

## Mum's pride

The mother of giant Bermudan spinner Dwayne Leverock has warned his World Cup rivals to stop making fun of her son's size.

Police constable Leverock weighs in at a huge 255 pounds (116kg) and found himself on the front pages of international newspapers last week when he took two wickets against England in a warm-up game.

But most editors concentrated on his girth rather than his spin.

The British tabloids, in particular, were merciless.

Headlines such as 'Bermuda Pie-angle', 'Lord Before Wicket' and 'Owzfat' greeted his display.

"They are more focusing on his size than his achievements. I have been angry about it," said Allison Leverock, the mother of the player nicknamed 'Sluggo'.

"Some of them have been very cruel. They had a reference to Eddie Murphy's Nutty Professor. I don't think that's necessary.

"People see his size now. They probably don't know he's worked hard to lose a lot of weight. He was over 300 pounds at one point. He knew he had to be in a better condition to compete at a better level.

"He doesn't eat a lot of food -- he picks. It's in his genes. He comes from a big family, both sides."

Mrs Leverock told the Royal Gazette in Bermuda that she had a theory why her son was able to snare the highly-prized English wickets of Kevin Pietersen and Paul Collingwood.

"I wonder if they said something to him?" she said.

"He's my hero. He was anyway. Now he's everyone's hero. I'm keeping all the papers for him and doing up a scrapbook."

Leverock, who will play in Bermuda's first ever World Cup game against 1996 champions Sri Lanka at the Queen's Park Oval

# Easy start for SL

If ace Sri Lankan spinner Muttiah Muralidaran sends down a 'doosra' in the opening World Cup Group B

match here on Thursday, many Bermudian batsmen will struggle to read it.

It is not surprising because even quality batsmen in the world have fallen prey to the 'doosra' ('the second one' in Hindi), a delivery which turns away from right-handers instead of coming in like a normal off-break.

And Bermuda are not to be blamed as they are making their debut on the biggest one-day stage, especially against a country which claimed the Cup in 1996 and boasts of more than one match-winner in their ranks.

A mismatch is predicted on a good Queen's Park Oval track here, but Bermuda hope to avoid an embarrassment by being competitive. Their recent form suggests that they will struggle to test the 1996 winners.

"We want to play good cricket and earn respect along the way," said Bermudian skipper Irving Romaine.

"The guys are here to play good cricket and to represent their country well. This is our first time at the World Cup and we are looking forward to every aspect of it."

Sri Lanka could not have asked for a better outing to begin their campaign and adjust to the conditions before taking on Test-playing nations India and Bangladesh in the remaining two games.

The top two sides will make it to the next Super Eight stage.

Sri Lanka skipper Mahela Jayawardene has already said his team's chances in the event will depend on how quickly they adjust to the conditions in the Caribbean.

"Playing in the sub-continent or away is not a big factor. It's a matter of peaking at the right time," said the Sri Lankan captain.

"Our prospects in the World Cup will depend on the team getting used to the conditions."

Sri Lanka have attractive stroke-makers in veteran Sanath Jayasuriya, Upul Tharanga, Jayawardene, Kumar Sangakkara and Marvan Atapattu, who are likely to feast on an inexperienced Bermudian attack.

The Bermudian batsmen also will not find the going easy against left-arm seamer Chaminda Vaas and Muralidaran, who are proven match-winners.

Coached by former West Indies batsman Gus Logie, Bermuda bagged the wooden spoon at the World Cricket League in Kenya recently when they won just one of their five matches.

Their form in the World Cup warm-up games was hardly encouraging as they lost to both England and Zimbabwe.

Bermuda have just one professional cricketer in batsman David

Hemp who has represented English county Warwickshire and now leads Glamorgan.

They have a tidy left-arm spinner in Dwayne Leverock, who may be carrying extra weight but is known for keeping batsmen silent. He will be tested against a big side for the first time.

The tiny island nation, located in the Northern Atlantic Ocean, gained a place in the World Cup two years ago by finishing fourth in the ICC (International Cricket Council) Trophy.

All the four Group B sides have arrived here and had workouts in bright sunshine on Tuesday.

group which also includes mighty West Indies and Pakistan.

But both need a win on Thursday if they are to have any hope of progressing in the tournament.

"If we can turn up, and bring our A-game to the park, especially against Zimbabwe, we think we have a chance there to win," said Ireland's Australian-born captain Trent Johnson ahead of the Sabina Park clash.

"We are entering this match

against Zimbabwe with a lot of confidence. We know we have a very tough group, but we have our plans in place, and we are looking to execute them."

Ireland, like Bermuda in Group B, are playing in the World Cup for the first time, and Johnson readily acknowledges that his side is the least recognised of the four in the section, but they want to make a big impact in the competition.

"West Indies are going to be difficult to beat on home soil and they have that extra bit of an incentive to do well," he said.

"Pakistan are a world-class team with world-class performers, and Zimbabwe are capable of causing an upset, but there is no reason why we cannot cause an upset of our own."

"If a bit of luck goes our way, and we execute our plans, I believe we

can make it to the next round."

Zimbabwe's captain Prosper Utseya says it will be a little difficult planning for Ireland, since television footage and other information about them is not readily available.

"We have been seeking some information about them, but we feel no pressure because we have nothing to lose, since we just have to play to our best," he said.

"We have been working very hard for the last two months before we came here."

"We have taken some positives out of our warm-up games, so I feel we are moving in the right direction, and we just need to take that momentum into the competition."

Utseya noted that Zimbabwe have the reputation of causing an upset or two in previous World
