## Arsenal face bogey team

Bolton Wanderers have the opportunity to cause more agony for Arsenal on Wednesday when they welcome the Gunners to their Reebok Stadium home for an FA Cup fourth round replay.

In recent years Bolton manager Sam Allardyce has built a fantastic record against the north London side, particularly in home fixtures.

Bolton have won four of the last five matches against Arsenal on home turf, and the prize of a fifth round fixture this weekend against local rivals Blackburn awaits if they can inflict more of the same on Arsene Wenger's men.

A Kevin Nolan goal almost saw them win the first bout of this contest, but Kolo Toure equalised and the re-match is sure to be a lively encounter.

"It's a great game for us, but it is going to be tough," said Nolan. "I thought they (Arsenal) were fantastic down at the Emirates, but we can hopefully get our fans inside the Reebok to put a bit more pressure on them."

"We have won two Premiership games on the bounce and we are really looking forward to the game. We respect them because they are a fantastic football side, but we try to counter that."

"What people have to remember is that we have played two FA Cup games against Arsenal at the Reebok and we have won one each."

"Just because we have beaten them on so many occasions at the Reebok, we are not going to take it

for granted that we are just going to turn up and win."

Bolton head into the game on the back of a 2-1 win over Fulham, but duo Ivan Campo and Abdelaye Faye have both been struggling with illness and are considered as doubts by the home side.

Arsenal, two points ahead of Bolton in fourth place in the Premiership, have concerns too.

Johan Djorou has broken his nose, while Cesc Fabregas has a knee problem. Alex Hleb (hamstring), Freddie Ljungberg (hamstring), Emmanuel Eboué (ankle), William Gallas (thigh) and Robin van Persie (foot) are already out.

At the weekend Arsenal came from behind to beat Wigan 2-1 and captain Thierry Henry believes they have a new fighting spirit within the squad which enables them to produce unlikely results.

"At the moment we are coming

back into games when maybe we are not playing the best that we can play," said the France striker. "Trust me, we are not doing that on purpose, to be 1-0 down and I am sure there were people who thought that was the day we would first lose at the Emirates."

"We were joking about it at the end, saying we have to stop being 1-0 down. Like at Middlesbrough, we went up a gear when we had been 1-0 down (before drawing 1-1) and only playing with 10 men (after defender Philippe Senderos was sent-off)," explained Henry, who scored the equaliser at the Riverside earlier this month.

"Somehow we always manage to get back into it. This team is growing in that way because two years ago I remember being behind against some teams and we did not find the resources to come back into it."

## Livorno to play in empty stadia

Livorno are almost certain to play Wednesday's UEFA Cup tie against Spanish side Espanyol behind closed doors.

Security at the club's Armando Picchi stadium is not yet in line with government regulations under new measures introduced last week to combat hooliganism.

Livorno had hoped to open their doors with a reduced capacity, but a government-backed security watchdog that specializes in sports events has turned down their request.

Livorno coach Daniele Arrigoni said he was hoping the club could still win a last-minute reprieve but admitted he feared the worst.

"It's an injustice for the fans," he said.

"It was supposed to be an historic occasion for this city and instead our fans cannot be part of it. It's a defeat for football."

"We are hoping something will change at the last minute, but it doesn't look good."

Under a government crackdown on football violence after the riot in Sicily earlier this month which claimed the life of a policeman, clubs whose grounds are deemed unsafe are being forced to play their matches without spectators.

Livorno need more turnstiles, a crowd-filtering area and a police watchtower.

Wednesday's match is a round of 32, first leg tie.

## 'United on track'

Manchester United's Gary Neville believes the club is on the brink of ending its three seasons without the Premiership title and being crowned champions of England once again.

First Arsenal and then Chelsea (twice) have ensured the Premiership trophy has moved south to London.

But with United, on top since mid-October, six points clear of Chelsea at the head of the table with 11 games left, United captain Neville said: "Teams are struggling to live with us. We are playing some of the best level of football seen for a few years and we have to maintain that."

"People talk about the pressure at the top but we are just enjoying our football. I think the squad is ready to win it again. We've had three years where we've really suffered and not really performed to our capabilities."

