

A mangrove forest in death throes

Shrimp farmers, land grabbers denuding an island in Cox's Bazar

A large mangrove is in its death throes because of the greed of shrimp farmers.

A land grabber syndicate has been annihilating the mangrove forest in Goldia Island of Cox's Bazar. Embankments are being constructed all over the island in order to make shrimp farms.

When The Daily Star correspon-

dent visited the area on February 15, approximately 200 workers were seen engaged in chopping down the mangrove forest, moving the timber somewhere else and building embankments for shrimp farms.

Kashem Majhi, a labour leader, told The Daily Star that he had been leading 100 labourers to chop down the mangrove forest for the last 10 days. Syedul Haque Shikder of Moheshkhali hired the labourers

through him to clear the forest in the island.

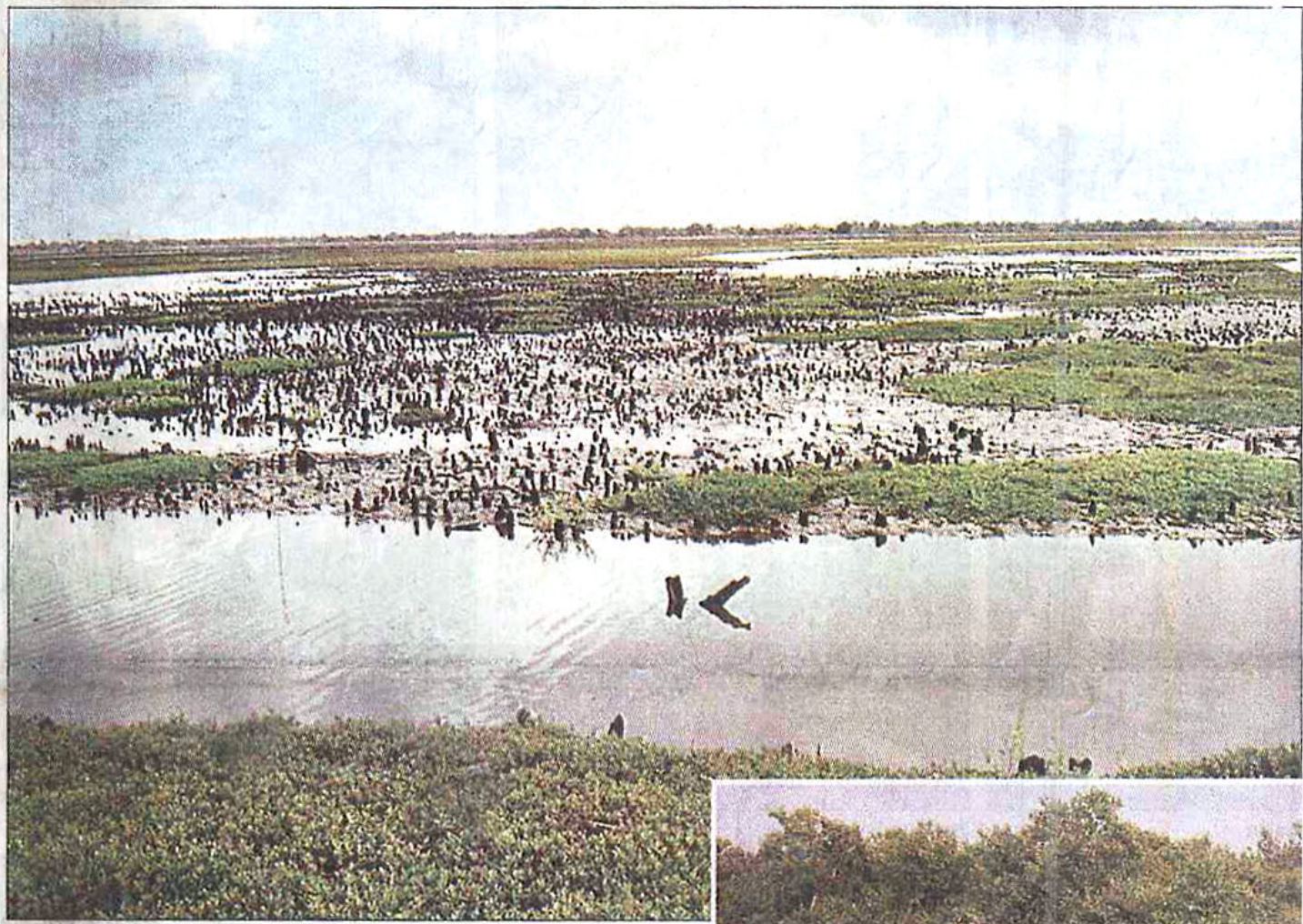
Bashi Majhi said he has been constructing embankments for shrimp farms along with some 100 workers for the last seven days. He also said Syedul was having the embankments built.

Shaplapur Forest Office In-charge MA Samad, whose office is just half a kilometre away from Goldia, said when he along with his forest guards went to Goldia Island,

the goons of Syedul Haque chased them away from the island. Samad contacted Syedul over cellphone to enquire about the matter and he was told that Syedul took lease of the island and he would show him all relevant documents. But, Syedul never showed up with the documents and continued his destruction of the island's forest.

