

## Tk18 lakh seized from courier services in Sylhet

Members of joint forces in Sylhet seized Tk 18,04,225 in cash and other materials from three courier services in the city yesterday.

Tk 15,13,681 were seized from SA Paribahan, Tk 2,31544 from Sundarban Courier Service and Tk 59,000 from Continental Courier service.

Besides, 25 cartons of Benson (Foreign) cigarettes, 18 cellphone sets and several packs of chemicals were seized from the Bangladesh Courier & Parcel service.

Besides, Some porn CDs, contraband medicines and blank foils of tang power were also seized from the SA Paribahan.

The manager of Sundarban Courier service, one employee from Bangladesh Courier and three staffs of the SA Paribahan were also taken into custody for interrogation, sources said.

The struggle that began with the War of Liberation in 1971 is yet to be ended because of corruption, poverty and violation of human rights that are still prevailing in the country, freedom fighters and intellectuals said at a reception yesterday.
