Liam offered kidney to father

England paceman Liam Plunkett offered to put his promising international career in jeopardy by donating one of his kidneys to his sick father, the pair said Sunday.

But the 21-year-old Durham seamer's father, Alan, who suffers from a hereditary kidney disorder, turned him down, believing it would adversely affect his cricketing hopes.

The former chemical technician from Middlesbrough, north-east England, said the offer came after his health worsened and doctors said he needed either renal dialysis or a transplant.

Neither of his two brothers or sister were compatible as they all had the same condition, polycystic kidney disease.

"The only person in my family who could give me a kidney is Liam," the 49-year-old was quoted as saying by the weekly Sunday Sun regional newspaper in north-east England.

"As soon as he found out he offered me one straight away without any consideration whatsoever about his career. All he was worried about was me and my health and he simply said, 'take one of mine'.

"You could not do anything more for a parent but I said, 'thanks but no thanks'. It was an amazing thing to do but I could not accept because I'd be worried it would affect his cricket career.

"It could have set him back a long way but he was not concerned about that at all."

NSC begins reform

With a bid to reform the politicised sports bodies, the National Sports Council (NSC) has decided to abolish the executive committees of three divisional sports associations including Dhaka and 22 district sports associations (DSA).

The NSC was expected to dispatch the directive to the respective division and district administrators' offices from yesterday.

The axe would fall on the committees – elected or ad-hoc – which have already past their terms. The NSC will also ask the respective administrators to take steps to solve the committees fighting legal battles.

"Yes, we are sending directives to those associations whose terms have expired. There are elected bodies in the list that have been in seat long after their term. Also, ad-hoc committees that have failed to hold elections within the 90-day deadline, would be dissolved," NSC secretary Aminul Islam Khan told The Daily Star.

"We are also going to ask the respective administrators to solve the cases as soon as possible to make way for a new body," he said adding that the NSC will see that real sports organisers come to the party this time.

It was learned that the NSC is also looking forward to ban one person from being part of two major sports bodies. Currently, five DSA general secretaries are holding the

same position at national sports federations.

"I think it is difficult for a person to give equal attention to two bodies. Both organisations suffer as a process and it should be changed," opined Aminul.

It can be mentioned that Sports Adviser Tapan Chowdhury is instituting the reforms.

The DSA committees to be disbanded are Dhaka, Narayanganj, Comilla, Rangamati, Khagrachhari, Sylhet, Habiganj, Bhola, Bogra (elected), Mymensingh, Narshingdi, Munshiganj, Bandarban, Sunamganj, Barisal and Sirajganj (ad-hoc). The DSAs facing legal battles are Netrokona, Madaripur, Jessore, Meherpur, Pirojpur and Rangpur.

The divisional sports association committees facing the wrath of NSC are Dhaka, Sylhet and Khulna.

With elections looming ahead at different sports federations, the move would play a big role in NSC's latest target to bring sports organisers to the fore instead of politically motivated insertions.

It would be a blow for the 'District and Divisional Sports Organisers Forum' and its self-proclaimed leader Golam Rasul Molla, the general secretary of Dhaka divisional sports association who will lose his councillorships.

It is an open secret that he was the mastermind behind the 'election engineering' during the sports federations polls during the BNP regime.

Molla, who was expelled from the Bangladesh Amateur Athletics

Federation following a sex-scandal with an athlete, came to the scene to take control of the so-called Forum after the death of sports organiser Zafar Iman.

Allegedly, he sold the 'stock votes' of Forum to contenders as well as making negotiations to become the executive committee members of the two most important federations in the country, the Bangladesh Football Federation of which he is a member, and the Bangladesh Cricket Board, of which he is a vice-president.

The NSC has yet to receive any 'go ahead' signal from the Law Ministry about holding elections at different sports federations although a press report suggests that the clearance has been given. It was learned that the NSC has not received any official letter on the issue.

The election of the Bangladesh Olympic Association is due for March 15 but it could now be held in April after the Law Ministry clearance. This will make way for elections at all the federations.

Meanwhile, the NSC has withdrawn its employees from the Ramna Tennis Complex 'players' training hostel'. They had been residing at the hostel illegally under the wings of an NSC director but the NSC resolved the problem after the Bangladesh Tennis Federation general secretary lodged an official complaint last week.

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Lara likes slow going

West Indies skipper Brian Lara said Monday that he prefers his team to start the World Cup slowly, saving ammunition to ambush their rivals in the closing stages of the tournament.

Lara, one of a number of world-class players who will be taking part

in a last World Cup, is adamant that a cautious beginning to the seven-week event is key if West Indies are to break the curse of a host nation never having won the World Cup.

"We don't want to be one of the front-runners. We want to gradually get into our stride and surprise people coming to the end," said Lara.

"One of the most important things in the tournament is to pick up momentum. It is all about the team that picks up momentum that will carry us through, not the individual," he said, aware of the criticism often

aimed at his side that it is a one-man team.

Like many others here, Lara believes that Australia's travails, which have seen them lose back-to-back series against England and New Zealand, will only serve to make the defending champions stronger.

Only a fool, he says, would write them off.

"A lot of the Test-playing nations are quite competitive and it is very hard to say any one or two countries are going to control the World Cup and win it."

"Australia will definitely start favourites because of their statistics and how they have played over the past few years."

Even if Ricky Ponting's side remain the team to beat, Lara believes that the West Indies will be in the mix in the later stages.

"I think the team that I am in charge of, we have been to almost every finals that has been available to us," he said.

"Before the 2004 ICC Champions Trophy, we went to the triangular tournament in New Zealand and got to the finals. We won the ICC tournament and two years later in the triangular tournament with Australia and India we got to the finals."

"Then in the ICC Champions Trophy in India last year, we got to the final before losing out to Australia."

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