Samad said according to cadastral survey the land between the

2.5 lakh sacks of rotten dates, more relief goods seized

Joint forces during their nationwide drives yesterday recovered various goods including 2,50,000 sacks of spoiled dates, 600 litres of adulterated coconut oil and 250 pieces of corrugated iron (CI) sheets for relief from houses of BNP and Jatiya Party (JP) leaders.

They arrested eight people including a sub assistant agriculture officer.

TANGAIL The army-led joint forces seized around 2,50,000 sacks (per bag 15 kg to 30 kg) of spoiled dates from a cold storage at Mirzapur upazila in Tangail and arrested three employees of the cold storage, reports our correspondent.

The arrestees are identified as cold storage employees Shyamal Chandra Banik, the manager, Abdul Kader, the supervisor, and Kajal Kumar Ghosh, the accountant, police and other sources confirmed.

Manager of the cold storage Shyamal Chandra Banik said Tareque M Mazumdar, owner of AL Manara Overseas Ltd at Mohakhali in Dhaka, brought 1,25,900 sacks of

dates from Chittagong and stored those in the cold storage in August 2004.

"The owners of the dates had collected dates from the cold storage several times before -- especially in Ramadan and changed the expiration dates printed on the sacks," he said.

Asit Kumar Sarkar is chairman of AL Manara Overseas Ltd while Jatish Sarkar, Dewan Omar Faruque, Jharna Hossain, Abdul Rashid, Uttam Kumar Sen and Chandan Biswas are directors of the company, Shyamal added.

RANGPUR The forces recovered two hundred fifteen pieces of CI sheets for relief from the possession of union council (UP) chairmen and a JP leader at different areas under Pirganj upazila yesterday.

The joint forces raided Pirganj sadar union council chairman Saidur Rahman's house and recovered 135 pieces of CI sheets, reports our correspondent.

Saidur Rahman, however, managed to flee the house before the joint forces arrived.

3 killed in gunfight over salt bed

Three including a schoolboy were killed and 23 others injured during an hour-long gunfight between two rival groups over ownership of 20 acres of salt bed at a Cox's Bazar village yesterday.

The dead were identified as Rezaul Karim, 12, a class five student, Nasir Uddin, 29, and Kazal, 30.

According to sources, there was a longstanding dispute between two neighbours -- Jamal Uddin and Bachchu Mia -- over ownership of the land at Moynadiya village under Pekuya upazila of the district.

The clash erupted when about 35 armed men led by Bachchu Mia attacked labourers, who work for Jamal Uddin, at about 10:30am, sources added.

Both sides exchanged about 100 rounds of gunfire killing three people on the spot and injuring 23 others including women and children, police officer Saifuddin Shaheen said.

Among the critically injured, Amir Ali, Nazrul, Machod and Siraz were admitted to Chittagong Medical College Hospital and another was given first aid at Pekuya Upazila Health Complex.

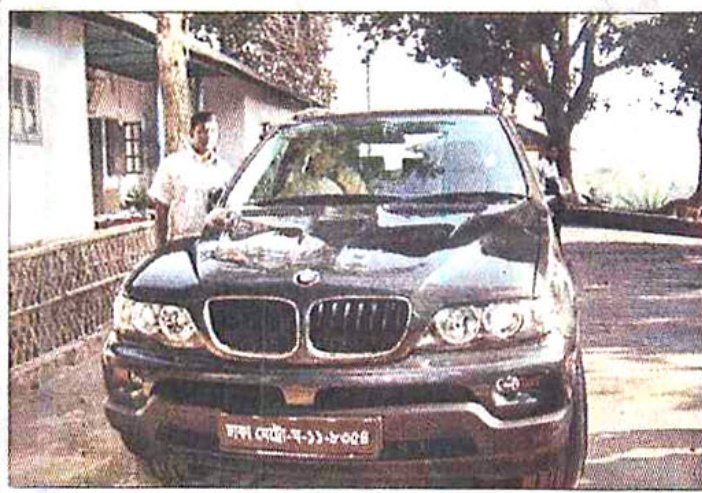

Export hampered as ship owners tussle over cargo

The persisting tussle between foreign and local ship owners is greatly hampering exports making thousands of tonnes of cargo stockpiled at the ports.

Around, 21,000 tonnes of raw

jute to be exported to Pakistan piled up at Mongla port recently due to conflicts between the two groups of ship owners, according to sources.

Foreign flag carrier ships have to take a waiver (no objection certificate) from Bangladesh government

before loading any export cargo as the flag vessel protection ordinance 1982 gives priority to local ships to carry goods from the country.

Local ships take advantage of this and create obstacles to foreign

BNP worried as graft cries sharpen against Khaleda, Tarique

The BNP high command is trying to revitalise leaders and workers, who have virtually lost morale having seen the magnitude of corruption by a number of powerful leaders of the party and its front organisation.

Sources said party leaders' worry is also growing with corruption allegations against party chief Khaleda Zia and her son Tarique Rahman getting stronger day by day.

This will cause among the leaders and workers a serious loss of confidence in the party leadership, they said.

A few BNP leaders said they now think it would be better to be in the opposition through an election at the quickest possible time rather than delaying the next parliamentary elections which could create more problem for the party.

Sources said these leaders do not even have any objection if the BNP high command agrees to talk with their political opponent to avoid any possible disaster.

Party sources said although the BNP high-ups fear more leaders will be arrested on corruption charges, they are trying to inject courage into party men to face the situation with patience and courage.
