Salman denied bail

Former managing director (MD) of Oriental Bank Limited Chowdhury Koyes Sami was sent to the Dhaka Central jail as his petitions for bail were rejected after he surrendered before a Dhaka court yesterday in connection with embezzlement of Tk504 crore.

Judge Momin Ullah of the Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court passed the order when Sami along with his lawyers appeared before the court and sought bail.

On January 18 and 25, the Oriental Bank filed two criminal cases with Tejgaon and Kotwali police stations against Orion Group chief Obaidul Karim, Sami

## Bird flu found in Jamalpur farms

9,000 chickens already sold

Avian Influenza virus has been detected in three poultry farms in Jamalpur, senior officials of the Department of Livestock Services disclosed yesterday quoting a laboratory report.

## Poultry industry faces uncertainty

Leaders of World Poultry Science Association Bangladesh Branch (WPSA-BB) yesterday said the latest outbreak of the bird flu virus will hit hard the export potentials of the country's poultry products.

They feared an imminent disruption of the industry if the menace cannot be handled carefully.

"A few poultry growers had recently started exporting poultry products to some Middle Eastern countries, North Eastern region of India, and Nepal, and the present outbreak will hit hard this effort," said WPSA-BB Secretary General MA Saleque.

# Home takes up case for probe, quick disposal

The government has recognised the August 21 assassination attempt on Awami League (AL) chief Sheikh Hasina as a sensational case and registered it with the home ministry's monitoring cell for proper investigation and quick disposal.

Overlooked during the BNP-Jamaat-led alliance rule, the case of August 21, 2004 grenade attack on an AL rally was given due priority when it was listed at the monitoring cell last month.

The grisly attack, which killed 22 people including AL's women affairs secretary Ivy Rahman and

injured over 200, topped the list of 12 sensational cases the home ministry discussed at a meeting yesterday to review the progress of their investigation.

"We are working hard on these cases," Home Secretary Abdul Karim told reporters after the meeting.

During the four-party alliance's rule the investigators arrested some people on suspicion in connection with the August 21 grenade attack. One of the arrestees, petty criminal George Mia, gave a confessional statement before a court that underworld gang Seven-Star Group led by most wanted criminal Subrata Bain Shuvro carried out

the attack. However, inconsistency and contradictions in George Mia's statement dated June 26, 2005 "disclosing the plans and action of the August 21 grenade attacks" caused widespread scepticism.

The poorly woven story of George lacks rationality and has raised doubt about its accuracy. The statement does not mention who ordered the carnage and why, who brought the grenades and from where. George even knew the magistrate that he does not know the difference between grenades and bombs.

The validity of George's statement was seriously questioned

# Security beefed up fearing militant attack

The government has beefed up security all over the country in apprehension of bomb attacks by militants on the Independence Day.

A large number of police and members of various intelligence agencies were deployed yesterday at key installations across the country. The law enforcers are also conducting more strict body and vehicle searches at almost 300 temporary check posts set up around the capital.

"A threat was issued by JMB

[Jamaatul Mujahideen Bangladesh] on the occasion of the Independence Day. As such, we have taken foolproof measures to avert any incident," Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) Commissioner Naim Ahmed told the Daily Star last night.

He however said it was very common for countries all over the world to receive such threats ahead of their independence or national days.

Apart from 4,500 DMP members, members from intelligence agencies and Rapid Action

# Independence day today

The nation celebrates today the 36th Independence Day and National Day to pay tributes to the martyrs, who sacrificed their lives for independence.

On March 26, 1971, independence of Bangladesh was formally declared, leading to the Liberation War against the Pakistani occupation forces and resulting in the emergence of a sovereign state on the global map.

After the Pakistani forces brutally cracked down on the unarmed people of then East Pakistan on the night of March 25, 1971, the Bangalees fought for independence under the leadership of Bangabandhu and joined an all-out guerrilla war.

Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Rahman declared Bangladesh's independence at 00:30 hours on March 26 after the Pakistani crackdown, just an hour before he was taken prisoner from his Dhanmondi Road-32 residence.

People at large took up arms, Bangalee policemen and paramilitary men and army personnel defected and trained the people for war. They fought without proper food, shelter, training, or firearms. But it was the determination to free their motherland and the all-out support of the people that finally saw the birth of a nation nine months after March 26, 1971.

After many years of political and economic exploitation, the Bangalees' nationalist sentiments
