Bangladesh to capitalise on early arrival

Bangladesh hope that their early arrival for the World Cup will help erase the threat of a repeat upset they suffered at the last tournament in 2003.

The Asian minnows suffered an embarrassing opening defeat to Canada at the start of their South African campaign, but they believe that by being the second of the 16 competing nations to arrive for the 2007 tournament they can avoid such horrors again.

"We are here to do as well as we can," said coach Dav Whatmore, the man who led Sri Lanka to the 1996 World Cup title.

"We are here a little early than most other countries which we think is a valuable asset to have."

Bangladesh will play fellow finalists Bermuda and Canada at the Antigua Recreation Ground from Sunday as part of their build-up.

They will then play official warm-up matches in Barbados against New Zealand and Scotland before travelling to Trinidad for their Group B matches against Sri Lanka, India and Bermuda.

Whatmore said that the recent 3-1 series win against Zimbabwe had been a timely boost for the squad's confidence, although they just managed to squeeze victory in the final match of the series by one wicket.

"Our team spirit is very good," insisted the coach.

"The team has played some good cricket over the last six to eight months culminating in our first series victory abroad against a

Sahagir Hossain and Tushar Imran showed some resistance against a strong England A pace attack as Bangladesh A recovered from a precarious position to cross the two hundred run mark in their first innings on the first day of the four-day match at the Mirpur Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium yesterday.

The coin favoured the home team who opted to bat on a good track. But the decision turned out to be a nightmare after they lost half of their wickets in the first session before Tushar (52) and Sahagir (86) chipped in with half centuries to spare the blushes and post a decent 209 runs on the board.

The young wicketkeeper, Sahagir, who replaced Khaled Mashud in the second string side, joined his skipper with the team tottering at 45-5 and added an invaluable 84 runs for the sixth wicket to repair the damages before Tushar unnecessarily stepped out to charge spinner Alex Loudon only to hit him straight at cover where Michael Yardy was waiting for a simple catch. Rajshahi cruise along




Table toppers Rajshahi established their lead with a convincing innings and

four-run victory over Sylhet on the third day of the ISPAHANI MIRZAPORE TEA 8th National Cricket League at the Rajshahi Divisional Stadium yesterday.

Leading by 165 runs, the hosts bowled out Sylhet for only 161 runs in the second innings to win with a day to spare. Earlier, Rajshahi were bowled out for 365 in their first half-centuries.

The match between Khulna and Barisal at the Khulna Divisional Stadium is heavily tilted towards the visitors who rode on young Raisul Islam's maiden first-class hundred. Khulna are two for no loss in pursuit of an improbable 379 runs for victory in the second innings.

At the Fatullah Stadium, Chittagong are in a precarious position as Dhaka's fast bowler Mahbubul Alam took two second innings wickets to reduce the visitors to 6-2. Chittagong are following on, having only scored 289 in their first innings in reply to 500 runs made by Dhaka.

SYLHET-RAJSHAH

Rajshahi struggled from the onset of their second innings as Rajshahi seamer Forhad got rid of three middle-order batsmen. Left-armers Shafiq Al Jaber also took two wickets while Mahbubul Alam took 4-20.

Rajshahi consolidated their position on top with their fourth win in seven matches, accounting to 32 points.

DHAKA-CHITTAGONG

With their overnight score on 73-3, visitors Chittagong were eyeing a recovery with Nazimuddin, Ehsanul Haque and Faisal Hossain all hitting half-centuries.

But with the three batsmen failing to left-arm Sunny, who had figures of 5-68, the Chittagong innings lost its way. They were eventually bowled out for 289, trailing by 211 runs.

The second innings also got off to a disastrous start with Elias Sunny and nightwatchman Tareq Aziz both falling to Mahbubul Alam in 2.4 overs of play.

KHULNA-BARISAL

Barisal left-arm spinner Tariqul Islam did not add to his eight wickets as his namesake and seamer Kazi Tariqul Islam took the two remaining Khulna wickets in the first innings.

Wimbledon banishes pay gap

Wimbledon chiefs announced Thursday that they will pay men and women equal prize money for the first time at the prestigious tennis championships this year.

The decision overturns more than a century of deliberate inequality in pay and brings the tournament more into line with the other three annual grand slam tennis events.

