

# Stop hill cutting in Ctg

Speakers tell seminar

Speakers at a seminar in the port city yesterday urged the caretaker government to take immediate measures to stop hill cutting in Chittagong in order to protect the region from facing devastating natural calamity like earthquake in the nearest future.

The seminar titled 'Hill Cutting in Chittagong, Environmental Degradation and Our Duty' was organised by Bangladesh Environment Lawyers Association (BELA) at a local hotel.

Md Yasin, district judge and member of Administrative Tribunal (Chittagong and Sylhet), was the chief guest at the seminar with Dr Md Mohiuddin, professor of Institute of Forestry and Environmental Science of Chittagong University (CU), in the chair.

Dr Md Shahidul Islam, professor of Geography and Environment Department at CU, presented a keynote paper at the seminar.

In his paper, Dr Shahidul said the majority of hills of the port city have already been cut and many

are being cut and the anti-nature action was done only for making money through housing plots or making brickfields.

Hills in Chasma hill, Cosmopolitan, Hill View, Amin Jute Mill and Raufabad areas have mostly lost while hills surrounding Foy's Lake, some portion of DC Hill and Bangladesh Forest Research Institute (BFRI) area are currently being cut, he said.

The biodiversity and ecological balance is under threat as people cut the hilly plants first, then burn the bushes or grasses and finally cut the hill, he said.

Speakers blamed lack of proper law for preserving the hills from indiscriminate cutting.

Nothing has been mentioned about cutting hill in the Environmental Law-1995, they said.

Environmental court started operation in 2000 but filing of case in the court is very difficult, they observed, adding that only a few cases have been filed.

In most cases politically backed powerful people are involved in

such activity and they continue to cut hill by paying a meagre amount of fine when cases were filed, they said.

They said coordination is essential between the concerned planning and administrative authorities like CDA, Chittagong City Corporation, Environment Department and DC Office to allot the land for housing.

They urged the government to make a national planning board consisting of all concerned authorities as well as representatives of related sections like environmentalists and scientists to find effective way to resolve the problem.

President of the Forum for Planned Chittagong Professor Emirate Dr Jamal Nazrul Islam, Architect Zarina Hossain, Director of Environment Department, Chittagong Md Mosharraf Hossain, Chittagong Development Authority (CDA) Executive Engineer Md Mohsin Bhuiyan and Associate Professor of CU Law Department Dr Abdullah Al Faruq addressed the seminar.

## Raise awareness about bird flu

Says health adviser

Health and Family Welfare Adviser Maj Gen (ret'd) Dr ASM Matur Rahman yesterday emphasised the need to raise mass awareness about avian influenza as the country is vulnerable to global bird flu pandemic.

"Bird flu is knocking at the door of Bangladesh. The country faces the risk of bird flu attack as the deadly disease has already broken out in almost every neighbouring country," he said at the inaugural session of an advocacy meeting of health officials at the auditorium of the Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research (IEDCR) in the city.

Although the country has not yet come under the attack of bird flu, there was no reason to think that the disease would never break out in the country, Dr Matur said.

The government has already decided on a plan of action and a module has been formulated for the field-level health workers, he said. "We've to build a mass awareness by ensuring proper application of this module," he added.

The health adviser urged the mass media to come forward to create awareness among the people.

Presided over by IEDCR Director Prof Mahmudur Rahman, the inaugural session was also addressed by Director General of Health Department Shahjahan Biswas, Japanese Ambassador Masayuki Inoue, Unicef Representative Louise George Arsenault and WHO Country Representative Dr Duangadee Sungkhobol.

Earlier, the health adviser unveiled the covers of nine modules for the divisional, district and upazila level health workers.

## Valuables worth Tk 4 lakh looted

Armed robbers looted gold ornaments, cash and mobile phone sets worth around Tk four lakh from the residence of second officer of Kotwali Police Station at Khatiber Hat in the city yesterday.

Sources said four robbers entered the house of second officer SI Mahfuzur Rahman on the second floor of a three-storied building at around 12:30pm.

They took away 20 tolas of gold ornaments, Tk 55,000 in cash and three mobile phone sets holding Mahfuzur's younger brother Tanimul Haq, mother and wife at gunpoint.
