

Patients with cold related diseases crowd hospitals

Public and private hospitals in the city have been grappling with a huge rush of children suffering from pneumonia and bronchiolitis for the last couple of weeks.

Physicians at the hospitals said they are having trouble treating patients with respiratory tract infections, as the number this year is much higher than those in the last few years.

They added that no official survey has yet been conducted though the cold-related diseases broke out around three weeks ago after a sudden change in weather.

According to the hospital records, almost 60 percent of the child patients admitted to Dhaka Shishu Hospital, Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH), Mitford Hospital, Suhrawardy Hospital,

Institute of Child Health (ICH) and Shishu Hospital at Mirpur have been suffering from severe cold and respiratory infections.

"Two-thirds of the total patients at our hospital are down with cold-related diseases," Dr NK Ghosh, a junior consultant at ICH and Shishu Hospital, said yesterday.

He said 400 patients a day on average take outdoor treatment at the private hospital.

The children's wards at the public hospitals are already filled to capacity and doctors said they have no option but to refuse many sick children every day.

Doctors at the DMCH and Dhaka Shishu Hospital do not give proper attention to the outdoor patients, alleged their relatives.

Sumi Begum of Islambagh said doctor has prescribed three medicines for her four-year-old son without even having a glimpse at the

patient. A doctor of paediatrics at the DMCH admitted that they do not have enough time to enquire about the problems of a patient due mainly to the influx of the infants and young children.

At the Dhaka Shishu Hospital yesterday, a doctor on duty said, "We are struggling to attend every patient."

"When we release someone, the bed fills up in no time," said a doctor at the Dhaka Shishu Hospital that can accommodate 481 child patients. He added that they give priority to those with worsening condition.

People were standing in long queues in front of the Dhaka Shishu Hospital yesterday, seeking treatment of their dear ones.

The DMCH register shows that a doctor has to attend 80 patients on average during the office hours

Hasina asks govt not to delay election

Awami League (AL) President Sheikh Hasina yesterday asked the interim government not to deprive the people of their democratic rights to vote by procrastinating in the name of reforms.

The AL chief also urged the government to hold the election so that the people are able to elect a government of their choice.

"People want to exercise their democratic and constitutional rights of franchise to have an elected government that will fulfil their aspiration. So, let the aspiration of the people be fulfilled as they had waged movements against the BNP-Jamaat coalition government for a free and fair election," said Hasina.

The AL president made the remarks at a view exchange meeting with the members of Awami Chalochchitra (film) League at her Dhanmondi office in the capital.

Saying that the present interim government is the result of the

Babul's bail petition rejected

A Dhaka court yesterday rejected a bail petition of detained Jamuna Group Chairman Nurul Islam Babul in a case filed against him for anti-state activities and illegally possessing public and private properties.

Judge (In-charge) Mohammad Nazrul Islam of the Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court passed the order following a criminal appeal by Babul's lawyers against a rejection order of the lower court on February 23.

In his order, the judge said the charges brought against Babul were primarily found to be true.

Police arrested Babul soon after he came out of the Anti-corruption Commission (ACC) office on February 22 after submitting wealth statement.

Later he was sent to Dhaka Central Jail with one-month

Kamal Majumder's detention valid as SC stays HC order

The Supreme Court (SC) yesterday stayed for five days the operation of the High Court (HC) verdict that declared illegal the detention of former Awami League lawmaker Kamal Ahmed Majumder and three others.

A four-member full bench of the Appellate Division, headed by Chief Justice (CJ) Syed JR Mudassir Husain, on his last day in office pronounced the order. Although the CJ issued the order, he said the hearing on the matter will resume on Monday.

The stay order, which was issued halfway the hearing upon a government petition, triggered resentments among the lawyers present in the court.

At one stage, former law minister Moudud Ahmed, counsel for one of the four detainees, left the court room in protest.

On February 26, a High Court bench declared illegal the

innocent people are not harassed by the law and it is not misused," he told the press.

"Under this ordinance, there will be no option of detaining anyone without trial. Since we want to conduct speedy trials under this law, we do not want delays through preventive detention as terrorism is a serious crime," Mainul added.

"Those who will investigate such cases under this law will have to take the matter with utmost seriousness," he pointed out.

The Anti-terrorism Ordinance 2007 will define terrorists, terrorist acts, and terrorist organisations and prescribe punishments including the death sentence and life imprisonment.

Under this ordinance, special tribunals will be set up to complete the trials within six months.

Those who finance terrorist groups will also be tried under this

Outlaw killed in 'shootout'

An underground operative was killed in an encounter with Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) members in the town early yesterday.

Identity of the dead could not be known.

Acting on a tip off, Rab men raided the Paka Masjid area where some outlaws were holding a meeting at about 5:00am. Sensing the presence of the Rab men, the outlaws opened fire, prompting the elite forces to retaliate.

Rab sources said an unidentified outlaw received bullets during the "shootout" and died instantly.

A revolver was recovered from the spot.

Increased power tariff comes into effect today

A five percent increase in electricity tariff for urban consumers comes into effect today.