"We will be paying equal prize money this year at Wimbledon, through all the rounds in both singles and doubles," said Tim Phillips, the chairman of the All England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club, which runs Wimbledon.

He said the club's committee unanimously agreed that "the time is right to bring this subject to a logical conclusion and eliminate the difference."

Phillips said that social and marketing factors had made Wimbledon chiefs decide to do a U-turn to end the anomaly and hoped it would send out a positive message about tennis to young sports-women.

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Down The World Cup Lane

1975: The Beginning

The very first World Cup has a lot in common with 20/20 cricket; only after the format was a success in England did it actually take the world by storm. Only after they (one-day cricket and 20/20) were proven to be domestic success in England did they really gain international acceptance. The upcoming 20/20 World Cup only serves to prove the case. By the time the first World Cup started there had only been a total 18 ODIs played around the world, but the one-day game was already a proven success in England with the ever popular Gillette Cup. To the sceptics and the purists, this new format was not be taken seriously, the players on the other hand had different thoughts. To say it was evenly contested would not be entirely correct, there were a few one-sided games, but it sure was eagerly contested.

The format was simple and uncomplicated there would be two qualifying groups of four, playing each other once in 60-over matches; top two in each

group would progress to the semifinal. The whole tournament would entail 15 matches and was to be played over exactly two weeks. The move to hold the event in the middle of June was questioned but the main view for this reasoning was the longer period of daylight in England in June when 60 overs for each side could be completed in one day.

Group A consisted of England, New Zealand, India and East Africa, while group B was West Indies, Australia, Pakistan and Sri Lanka. While there were no major complaints with the groupings, the ICC did take it upon themselves to include two the minnows Sri Lanka and East Africa into the tournament. Sri Lanka was just emerging as a cricketing nation while the East African team was combination of a club cricketers from Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda and Zambia. Africa's strongest team, South Africa, had placed itself beyond the pale of international sport with its policy of racial exclusion and Rhodesia, later to become Zimbabwe, was still governed by the illegal Ian Smith regime. So it was left to the laugh-

able combination of East Africa to represent the continent. Comprised of weekend club cricketers never before exposed to such international standards, they were duly outclassed.

On the 7th of June 1975 the fun started, as England took on India, Australia faced Pakistan, New Zealand and the West Indies played the minnows East Africa and Sri Lanka respectively. Dennis Amiss was in fine form and was excellently supported by Keith Fletcher as England ran up the highest score in the country for a 60-over match. Both sides relied almost totally on seam bowlers which meant that India left out Bishen Bedi, a decision they would come to rue after going for more than 5.5 runs per over. Timing the ball perfectly, Amiss made his 137 out of 245 by the 51st over. The runs flowed so freely that finally Chris Old (two 6's and four 4's) helped himself to 51 off 28 balls in thirty-five minutes. One-day cricket was off to a great start and so was the World Cup. But apparently it only lasted one innings as India, in turn, put

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Pakistan up against the F-factor

Fitness and fielding hold the key if Pakistan want to turn their huge potential into success in the World Cup in the Caribbean.

Pakistan have had a dismal build-up to their Cup campaign as question marks hang on the fitness of key bowlers Shoaib Akhtar, Mohammad Asif and Umar Gul, with fears that none could feature.

"The F-factor is crucial, the fitness of the players is concerning," said coach Bob Woolmer.

"Our attack could be excellent with Akhtar, Gul, Asif and Abdul Razzaq with Danish Kaneria, Shoaib Malik and Mohammed Asif as back-up bowlers."

"There is no doubt in my mind if the first three were fit together then

Pakistan would be a real force."

Akhtar is battling with a knee injury while Asif may have a recurrence of an elbow problem.

Captain Inzamamul Haq, who was one of the flops of the last World Cup with just 19 runs in six matches, said gruelling schedules had taken their toll on the players.

"Even a batsman like me finds it hard to keep the level of fitness, so it is worse for the fast bowlers. We need to have the best and fittest players for the World Cup," said Inzamam, a member of Pakistan's only side to win the World Cup in Australia in 1992.

Without Akhtar, Pakistan struggled on their pre-World Cup tour of South Africa where they lost the Tests 2-1 and one-day series 3-1.

They showed their usual flaws of either failing to retain their intensity or succumbing to self-destructive frenzies -- both of which Woolmer hopes will not haunt them in the Caribbean.
