former finance minister, says a press release.

Dr Mallick was a professor of South Asian history at the University of Pennsylvania, USA and the founding vice-chancellor of Chittagong University where he mounted a resistance during the War of Liberation. He was the president of the Liberation Council of Intelligentsia in 1971.

The first education secretary of Bangladesh, Dr Mallick was also the first high commissioner to India. He was also the chairman of the Asian Development Bank.

His publications include 'British Policy and the Muslims in Bengal' and 'Amar Jibon Kotha O Bangladesher Mukti Sangram'.

On the occasion of his death anniversary, food will be distributed among orphans and underprivileged children in different areas of the city.

Make ACC active, ratify UN Convention against Corruption

Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) yesterday strongly reiterated its demand that the government make the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) active and ratify the UN Convention against Corruption immediately.

The call came from the annual meeting of the TIB members held at Brac Centre Inn at Mahakhal in the city.

The members also expressed deep concern over the pervasiveness of corruption in the country.

They, however, welcomed the initiative taken by the caretaker government to root out corruption. It is possible to contain corruption through making the ACC active, they said.

They also underscored the need to enact and enforce the right to information act in order to ensure free flow of information.

They also called for implementing legal reforms to eliminate the influence of black money on the election and strengthen the Election Commission.
