

Int'l community sees renaissance has taken place: Iftekhar

Foreign Affairs Adviser Dr Iftekhar Ahmed Chowdhury yesterday said the international community now perceives that a renaissance has taken place in Bangladesh where the people have taken up the control of their destiny.

"The international community is not only recognising steps being taken by the present Caretaker Government, but is profusely encouraging to move forward," he told the diplomatic correspondents at a press briefing on his return from a visit to New York.

In their opinion, he said Bangladesh would be considered a bright example among developing members of the United Nations if the government's various steps and principles are implemented "and there is no reason for us not to be that."

After meeting UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon, Deputy

## TITAS GAS FIELD

# Remedial steps this week to plug leakage

Bangladesh Gas Field Company Ltd (BGFCL) plans to start remedial measures this week to stop the uncontrolled gas leakage from the country's biggest gas field Titas in Brahmanbaria sadar upazila.

There will be no involvement of any foreign experts in this operation though the BGFCL's fact finders last month strongly advocated in favour of having a world class expert to oversee the whole matter, considering the unknown risks involving this huge national asset.

Some experts warned that these measures could be very risky if done without any proper planning.

Sources said two local experts -- a retired Petrobangla official and a Buet teacher -- would oversee the job.

According to local people, the gas leakage started around four years back in small proportions. But after last year's rainy season, the leakage became alarming.

Local villagers and farmers have told The Daily Star that gas was leaking through more than 3,000 big holes, including some 30-foot diameter ones, in IRRI paddy fields, water bodies and the Titas river. Gas emitted through some holes is burning with high flames. Experts fear that such leakage can lead to a blowout anytime and wreak havoc in the locality and the country's energy system.

The BGFCL action will coincide with the formal inauguration of Bibiyana gas field (on March 8)," said Petrobangla sources.

"This has been planned this way so that execution of the remedial

action does not affect the gas supply situation."

At first the Titas field's well number-10 will be shut down, and Bangladeshi exploration company Bapex will conduct a "work over" of this well. "We have already mobilised the rig for the job," a source said.

This shutdown will reduce Titas' gas production by 15 million cubic feet a day (mmcf). Titas produces 400 mmcf using 15 wells while the country consumes more than 1,500 mmcf.

A top official pointed out that if the results of the work over of this well are not satisfactory, the BGFCL will work over wells number 8 and 9 afterwards. The whole job will be funded by the BGFCL.

The work over is planned as per

## JP wants polls after reforms

HM Ershad-led Jatiya Party (JP) yesterday at a meeting with the chief election commissioner (CEC) demanded holding the ninth parliamentary election after completion of electoral reforms.

"We want a free, fair and acceptable election. We are not in favour of giving a timeframe for holding the parliamentary election. We hope the Election Commission will hold the polls once it completes the reforms and preparation of a flawless voter list with identification cards," JP Chairman HM Ershad, who led the party's seven-member delegation, told reporters after the meeting.

The Awami League (AL) and BNP during separate meetings with the CEC have already demanded elections by June and July respectively.

The JP chairman however said they have confidence in the Election Commission (EC). "The commission should be given the required time to complete its preparation for the polls," Ershad said.

## DB takes over extortion case against Naser

The extortion case filed against Naser Rahman, a former lawmaker of BNP and son of former finance minister M Saifur Rahman was transferred to the Detective Branch (DB) of police yesterday.

Following handing over the case records to the DB, a team led by the new Investigation Officer Inspector Mujibul Haque of Sylhet DB is now interrogating the former lawmaker.

One of the 50 corruption suspects Naser was brought to Sylhet and produced before a magistrate's court on Sunday afternoon when he was taken on a 3-day remand.

He was arrested from his family house at Gulshan in the capital on February 3 night.

There are a number of allegations of corruption against the former lawmaker.

On February 17, contractor

## KAMAL MAJUMDER SC extends stay on HC order on detention

The Supreme Court (SC) yesterday extended its stay order by another week on the operation of the High Court (HC) verdict that had declared illegal the detention of former Awami League lawmaker Kamal Ahmed Majumder and three others.

A six-member bench of the Appellate Division, headed by Chief Justice M Ruhul Amin, gave the order upon a prayer by the government as it had not yet received the certified copy of the HC judgment for making grounds for filing leave to appeal.

The hearing on the stay will resume on March 12.

