On the occasion, various programmes will be held in the ORBIS headquarters in New York City.

NY City Mayor Michael R Bloomberg has proclaimed the day as 'ORBIS Day'.

Throughout this month, ORBIS hopes to make more people aware that 75 percent of 37 million blind people can be cured.

As part of the celebrations, ORBIS will host a reception for government and business leaders. The world-famous tower lights of the Empire State Building will be turned off for 28 minutes today to remember the 28 million people around the world who are suffering from avoidable blindness.

ORBIS's blindness prevention activities in Bangladesh started in 1985 when the ORBIS Flying Eye Hospital first visited Dhaka. Since then, Flying Eye Hospital has visited Bangladesh eight times to conduct sight-saving operations and share modern eye care techniques with local doctors and other eye care professionals.

**Dismissal of 34  
RDA employees  
stayed**

A court yesterday stayed the dismissal order of 34 employees of Rajshahi Development Authority (RDA).

A senior assistant judge's court issued the order for an interim period following a petition by the dismissed employees.

The court earlier issued a show cause notice and asked RDA Chairman Tapan Chandra Majumder and Chief Executive Officer Akhtaruzzaman to reply within five days as to why the dismissal order will not be declared illegal.

Muhammad Yahia, lawyer of the employees, said the RDA authorities dismissed the 34 employees on February 20 violating rules.

One of the plaintiffs, work assistant Majibar Rahman, said RDA recruited 13 employees in violation of a court order and on political consideration in January.


"Appointment of fresh employees is illegal before confirming jobs of the 34 who have been working for, on an average, 12 years on master roll as per rules", he said.

**Ctg-Barisal Coastal  
Service of BIWTC  
resumes after 7 yrs**

The Chittagong-Barisal Coastal Service of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Corporation (BITWC) resumed its operation again after being suspended for seven years, says a BIWTC press release.

The ship will start from Chittagong Sadar Ghat every Monday at 9:00am and will arrive at Barisal at 5:00am on Tuesday via Sandip and Hatia. It will again sail from Barisal at 8:00pm the same day and will arrive at Chittagong BIWTC ship ghat on Wednesday at 5:00pm for the greater interest of the people of the southern region.

The service was disrupted following an accident of MV Alauddin Ahmed ship on December 19, 2005 as well as shortage of ships, the press release added.

Reuters reporter & producer has mentioned in her report that Shykh's TV programme greatly contributed in changing the fate of 100 million people of Bangladesh and he has already become a household name.
