GAIBANDHA SCHOOL CRICKET


Ratul and Ishaque struck half-centuries as Gaibandha Government High School crushed Gobindaganj High School by 175 runs at the Gaibandha Stadium.

Wicketkeeper-batsman Anwar occupied the crease for nearly six hours during his 108-run essay that featured sixteen boundaries in 252 balls to lay the foundation for a big total after skipper Al Shahriar decided to bat first at the placid wicket.

The right-hander first shared a 125-run partnership with fellow opener Uttam Sarker, who scored 62 off 121 balls with nine hits to the fence, and then got valuable support from his skipper Shahriar during a 119-run second-wicket stand.

Dashing Shahriar clobbered eight fours and two sixes to make an 88-ball 71.

Shamsur Rahman was batting on 39 and Mahmudullah Riyad was yet to open his account when the stumps were drawn for the first day of the four-day match.

Spinner Sabir Khan took two wickets for 84 runs in 27 overs.

RAJSHAHI-SYLHET

Forhad bowled his season's best figure of 6-54 only after seeing himself out from the World Cup squad to wrap up the Sylhet innings for 200 runs in only 66.5 overs.

The right-arm seamer took charge after Shafiq Al Jabir started the carnage removing Golam Rahman for a duck in the very first over and one down Saif Mahmud (14) with the scoreboard reading 73-2.

Only opener Imtiaz Hossain and Golam Mowla shone in an otherwise disappointing batting display of Sylhet. Imtiaz top-scored 88 off 123 balls that saw ten fours and three sixes while Mowla was unbeaten on 48.

Hasibul Hossain gave Sylhet an early breakthrough but Rafiqul Islam (35) and Forhad kept their cool as the home team boosted by discarded wicketkeeper Khaled Mashud finished the day's play for 56-1.

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BCB lets Mashud go

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) officially released Khaled Mashud from the A team and named Sahagir Hossain as his replacement for the two four-dayers against touring England A.

The board took the decision following a formal request from the long-serving stumper who also assured them that he will be available for selection after the series against the second string English side.

Out-of-favour Mashud expressed his non-availability after national selectors had drafted him in the 13-member Bangladesh A team saying that he could not able to play with full commitment in the series.

The first Test (4-day) of the two-match series will start tomorrow at the Mirpur Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium.

Macs seal whitewash

Hayden's 181 goes in vain

Craig McMillan and Brendon McCullum blasted New Zealand to a stunning series clean-sweep over Australia, negating a magnificent 181 from Matthew Hayden here Tuesday.

In a high-scoring match which produced 26 sixes, New Zealand chased down Australia's 346 for five with one wicket and just three balls to spare.

This was only Australia's second whitewash after losing 3-0 in a three-match series back in 1997 against England.

"This is a vital tour for us as regards to the players who want to put themselves in the shop window so to speak. The conditions are inherently different from what we are used to at home and anyone who can perform well here will stand in good stead with the selectors back home when the time comes to pick England internationals," said left-hander Yardy who is on his first tour to Bangladesh.

As the timing of the function coincided with the team's practice session, only Yardy and all-rounder Alexander Loudon turned up alongside coach Peter Moores and manager Guy Jackson on behalf of the whole squad.

That however did little to deter the enthusiasm of the diplomat who besides voicing his obvious love for the game also mentioned how he saw cricket as a means of bridging the two nations together.

"Relations between our two countries are better than they have ever been but one thing I feel where we can always improve is interpersonal relationships and this tour should establish that beyond sporting competitiveness. I believe that people to people links are the enduring ties between nations and this is an excellent opportunity to do just that," said Choudhury.

Moores agreed and said that he was very satisfied with the hospitality that they had been shown on the tour. He also ventured a judgement on the local players based on the three-day game that they had participated in.

Batting holds India's key

If India manage to match their last World Cup runners-up finish in the latest edition in the Caribbean, it will be considered a big achievement considering their horror story in 2006.

India have been experimenting with their batting order ever since Australian Greg Chappell took over as coach in 2005, but have yet to hit upon a winning combination.

Fans began to lose faith in the team which tasted failure at home as well as abroad last year despite the presence of exciting stroke-makers in Sachin Tendulkar, Virender Sehwag and Mahendra Dhoni.

However, despite the pains of 2006, there are signs that things are on the upturn with a 2-1 series win over Sri Lanka this month which saw former skipper Sourav Ganguly making three impressive half-centuries.

Chappell, also a former Australian Test captain, has said in a recent interview that a semifinal

berth is a reasonable ambition and beyond that the World Cup is anybody's tournament.

"We have the ability, but we will have to play well and we will have to have some luck along the way," said Chappell, who was under fire last year for his team's dismal performance.

Rahul Dravid's Indians will require

luck as well as pluck to leave a mark in the mega one-day event as little went right for them in 2006.

The new year began well when they thrashed an under-strength West Indies side 3-1 in a home series in January, but the triumph still failed to iron out all of their flaws.

India's problems begin when their strength -- batting -- deserts them. This was precisely what happened with them last year.

Opener Sehwag's form was a

major cause of concern as he could

manage just 254 runs in 14 matches before he was axed for the West Indies series.

His presence is vital to the team's

balance because specialist opener

Tendulkar was asked to bat in the

middle order in the twin series

against the West Indies and Sri

Lanka ahead of the World Cup.

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
