

## NBR starts survey in city on Mar 29 to expand tax net

The National Board of Revenue (NBR) will launch a survey on March 29 to gather financial information about the Dhaka city dwellers, seeking to bring more people under the tax net.

It has already formed eight teams for the job. Each team will have three tax inspectors.

Similar surveys will be carried out down to the thana-level across the country. In the first phase, the teams will go from door to door in the capital and collect information about a person's income, assets and lifestyle in a prescribed form.

Business entities in the alleyways will also be surveyed.

Those who already have tax identification number (TIN) will not be subjected to the inspection.

The NBR, the central authority for tax administration, has taken up the programme to gauge the tax situation. Currently, the rate of collecting direct taxes is not

## Bangabandhu killer Mohiuddin held in US

Move on to bring back the condemned ex-major

AKM Mohiuddin Ahmed, condemned to death for killing Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and most of his family, was arrested in the United States Tuesday, report agencies.

He left the country soon after Awami League (AL) came to power in 1996. He was tried in absentia and two years later, along with some other ex-army personnel, was convicted of assassination of the country's founding father.

Led by Sheikh Hasina, one of Bangabandhu's two surviving daughters, the then government took measures for extradition of the killers, but could not finish the job during its tenure. The process to bring them back froze after the BNP-led four-party alliance

formed government in 2001. Officials of the US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) raided Mohiuddin's house in Los Angeles Tuesday morning and arrested him, AFP reports quoting an ICE statement.

Also sentenced to life for aiding and abetting the killing of the four national leaders on November 3, 1975, Major (retired) Mohiuddin went to the US on a visitor's visa and applied for permanent residence. But he was ordered to return to Bangladesh to face the criminal charges.

The immigration case dragged on for several years as he appealed a deportation order handed down by an immigration judge in 2002.

Late last month, a judge in the 9th US Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco allowed the order to stand.

"After the 9th Circuit denied his petition to review the case, (Ahmed)

## 7 private TV channels shut down

The government yesterday asked seven private television channels to immediately stop broadcasting for their alleged faulty inception.

An official order said the TV channels were airing their programme without permission and no objection certificate from the Ministry of Information.

The channels are STV US, Channel S, Rupashi Bangla, Falguni Music, TV 5, Bijoy TV and MyTV.

Operation of any television channel comes under the broadcasting policy laid down in the Rules of Business 1996, the order said.

As per schedule-1 of the Rules of Business 1996, the policy is under the authority of the Ministry of Information.

"So, it is compulsory to take permission from the Ministry of Information before up-linking any local TV channel or down-linking any foreign one in case of starting its broadcast," the order added.

## Licences available in lightning fast speed

Ten private satellite television channels, all owned or backed by leading BNP figures including former ministers, received their licences at lightning speed during the last BNP-led government's rule, taking advantage of weak government regulations.

The events were in marked contrast to the long and arduous procedure applicants such as Channel i and Ekushey Television (ETV) had to undergo before the BNP-led coalition came to power.

Sources said buyers are now scrambling to purchase these potentially highly profitable channels that were opened during the last BNP-led coalition government, while at least another 80 applica-

tions for TV licences are languishing at the information ministry.

Mosaddak Ali Fahu, the now arrested former Prime Minister's private secretary and former Dhaka MP, initiated the process when he applied and received the broadcasting licence of ntv within 18 days from the information ministry in 2004, sources say. Fahu also partly owns and is the chairman of another private satellite television channel, Rtv.

Channel 1, partly owned and run by Tarique Rahman's close aide Giasuddin Al Mamun, applied and received its private satellite television licence from the information ministry within 26 days in 2005, sources add.

More startling is that three channels - Channel 1, Bangla Vision and

Baishakhi - all with links to the BNP received their licences on the same day: January 31, 2005. They were also allocated their broadcasting frequency from Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission (BTRC) within a week.

Four other BNP linked channels that received licences have yet to start broadcasting. They are Focus TV, headed by the son of the now arrested former Parliamentary Adviser to the outgoing Prime Minister Khaleda Zia, Salauddin Quader Chowdhury. Desh TV, owned by former government secretary and BNP MP Mushfiqur Rahman. Islamic TV owned by Khaleda Zia's younger brother and former MP Major (ret'd) Sayeed Iskandar. SNTV, owned by the now

## CA kicks off car rally for Saarc tourism

Chief Adviser (CA) Fakhruddin Ahmed yesterday called for intensifying Saarc efforts to promote the South Asia region as a common tourist hub.

"South Asia has a rich history... it has been a melting pot of diverse cultures since time immemorial. We are home to all of the world's great religions... Saarc should increase its efforts to promote the region as a common tourist destination," he said while opening the Saarc Car Rally-2007.

The chief adviser said the car rally is taking place at an important juncture of our progress towards deeper regional integration.

The last Saarc summit in Dhaka had resolved that the third decade

of Saarc would be one of implementation, he said. "Our decision should, therefore, touch the lives of our peoples and bring about visible changes all around."

The CA said he believes the car rally will provide impetus to implementing earlier decisions taken on intra-regional growth of tourism.

He said the South Asian leaders over the years had tried to promote people-to-people contact by facilitating travel between the countries of the region. Other similar initiatives by Saarc have included exchanges in the fields of culture, sports and fostering linkages between the professional bodies.

The CA said the Saarc leaders had also declared 2006 to be South Asia Tourism Year and the car rally

## 53 Indian cops die in Maoist attack

Maoist rebels in central India have killed 53 policemen in one of the worst ever attacks of their 40-year-old insurgency, officials said yesterday.

A large group of rebels hurled grenades, petrol bombs and fired indiscriminately at a jungle security post in Rani Bodli village in Chhattisgarh state, one of several parts of the country in the grip of a left-wing rebellion.

"Thirty-seven special police officers and 16 personnel of state police died in the attack," Chhattisgarh Chief Minister Raman Singh told AFP.

The attack is "one of the worst" carried out by the insurgents, said

Kanwar Pal Singh Gill, who was appointed security advisor to Chhattisgarh state government last April. Some local media reported the toll as high as 60.

Maoist rebels say they are fighting for the rights of neglected tribes and landless farmers. Tens of thousands of people have been displaced in Chhattisgarh and are now living in tent shelters as Indian counter-insurgency forces operate in the countryside.

The rebels, who launched their armed campaign in 1967, also operate in another 14 of India's 29 states. New Delhi refuses to negotiate with them.

"I will be visiting the area this evening for an on-the-spot

Sources said the joint forces cordoned the area around 12 midnight and conducted the hour-long raid.

## Storing time fixed for nine essential goods

Govt finalises policy on hoarding

An inter-ministerial meeting yesterday finalised a proposal defining hoarding and setting storing time for nine essential goods at the levels of import, wholesale and retailing.

The government will issue administrative orders by March 20 in this regard, meeting sources said.

The meeting held at the commerce ministry was chaired by Additional Commerce Secretary Golam Mostakim and attended by representatives of home, law and food ministries, the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI) and other trading agencies.

The essentials for which the storing time is set, are -- paddy, rice, wheat, lentil, sugar, edible oil, onion, milk powder and baby foods.

In case of onion, the time limit for storing for the importers is 45 days, for the wholesaler 30 days and for the retailers 15 days. The other eight items can be stocked three months for import level, two months for wholesale and one month for retailing.

Under the new rules, there will be no restriction on amount of goods to be imported and stored, the meeting sources said.

Although the same inter-ministerial committee earlier suggested setting specific quantity