Court sources said the day's SC order do not bar the High Court from exercising its jurisdiction to dispose of the pending individual habeas corpus petitions under

# Criminal gang identified, suspected killer held

The law enforcers arrested a suspected killer in the murder of two Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) personnel from Sherpur yesterday and said that they have also identified the gang responsible for the killing.

The detained was identified as Mostak, a professional killer.

Meanwhile, the investigators said that the local criminal operatives shot dead Rab Deputy Assistant Director Humayun Kabir and Constable Phool Mia in Aminbazar on Saturday to avenge the killing of their accomplices and run their drug peddling smoothly.

Three sons of the owner of TCB brickfield, where the two Rab personnel were killed, were involved in the murder, said a man arrested

from Bardeshi village in the area on Sunday.

One of them, Faisal, 24, was placed on a five-day remand yesterday by a Dhaka court along with his father, owner of TCB brickfield Tajul Islam alias Tara Mia, 58, and manager of the brickfield Mohsin, 52.

Sources said Faisal called Kabir over his cellphone before their murder at around 3:30pm Saturday. His phone number was found on Kabir's cellphone call register, they added. Rab personnel arrested Faisal and his father during the operation after the killing on Saturday, while the manager Mohsin was held on Sunday.

Seven of the 26 people, who were detained in the same operation, told the investigators that they had witnessed the incident, sources

said. According to them, six people took part in the killing while around six others were backing them up.

Salah, detained from Bardeshi village, disclosed names of six killers, an officer of Savar Police Station said.

They include -- top listed local criminal Anwar Hossain Anu alias Anar, Abu Saleh and sons of TCB brickfield owner Faisal, Karim and Fahim. However, it could not be confirmed whether this Abu Saleh is the same person arrested from Bardeshi.

Inspector Akhteruzzaman of Detective Branch produced Tara Mia, Faisal and Mohsin before a first class magistrate's court in

Joint forces detain Dinajpur journo

The joint forces yesterday arrested Dinajpur bureau chief of the daily Inqilab and a Juba Dal leader in Satkhira and recovered 340 corrugated iron (CI) sheets meant for relief from the houses of local BNP and Jamaat-e-Islami leaders.

Police and Rapid Action Battalion arrested 1,442 people including 793 wanted criminals, 25 convicts and four accused under Arms Act in 24 hours ending at 6:00am yesterday, home ministry sources said.

Members of the armed forces arrested 47 people including 19 criminals during the same period.

In Dinajpur, law enforcers

arrested Mahfuzul Haque Anar, bureau chief of the Inqilab from his office at Jail More yesterday morning.

There are allegations of massive corruption, abuse of power and tender manipulation against him.

He was sent to jail with one month's detention.

In Satkhira, the joint forces on Sunday night arrested local Juba Dal leader Nazrul Islam, who is also a top listed criminal in the area and a close associate of former BNP MP Habibul Islam Habib, from Kazirhat Bazar in Kaloroa upazila.

Accused in at least 13 cases, he faces charges for robbery, extortion, mugging, land grabbing and

Appreciating the micro-finance movement of Prof Yunus in alleviating poverty, the Pakistan president said, "It's your invention; you have changed the destiny of the people and the whole world recognised your endeavour."



## 28 die in Baghdad suicide bombing

A suicide car bomber struck a busy commercial district Monday, killing at least 28 people and injuring more than 50, police said.

The attack near the well-known Mutanabi book market in central Baghdad was the first major blast in the city in several days sending a huge pillar of black smoke as flames spread to shops, cars and book stalls.

The death toll from police was preliminary and could rise. At least 54 people were injured. The commercial zone is mixed between Sunni and Shia-owned businesses and shoppers.

"Papers from the book market were floating through the air like leaflets dropped from a plane," said Naeem al-Daraji, a Health Ministry worker who was driving about 200 yards from the blast and was slightly

injured by broken glass from his car window.

"Pieces of flesh and the remains of books were scattered everywhere," he said.

People began driving the injured to hospitals in private cars without waiting for ambulances to arrive.

Sporadic car bombs and attacks have hit the capital in recent days, but none with mass casualties since a blast Friday killed at least 10 people.

In other violence, gunmen opened fire on Shia pilgrims in two separate incidents around Baghdad on Monday, killing five people, police said.

On Sunday, US and Iraqi troops poured into Baghdad's main Shia militia stronghold, encountering no resistance in the one-time Sadr City combat zones but testing the
