

Outlaw, robber killed in 'shootouts'

An underground operative and a robber were killed during "shoot-outs" between their cohorts and Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) in Pabna and Bhola districts on Wednesday night and early yesterday.

The dead were identified as Ainal Haque, 35, an activist of outlawed Purbo Banglar Communist Party (PBCP-Lal Pataka), in Chatmoher upazila of Pabna, and Miraj, 30, of Joynagar village in Sadar upazila of Bhola.

According to our Pabna correspondent, a team of Rab-12 cordoned off Khotbari Primary School premise in Chatmoher upazila where Ainal and his accomplices were holding a meeting at around 10:00pm.

Sensing the presence of the Rab men, the outlaws opened fire on the law enforcers, prompting them to retaliate.

Rab sources said Ainal received bullets during the "shootout" and died instantly, while his accomplices managed to flee. He was an accused in seven cases including four for murder, the sources added.

Rab recovered a rifle, and two bullets from the spot.

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CG to give autonomy to BTV, Betar

Says information adviser

The interim government is going to award autonomy to state-run BTV and Bangladesh Betar to make them more competitive, educative and entertaining for the people at large, said information adviser Barrister Mainul Hossain yesterday.

The government would also explore various aspects of opening up terrestrial frequencies for private television channels, the adviser added.

"Success and future of BTV and Betar lie in freedom and autonomy similar to that of BBC [British Broadcasting Corporation]," Mainul said at a launching ceremony of final report on 'Media in development: Linkages between Socio-Economic Development and Diversified Media in Bangladesh' conducted by Bangladesh Enterprise Institute (BEI).

Farooq Sobhan, president of BEI, and Shahab Enam Khan, lecturer of Jahangirnagar University, prepared the report. The report said key constraint to the

growth of media landscape in Bangladesh is the regulatory policies set for the broadcast media.

The adviser in his speech further said although Bangladesh is currently under a "state of emergency", the government is keen to uphold the process of freedom of press for liberal broadcasting. "No abuse is more reprehensible than the abuse of the media freedom. At the same time, media personnel should also realise that no freedom can survive in the absence of responsible exercise of such freedom."

Speakers at the discussion session stressed the need for establishing a permanent and independent "National Broadcasting Commission" comprising key stakeholders to regulate the broadcast media while many suggested renaming the commission.

"The National Broadcasting Commission should be renamed and it should assert the freedom of all sorts of media," said Iqbal Sobhan Chowdhury, editor of The Bangladesh Observer.

Saiful Bari, chief adviser of ATN Bangla, said freedom must be enjoyed with responsibility and the media is no exception.

The discussants suggested that terrestrial broadcast frequencies should be licensed for private use to help generation of revenues for the government, maximum use of idle frequencies, maximum geographic access for both public and private sectors and ensuring access to the poor.

Amanullah Khan, chairman of United News of Bangladesh (UNB) Ltd, emphasised the need for a self-regulatory body to ensure independence of the media and said, "The ineffective Press Council should be replaced by 'Press Complaint Council'."

Shujauddin Ahmed, former director general of National Institute of Mass Communication (Nimco), emphasised a diversified media. "Indian viewers enjoy a diversified media, which resulted in the growth of numerous media

Local journo to boycott Nilphamari DC's news

Rocket misses UN chief in Baghdad

UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon was unharmed but ducked behind the podium after a rocket landed near Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki's office Thursday while the two men were speaking to reporters at a news conference.

Two Iraqi security guards on the grounds outside the building were slightly wounded, security officials said on condition of anonymity because they were not authorised to speak to reporters.

An Associate Press reporter ran outside and saw a crater one-meter (yard) in diameter about 50 meters (yards) from the building where the news conference was in progress. Two cars were damaged.

Al-Maliki security officials said it was a rocket attack. US helicopters were quickly in the air headed in the direction from which the rocket was fired.

Small chips of debris floated down from the ceiling above the UN chief after the big explosion rattled the building in the Green Zone. He looked frightened, casting his eyes right and left as he rose after ducking behind the podium where he was standing and answering questions next to the prime minister.

Al-Maliki said "nothing's wrong" as one of his security men started to grab the prime minister. The two men quickly resumed answering questions. The rocket landed as one of Ban's questions was being translated. They ended the question and answer session minutes later.

The sound of the weapon being fired - which sounded like a rocket launch - could be heard not far from The Associated Press office, which is across the Tigris River to the east of the Green Zone, which also houses the U.S. Embassy and Iraqi government offices.

100-yr-old elephant dies in fight with another

A century-old elephant died after a rare fight with another elephant in a Zaliyapalong forest in the district on Thursday.

After recovery of the male elephant's body, forest officials conducted an autopsy that suggested it died of injuries inflicted in a clash with another male elephant, district forest office sources said.

