

Huge pilferage of Wasa water unearthed

CPA mobile court continues drive against illegal connections

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Chittagong Water and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) in its drive against pilferage and wastage of water unearthed numerous incidents of irregularities and realised outstanding bills and revenues. Different commercial firms and apartments have been pilfering crores of litres of Wasa water everyday, causing huge loss of revenues to the government exchequer in the port city, sources said.

Chittagong Port Authority (CPA) started the drive titled 'Operation Save Wasa' led by its Magistrate Md Munir Chowdhury through a mobile court on December 1 last year to check pilferage and wastage of Wasa water.

Chowdhury, as usual, took no time to discover one after another various kinds of disorders and irregularities in this state-owned organisation. The mobile court unearthed incidents of water pilferage of around five crore litres in two months until January 31.

Sources said a section of commercial firm owners and high-rise buildings are involved in pilfering and selling the huge amount of water through illegal connections from main Wasa line by setting up pump. They did not pay Wasa bill and evaded the revenues. During the drive as of January 31, the court found incidents of huge pilferage and wastage of water and other irregularities in community centres, private clinics, diagnostic centres, hotels, restaurants, factories and bakeries and high-rise residential apartments.

The court realised Tk 5.13 crore in revenue and Tk 50.48 lakh in fine from the owners concerned during this period. It also realised Tk15 lakh in compensation, disconnected around 71 illegal lines, seized around 56 illegal pumps and motors and arrested 71 people in this connection. The accused firms steal Wasa water from main line through PVC pipelines, creating leakage in lines, using bypass line from underground main line, extending pipelines illegally and setting up of illegal pumps in the main line. They also sell Wasa water for commercial purpose bypassing the metres and collect water from

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residential apartments to supply to the commercial building. In its drives on February 14 and February 15, the court unearthed pilferage of around 15 crore litres of Wasa water at a residential colony Gani Colony at city's Chawk Bazar area. They have been pilfering water during the last one and a half years. The authorities disconnected all the lines of Gani Colony on August 30 in 2006 for not paying the outstanding bill of Tk 6 lakh, sources said. The owner supplied huge Wasa water through a bypass line from the main line to around 400 tenants living in three buildings of the 6,000 square feet colony. The mobile court fined the owner Tk 7 Lakh and realised Tk 2 lakh on the spot. The court also arrested the owner of the colony and its manager. Chittagong Wasa is capable of producing 180 MLD (million litre per day) as against the daily demand of over 500 MLD in the port city, sources said. Wasa Commercial Manager Sirajul Azim Khan said pilferage of water is one of the causes of 26 per cent to 32 per cent system loss in the total

production of Wasa. Other reasons of system loss are leakage in supply line in different areas, technical and treatment problem, he added. Chief Engineer Shafiqul Islam said the ongoing drive will play a vital role in stopping the pilferage. Dwellers in different areas also welcomed the drive. The firms punished by the mobile court for pilfering water are Well Food Centre, Russel Vegetable Oil Industries, Woodland Diagnostic Centre, Agrabad Maa O Shishu Hospital, Karnaphuli Shishu Park, Banani Cinema Complex, Agrabad Taher Chamber, Mehdi Tower in Mehdiabag, Citycell Building, Keari Mashud, Mostafa Properties, Javed Steel Mills, Al Amin Construction, Bengal Fabrics, Frozen Foods Ltd, Orchid Tower, Mamata Drum Factory and Banga Builders. "I'm surprised to notice how shamelessly some of the moneyed persons are pilfering Wasa water in the port city," Munir Chowdhury said. He expressed his resolve to continue the drive against all the corrupt people.

Unhygienic, substandard foods served in CU dining halls

The resident students of Chittagong University (CU) are suffering from eating disorders since they are served unhygienic and substandard foods in the dining halls. The substandard and unhygienic food served at the dining and canteens exposes the students to different health hazards. "After taking food from the canteens and dining very often we feel stomach ache, or suffer from dyspepsia and IBS (Irregular Bowl Syndrome)," said Asiful Hasnat, a student of Arts faculty. "However, we don't have any other options other than going there for lunch," he added. Besides, in absence of suitable canteens, around 8,000 students, including resident and non-resident ones, of science and arts faculties and Institute of Marine Sciences and Fisheries have to take these type of foods or go hungry after the lunch hours when practical and other classes are held.

An underground cafeteria at Arts faculty serves the students substandard foods in a most unhygienic atmosphere while the condition of canteens at Science faculty and Institute of Marine Science is miserable, students said. But the university authorities remain quite indifferent to the problems, they alleged. Salah Uddin, a resident student of Suhrawardy Hall, said they usually avoid the dining hall that serves foods of poor quality and very small in quantity. It charges Tk 9 for a meal with only item of meat, fish or egg and an additional Tk 5 for any extra item, he said. Dining hall manager Mohammed Khorshed Alam, also

the assistant cook, said they are to keep the quantity of food small and make 20 pieces from a one kg fish and 22 pieces from one kg chicken to minimise the cost of meal. He said the dining hall incurred a loss of around Tk 6,000 in November last year, blaming the price hike of commodities. The students of Arts and Science faculties and Marine Sciences very often attend their practical classes without lunch due to lack of suitable canteen or cafeteria, sources said. Mohammed Harun, proprietor of the underground canteen, however, denied the allegation of serving food of poor quality and quantity. The cafeteria in the basement at the Arts Faculty goes under knee-deep water in the rainy season.

"The students will be benefited if the authorities run a cafeteria in the main building like Commerce, Social Science and IT faculties," said Jahid Hossain, a student of the Science Faculty. Meanwhile, the cafeteria at Chittagong University Central Students' Union (CUCSU) serves rich foods like meat and pilau at Tk 8 only. But, the other foods served in the cafeteria are also of poor quality and small in quantity, said the students. As such students are forced to take fast foods from nearby tea stalls, popularly known as "jhupi", during the lunch or go without any food. Proctor Prof Didarul Alam Chowdhury said, "I would warn the owner of the underground cafeteria and ask him to serve better and hygienic food".