"We've suffered with injuries in the last three years at important moments in the season," the England full-back also told United's official website here Monday. "It's meant we've been so far behind and at times we've just not performed well."

"So the team has had enough of that and is ready to stay together and know what we need to do. We've matured in certain areas and some of the younger players are now producing incredible displays."

"Without the injuries we've had in previous seasons, things have come together for us," Neville added.

"After last Christmas, there were games in the last three or four months of last season, where I think we'd had enough," he explained.

"Every time we lost a game there was a huge amount of criticism in those two or three years," said Neville, whose side beat Charlton 2-0 at Old Trafford on Saturday.

"It became a bit of a witch-hunt. I think we'd had enough of that and we've turned it around."

## Title up for grabs

British, Spanish and French sides dominate the field in the UEFA Cup last 32 round which begins on Wednesday.

Thirty teams will do battle in an attempt to join Tottenham

in the next round, the English team benefitting from a bye due to Feyenoord's expulsion from the competition following fan violence in their group stage match against Nancy.

Blackburn and Newcastle hold the torch for England with Rangers flying the flag for Scotland; Spain have Espanyol, Osasuna, Celta Vigo and holders Sevilla fighting their corner while France are represented by Nancy, Paris St Germain, Bordeaux and Lens.

Of that bunch Blackburn seemingly have the toughest test with a trip to 2002 Champions League finalists Bayer Leverkusen.

Both sides have had an inconsistent season so far with Leverkusen sitting seventh in the German Bundesliga and Blackburn 10th in the English Premiership.

Blackburn enjoyed a stunning group stage run to finish top of their section while Leverkusen needed two goals in the last 12 minutes of their final game against Turkey's Besiktas to sneak into the knock-out stages.

Rangers face a daunting trip to Israel and Hapoel Tel-Aviv, whose only group stage win was a 4-2 success at PSG, after which a French fan was shot dead by an off-duty police officer protecting a Jewish supporter that had been set upon by a mob.

Rangers's UEFA Cup form has been in stark contrast to their league form which eventually saw French coach Paul Le Guen dismissed from Ibrox.

Rangers trail their domestic rivals Celtic by a mammoth 19 points in the league but had looked composed and assured under Le Guen in Europe.

Le Guen is still in the competition, though, and will guide PSG during their trip to Athens, to face AEK, coming off the back of an impressive 4-2 win over Monaco at the weekend.

PSG struggled badly to reach the knock-out stages and only made it courtesy of a 4-0 victory over AEK's city rivals Panathinaikos in the French team's final group game, although the Greeks had already ensured top spot and played like a team whose foot was firmly off the gas.

The tie of the round is the clash between Germans Werder Bremen and former European Champions Ajax, whose forward Klaas-Jan Huntelaar is among the tournament's top scorers.

Werder, who slipped six points off league leaders Schalke 04 at the weekend after a shocking 4-1 defeat at Stuttgart, may find motivation hard to come by having only narrowly missed out on reaching the Champions League knock-out stages.

## Owen elated to be running

England striker Michael Owen on Tuesday voiced his delight at being able to run for the first time since suffering a serious knee injury during last summer's World Cup finals.

Owen, who is now hoping to make his comeback in April, began running on Monday, said: "The next step is to continue running and to do some ball work before joining in with training."

"I enjoyed the first 10 minutes

and then it started to feel like hard work. But every step you take is a step in the right direction and it is all going great at the moment."

Owen has made just 11 appearances for the Magpies since joining the club in a 17-million-pound move from Real Madrid in August 2005.

He was sidelined for five months last season after fracturing a metatarsal bone in a collision with international team-mate Paul Robinson at Tottenham, and was still regaining match fitness when disaster struck again in Germany.

His importance to his club is

underlined by the fact that he had scored seven goals in 10 starts before his injury at White Hart Lane.

Manager Glenn Roeder is yet to be able to name him in his starting line-up despite being in charge at St James' Park for more than a year, and has seen him play for just 30 minutes in a goalless draw at Birmingham in the penultimate game of last season.

Roeder said: "Because of his injury at the World Cup, I have never been allowed to write Michael Owen's name in the starting XI, which I am looking forward to doing and desperate to do."

