## 4-ODI ban on Afridi

Pakistan all-rounder Shahid Afridi will miss the first two matches of the World Cup in the West Indies next month after the ICC banned him for four one-day internationals for jabbing his bat at a spectator.

The 26-year-old had been charged by the International Cricket Council with "conduct unbecoming... which could bring (players or officials) or the game of cricket into disrepute."

Afridi jabbed his bat aggressively in the direction of a spectator after being dismissed in the first one-day international against South Africa at

Centurion on Sunday as he walked up the stairs.

Pakistan have two more one-day internationals left in South Africa before their World Cup campaign starts on March 13 against West Indies in Jamaica.

ICC match referee Chris Broad said in an ICC statement on Saturday: "I took into account what I considered to be the mitigating circumstances of a spectator in close proximity to the player shouting at him as he returned to the dressing room."

"I also spoke to the spectator in question ahead of the hearing to get his version of events."

"However, I found it impossible to escape the conclusion that Afridi's actions were a clear threat to that

spectator, and had that person not taken evasive action then the bat would almost certainly have hit him."

"Such an act is completely unacceptable and on that basis I found the player guilty of the Level 3 offence."

Broad also commented on the specific situation in which the incident arose.

"For the record, I do not believe spectators should be that close to the players or that they should feel they can shout whatever they like and think that is acceptable," he said. "That is a view I have expressed to Cricket South Africa."

Afridi has 24 hours to appeal and, should he do so, he would be able to play until any new decision was made.

## No extra pressure: Rahul

Rahul Dravid was perched a plastic chair on the outfield of the Madhavrao Scindia Cricket Ground in Rajkot when he addressed the media in the customary pre-match press conference ahead of the second one-day international against Sri Lanka. Surrounded by a gaggle of members of the television and print media jostling for space he put the forthcoming match in perspective.

Dravid was keen to underscore the fact that the selection of the squad for the World Cup would not be made simply on the basis of a few matches. "Ideally we would have liked the guys to have played as much as possible but I don't think the fact that they have not played as much as we would have liked will hamper World Cup selection," said Dravid. "We don't make judgments on people who have been playing for a long while on the basis of one game, one innings or one or two matches. Just from the point of view of finding out what is our best combination, it is a bit of an irritant. But I'd rather have a few injuries now than in the middle of the World Cup. We don't view it as any added pressure. We don't judge the World Cup squad just on the basis of this one performance."

Having said that Dravid also spoke about how he was happy with the manner in which the Indian squad was shaping up. "What I like about the squad we are getting together at the moment is that it gives us the flexibility to be able to play different kinds of combinations based on the conditions we are

concerned in the team. "We still are a little concerned about the boys in terms of their fitness. They have practised a little bit today

# Aftab delivers the goods

Aftab Ahmed fell eight runs short of what would have been a well-deserved maiden one-day hundred but the right-hander's brilliant knock guided Bangladesh to a nerve-wrecking one-wicket victory in the fourth and final match to ensure their first-ever series victory in Zimbabwe yesterday.

A record 135-run Bangladesh third wicket partnership between Aftab and young wicketkeeper Mashfiqur Rahim set the tone for an easy victory in the chase of Zimbabwe's 244-8 but a sudden collapse saw the Tigers lose six wickets in the span of 34 runs to complicate matters at the Harare Sports Club.

Abdur Razzak and Shahadat Hossain, however, kept cool to safely take their team to victory when the left-handed Razzak smashed Chamu Chibhaba for a boundary in the second ball of the 48th over as Bangladesh posted to 246-9 in 47.2 overs.

Earlier, it was the story of Aftab and Mashfiqur who set the platform for the much-desired series victory on Zimbabwean soil. Mashfiqur justified his promotion to number three by scoring his maiden half-century after an early loss.

With a fighting 3-1 victory, Habibul Bashar's men not only maintained supremacy over their southern African opponents but also buried memories of a heartbreaking tour last

year when they lost 3-2. It will definitely boost the Tigers' morale ahead of next month's World Cup in the West Indies.

While chasing a decent total, Bangladesh once again made a poor start like the previous games when last match hero Shahriar Nafees fell for a two-ball duck. Another left-hander Tamim Iqbal played a run-a-ball 30 but still, the visitors were reduced to 38-2.

The team management's ploy to send young stumper Mashfiqur up the order clicked as the 18-year-old Bogra lad did his job as a grafter with his senior partner Aftab's elegance putting the Zimbabwean attack to the sword.

The pair overtook the third wicket Bangladesh record of 128, shared by Rajin Saleh and Alo Kapali against Pakistan at Karachi in 2003, and ultimately dashed the home team's hope to bounce back.

When Aftab, trapped lbw by pacer Anthony Ireland, returned to the pavilion, Bangladesh were well placed at 173-3. During his career best 92 in 53 appearances, the Chittagonian clobbered six fours and five sixes off 77 balls.

On the other hand, Mashfiqur, who is breathing on the neck of long-serving keeper Khaled Mashud, hit only two boundaries during his 95-ball 57.

Earlier, Bangladesh skipper Bashar made no mistake like the second match, which they lost by eight wickets, to invite the rivals to bat first and leading paceman Mashrafee-bin-Mortaza gave a perfect start by removing the two

openers with 22 runs on board.

Sean Williams (51 off 73 balls) and Chamiruwa Chibhaba (54 off 73 balls) repaired the damage during a 101-run third wicket stand but 200 looked to be a distant total until Elton Chigumbura came up with a spectacular display of over boundaries.

Chigumbura smashed seven sixes and a four in his 57-ball hurricane knock off 77.

Bangladesh brought two changes to the squad from the last day, which won the third match by 14 runs. Mohammad Ashraful was dropped to pave way for Tushar Imran while Mohammad Sharif, a latest injury victim, was replaced by Shahadat Hossain.

The 21-year-old pace bowler all-rounder Sharif was unable to deliver the final ball of his 10th over on Friday as he had to hobble off the field with a thigh strain.