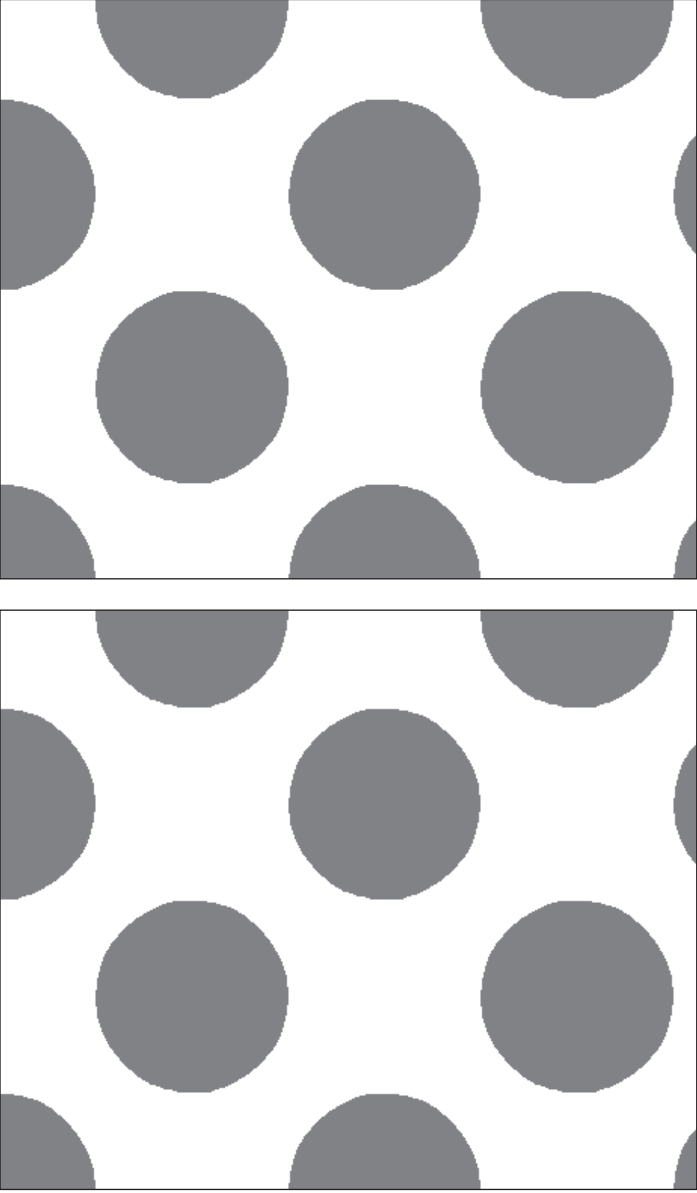
The two tusks, each weighing 15 kg, were chopped off from the dead elephant for preservation and the body has been buried, said Aboni Bhushon Tagore, Cox's Bazar district forest officer.

Forest officials are trying to identify the other elephant that might be injured too.

Elephants are usually peaceful animals and seldom fight within the herd, unless they run out of food or are attacked by others.

"We think the two elephants clashed for food, because the forest where the body was found had no soft plants or trees that elephants like," Tagore said.

With rising population and expanding human settlements, forests are shrinking and elephants in Chittagong Hill Tracts sometimes come to the human habitations.



Pakistan test fires N-capable missile

Pakistan successfully tested yesterday a nuclear-capable cruise missile with a range of 700 km (435 miles), the military said in a statement.

The Haff V11 Babur missile is a terrain-hugging, radar avoiding cruise missile capable of carrying a variety of warheads including nuclear, it said.

"The flight data collected validated the design parameters set for the flight test," the military said. "It is a highly manoeuvrable missile with pin-point accuracy."

NZ plunder Canada

New Zealand openers Stephen Fleming and Lou Vincent completed their half-centuries to have their side well-placed in their final Group C match of the World Cup at the Beausejour Stadium in St Lucia yesterday.

After being put in by John Davison, the Black Caps openers cashed in as their side piled on 266 for four in 40.4 overs.

Fleming found the going very easy against Henry Osinde plundering him for 16 runs in an over. The onslaught on Osinde included the pull over deep midwicket for 6, which has become a regular feature of Fleming's batting in this tournament. New Zealand raced to 99 in 15 overs.

Opener Lou Vincent had already toyed with Anderson Cummins in the previous over hitting him for a couple of boundaries one of them a cheeky stroke behind the wickets.

Cummins was replaced by Osinde but Vincent did not spare him too scoring a couple of easy boundaries through covers and mid-on.

Cummins gave some anxious moments to Vincent in the first over, beating him outside the off stump regularly. Then Cummins brought one back in and Vincent shouldered arms. There was a huge appeal but Vincent survived. The New Zealand opener decided he had enough and

to the first ball of the next over went down the wicket and smashed over cover for 6.

That apart, Cummins and Bhatti kept the New Zealanders quiet as they managed only 14 from the first 5 overs.

New Zealand have already booked their place in the Super 8s having beaten England and Kenya while Canada have lost both of their matches against Kenya and England.

Away in St Kitts, Scotland were bundled out for 136 in 34.1 overs.

The Netherlands had knocked over half the Scottish side even before 50 runs were put on the board.

Scotland's top order was lopped off in the first 15 overs as Tim de Leede got Ryan Watson out and the Scots were 40/5 when the last Power Play was taken.

Watson smashed one straight back to the bowler and De Leede caught it as much to in self-preservation as anything else.

Watson went for 16, having struck three 4s.

Earlier, Daan van Bunge bungled two easy slip catches and Scotland could have been in even deeper trouble than they actually were at the end of the 13th over.

Neil McCallum slashed a wide one from Billy Stelling and should have been caught at first slip.