## Ballack unfazed

## A Beckham dream

David Beckham's future Los Angeles Galaxy teammates began their pre-season workouts for the Major League Soccer season here Monday with two survivors from an open tryout among those taking training.

Laurent Merlin, a 22-year-old Frenchman who showed his wizardry, and Rui Fortes, 24, of Portugal, were the two prospects who were given the opportunity from among 800 men from around the world who began an open tryout camp Saturday.

The field was trimmed to 133 players who were invited back Sunday and those players were placed onto eight teams for 60-minute morning matches before a cut to 30 men for one final Sunday afternoon match.

Merlin and Fortes made the final cut for a one-week trial. Now each has a chance to make the roster for the team's April season opener and could become a teammate of Beckham when the England star joins the Galaxy in July.

"Merlin and Fortes are raw but they showed some potential and therefore their adventure will continue," Galaxy president and general manager Alexi Lalas said.

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## Fashionista Dunga

Brazil coach Dunga said the row over the unusual shirt he wore during last week's game against Portugal showed that football was a sport averse to change.

The beleaguered coach, who also repeated that he had no grudge with Ronaldinho, added that his unorthodox choice of touchline attire was partly an attempt to help his daughter, who is a fashion student and designed the shirt.

"If parents don't help their children or give them incentives in their work, then it's more likely that they will get involved in drugs and that sort of thing," he said in an interview on Brazilian television.

The coach raised eyebrows last Tuesday in London when he stood on the touchline wearing a garish black-and-white shirt with false braces down the front that looked more at home in a 1970s disco than the technical area at the Emirates Stadium.

Portugal's 2-0 win over Brazil at Arsenal's home ground ended Dunga's unbeaten run in charge of the team and his dress sense attracted almost as many comments as Brazil's performance itself.

"First of all, it was a white shirt with black flowers on it and I don't think black and white is that colourful," he said.

"But it just shows how difficult it is to change things in football. They expect you either to wear the team tracksuit or a traditional jacket and tie and that's it."

Dunga is not the only South American coach attracting attention for his attire.

Argentinian coach Ricardo La Volpe, who coached Mexico at the World Cup finals last year, was recently the subject of a feature article in a local newspaper highlighting his array of interesting ties.

He was also spotted on the touchline recently in a smart jacket, jeans and white shoes.

Dunga has also courted criticism over his apparent reluctance to field Ronaldinho, who has had only one start for Brazil since the World Cup. The Barcelona player missed the Portugal match through injury.

## Robinho 'unhappy' at Real

Brazil forward Robinho has become the latest Real Madrid player to voice his discontent at his lack of opportunities under coach Fabio Capello.

"Right now I'm not happy because I'm not playing, but I'm going to keep working to change that," Robinho told a news conference on Tuesday.

"I know that he (Capello) doesn't have confidence in my football because I'm not playing and I have to make him change his mind."

Asked whether he would consider leaving the club at the end of the season, he replied: "I don't know. All I know is that with Capello

I've been on the bench and if things carry on like that I will have to see what's best for me."

But the 22-year-old, who joined Real from Santos on a five-year contract for a fee of \$30 million in Aug 2005, said his case was different from that of Brazil colleague Ronaldo who was forced to leave the club because he did not feature in Capello's plans.

"Ronaldo is the best striker in the world, but he wasn't happy because the coach didn't want him to stay here. I'm younger, I've still got a lot to learn and I've got a future."

Robinho has been in the starting line-up for nine of Real's 22 league games this season and has found the net just once.

Last week Capello backtracked on his pledge not to select David Beckham again following the midfielder's announcement that he

would be joining MLS side LA Galaxy at the end of the season.

Striker Antonio Cassano continues to be sidelined, however, after a run-in with Capello earlier in the season.

Robinho backed team mate Fabio Cannavaro's call for the Italy international to be return to the squad.

"Cassano is a great player and person," he said. "I don't like it when I see that my team mates are sad."

Robinho was at the centre of controversy earlier this year when sporting director Predrag Mijatovic hinted that the Brazilian had arrived at a training session smelling of alcohol.

"It wasn't true," said Robinho. "I look after myself off the pitch .... Mijatovic hasn't apologised to me or said anything. I don't like what was said, but it's in the past now."