According to a decision taken by the caretaker government on February 6, the five percent enhancement of power tariff will be effective only for the consumers living in urban areas and using over 100 units of power.

Power ministry officials said the tariff raise will cover only the Desa, Desco and PBD consumers.

At present, the tariff rate of electricity in rural areas is higher than in towns and cities.

Serbia makes new arrests for Kosovo killings

Serbia has arrested four suspects in the killing in 1999 of three jailed U.S.-Albanian brothers who had joined a guerrilla war in the breakaway Kosovo province. Serbia's war crimes prosecutor said yesterday.

Belgrade media reported that five former or serving Serb policemen were arrested on Sunday, including a police colonel serving as deputy commander of the gendarmerie.

A spokesman for the war crimes prosecutor declined to confirm whether the suspects were policemen.

"The four will be handed over to the investigating judge today," he said.

Two former Serb policemen went on trial in Belgrade in November charged as co-perpetrators in the murder of Argon, Mehmet and Ilaj Bytyci, ethnic Albanian brothers with US citizenship.

We gave them three days as sought by the university authorities to evacuate the space," Magistrate ASM Emdadul Dastagir, who led the team, said.

Reduced ISD call charges for 30 countries from today

Bangladesh Telegraph and Telephone Board (BTTB) will reduce call charges for land and fixed phones and also mobile phones under its economy ISD call charge facilities with 30 countries from today.

As part of the facilities, the BTTB call charges with code '012' through any land or fixed phones and mobile phones with 14 countries will be Tk 7.50 per minute, an official press release said.

The countries are Bahama, Bermuda, Costa Rica, Cyprus, Gabon, Guam, Macao, Malawi, Cyprian (American Island State), San Marino, US Virgin Island, Uzbekistan, Vatican and Puerto Rico.

US shifts policy to join Iran, Syria in Iraq talks

In a potential policy shift, the United States said Tuesday it would join a conference with Iraq's neighbours which could see senior US officials hold direct talks with foes Iran and Syria.

President George W. Bush's administration previously had rebuffed calls from Congress, regional allies and the independent Iraq Study Group last year for a regional forum and discussions with its two arch foes on stabilising chaotic Iraq.

Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice said a landmark conference, expected in early April, will follow lower-level talks with regional

powers plus the five permanent members of the United Nations Security Council in Baghdad in March.

State Department spokesman Sean McCormack insisted there had been no change in US policy towards Iran, but repeatedly refused to rule out direct talks with the Iranians on the sidelines of the regional talks.

A senior State Department official added: "I'm not going to lead you to a foregone conclusion that there's going to be such a discussion; I'm also not going to exclude that there's going to be such a discussion."

Iraqi officials said the first gathering, in March, would focus on ending

sectarian violence and foreign support for rival militia and insurgents.

It will involve ambassadors and other envoys from Iran, Jordan, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, Syria and Turkey as well as Egypt, Bahrain, the Arab League and the Organization of the Islamic Conference plus the five UN Security Council powers -- Britain, China, France, Russia and the United States.

"This initial meeting will be followed, perhaps as early as the first half of April, by a ministerial level meeting with the same invitees, plus the G8," Rice told the Senate Appropriations Committee.

Car bomb kills 10 in Baghdad market

A car bomb killed 10 people and wounded 21 near a vegetable market in Baghdad yesterday, Iraqi police said, as insurgents kept up a campaign of bombings despite a security crackdown backed by US reinforcements.

President Bush is sending officials to join US and British envoys at a meeting in Baghdad next month.

The United States said it would attend, opening the way to a dialogue that critics have long demanded.

In the latest bomb attack on Wednesday, police said a car bomb exploded on a commercial street in the Bayaa neighborhood of the Iraqi capital, killing 10 people.

US military spokesman Rear Admiral Mark Fox said on Wednesday there were "encouraging signs" in the security report, notably a decrease in sectarian violence that was killing hundreds of people a week.

As part of efforts to stabilize Iraq, Foreign Minister Hoshyar Zebari said on Tuesday that Iran and Syria would be among regional states

"We're very early in the process," he told reporters.

Washington accuses Iran and Syria of fuelling the violence in Iraq and has spurned suggestions -- including in the December report of a high-level Iraq Study Group -- that recommended reaching out to both to stabilize Iraq.

Washington brands both countries sponsors of terrorism and says Iranian elements have provided sophisticated roadside bombs used in Iraq. The United States accuses Syria of fanning strife by failing to control its border.

Zebari said an initial meeting in mid-March would be a chance for Western and regional powers to try and end the violence.

Ailing Castro breaks public silence Says he feels more energetic

In his first live broadcast since falling ill last July, Cuban leader Fidel Castro called Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez's daily radio talk show to say he was feeling "more energetic."

Castro, 80, handed power to his brother Raul Castro, 75, in late July as he recovered from what is described as gastrointestinal surgery.

The Cuban leader, who first took power in 1959, has since only been seen in official Cuban television and newspaper images, though he has met some few visitors in Havana.
