50 prisoners freed from Ctg jail

The government yesterday released 50 prisoners convicted of minor charges from Chittagong Central Jail on the occasion of the Independence and National Day.

Jail sources said four more prisoners would be freed today.

The jail authorities earlier recommended the names of 206 convicts to the higher authorities for their release. But the government allowed amnesty to 54 inmates in the first phase.

Jail Superintendent Bazlul Rashid told BSS that more listed inmates would be released in the second phase.

RU admission process ends with 80 seats vacant

The admission process of first year honours of Rajshahi University (RU) ended with 80 seats in different departments still vacant, as the authorities did not announce next waiting list for new intake.

University academic section office admitted the facts yesterday. The RU admission process for session 2006-07 began in January this year and admission date of first waiting list ended on March 11.

Three seats are vacant in the Islamic History and Culture, four in the History, three in English, one in

Language, three in Computer Science and Technology, two in Population Science, two in Economics, two in Social Work and two in Public Administration departments, sources in the university academic section said.

The sources said as admission process of many public universities are yet to complete, many students who enrolled in RU may migrate to other universities vacating more seats.

Students in the next waiting list yesterday urged the authorities for filling up of the vacant seats and announce fresh admission date.

Take steps to protect rivers from industrial wastes

Environmentalists tell workshop

Environmentalists at a workshop yesterday called for protecting the sources of surface water including rivers and other water bodies from pollution and encroachment to overcome the growing scarcity of water.

The workshop titled 'Bangladesh: Wastage and pollution of water' was organised by Bangladesh Paribesh Andolok (Bapa) at its central office in the city to mark the World Water Day.

The speakers said major surface water bodies, including the Buriganga, Shitalakha, Turag and Balu around the capital are virtually dead, posing a serious threat to the source of water supply for its residents, he added.

Stressing the need for reducing dependency on groundwater, he said surface water sources, including rivers and other water bodies, have to be protected from pollution.

They said Saidabad Water

Treatment Plant in the capital is now unable to treat water from the Shitalakha due to heavy pollution, and in future water has to be brought from the river Meghna which will be very costly.

"A major industrial growth has already posed serious challenges for maintaining environmental quality and sustaining infrastructural services, including water supply, sanitation, drainage and solid waste management," said former Dhaka WASA chief engineer Kazi Mohammad Sheesh while presenting a keynote paper.

He urged the industrialists to take necessary steps to check river pollution resulting from industrial wastes and illegal encroachments.

Mihir Biswas, member-secretary of Buriganga Bachao

Andolok, said dissolved oxygen level in the peripheral rivers including Buriganga and Shitalakha fell below one mg/l during the last seven dry months.

"All the major surface water bodies including Buriganga, Shitalakha, Turag and Balu around the capital are virtually dead, posing a serious threat to the source of water supply for its residents," he added.

Naizm Nahar said due to scarcity of pure drinking water and low sanitation coverage, about 110,000 children under five die of waterborne diseases, including

diarrhoea, every year in Bangladesh.

Engineer Emad Uddin Ahmed, executive director of the Institute of Water Modelling (IWM), said there is no coordination among the different departments concerned for proper water management, and the worsening situation of the rivers has been created due to lack of proper care.

Bapa General Secretary Mahidul Haq Khan said Dhaka will be the second largest mega-city of the world by 2015 with a population of 220.7 million.

"So action plan should be taken to meet the growing demand of water for urban population," he added.

Engineer Abdur Razzak and Academic Kazi Madina also took part in the workshop.

INDEPENDENCE DAY Some city roads made off-limits to traffic

Certain city roads have been made off-limits to traffic on the occasion of Independence Day on March 26.

All kinds of vehicles, except those of the invited guests, have been advised to use alternative roads avoiding the following roads for smooth traffic control near the National Parade Square as a five-hour parade will begin at 7:30am on the day, said a DMP press release.

The roads are from Khejuri Bagan crossing to Zia Udayan crossing and up to Mirpur-10 Gol Chakkar via Rokeya Sarani, and from Shaynoli Shishu Mela crossing to Rokeya Sarani via Agargaon Light crossing.

The roads also include Bijoy Sarani crossing to Zia Udayan crossing, Crescent Lake to Prothomnagar Bhavan and from Defence Ministry gap to Rokeya Sarani via Planning Commission.

As VIPs, VIPs and other invited guests would visit the National Memorial in Savar on the day, big vehicles like buses, minibuses, trucks and lorries have been asked to use alternative roads such as Dhaka Airport Road-Abdullahpur crossing and Ashulia road avoiding Ghatali Amin Bazar Bridge and Savar road from 5:00am to 7:30am.

Dhaka-bound vehicles, which use roads from Aricha to Amin Bazar, have been asked to enter the capital using the roads from Nabinagar Bazar to Ashulia.

Besides, the capital-bound vehicles using roads from Tangail to Ashulia have been advised to use roads from Kaliakoir-Gazipur crossing and Tongi to enter the capital.
