



## Mamun produced in court in arms case, remanded

Pistol found in his house


Giasuddin Al Mamun, controversial businessman and a close friend of Tarique Rahman who too is in detention now, was placed on a five-day remand in an arms case yesterday.

Police said they needed to have him remanded for at least seven days to "recover the huge cache of arms and ammunition that are in the possession of his cohorts".

In a first information report (FIR) to the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court, Dhaka, they said that they arrested him at 2:15am yesterday, raiding his house at Banani DOHS. During the raid carried out with the assistance of troops and other law enforcers, police seized a Spain-made .22 bore pistol and eight bullets.

Listed as a top graft suspect by the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC), Mamun was first taken to the Cantonment Police Station. Later in the afternoon, he was produced in the court.

DUBAI ACCIDENT

Biman aircraft beyond repair, officials say

The aircraft of Biman Bangladesh Airlines that had an accident at Dubai International Airport on March 12 is beyond repair, said a source at Biman.

"The Airbus is beyond economic repair [BER] and therefore it is abandoned," the Biman official said while talking to The Daily Star.

"Biman is yet to declare the Airbus abandoned officially as we are waiting for the report from the insurance company of the Airbus", said the official.

Biman would receive \$ 40 million from the insurance company as it is beyond BER, he said.

Meanwhile, the flight operations restrictions imposed on pilot and crew of the ill-fated Airbus have been withdrawn, said the source.

On March 12, the Dhaka-bound Biman Bangladesh aircraft suffered a wheel failure during takeoff and forced Dubai International Airport, the busiest in the Middle East, to suspend its operations for about eight hours.

Some 140 of its 236 passengers

Chicken, egg sales drop, prices fall

Broiler chicken and egg sales dropped by half in the city's kitchen markets due to bird flu panic among the customers, retailers and wholesalers have said.

They said customers fear to buy broilers and eggs though prices have come down by more than 30 percent.

Egg and fowl sales went down by over 50 percent though prices dipped 30 percent," Bangladesh Poultry Industries Association Vice-President Shah Habibul Haque told The Daily Star yesterday.

This correspondent found dull business related to chicken and eggs in different kitchen markets, fast food shops and alleyway restaurants in the city during a visit yesterday.

However, customers were found happy as prices of local chicken, mutton and beef remained steady.

## More chickens culled

Over 6,000 chickens were culled yesterday, around 4,000 at three poultry farms in Jamalpur and 2,110 chickens at a farm in Narayanganj, following confirmations and fears of bird flu infections at those farms. Meanwhile, 400 chickens died at a farm in Gazipur due to "unknown reasons".

Free-ranged chickens in one-kilometre radius of those farms will also be culled, livestock department sources said.

Earlier, around 40,000 chickens were culled at poultry farms in Gazipur and Savar, Dhaka after bird flu was detected there.

The livestock sources said they

could not cull any free-ranged chickens near the Gazipur and Savar farms yesterday due to feed shortages as they buy those chickens and kill them.

"Today, we do not have money to buy free-ranged chickens near the Gazipur farms. Hopefully we will start again tomorrow," said a high-ranking official working with the livestock department requesting anonymity.

Free-ranged chickens of different sizes, near the Gazipur farm where bird flu was detected, were bought at Tk 80, Tk 60 and Tk 15 on Sunday and killed.

Sources working with the livestock department said a team

Catch whoever did it."


Then he shrugs in a dejected way. "What could we do? We don't even have a motorcycle to race to the spots. This is the way the thugs are destroying our hills every night."

## LTTE bombs military base in first air raid

A Tamil Tiger light aircraft bombed a Sri Lankan air force base next to Colombo international airport before dawn yesterday, killing three airmen and wounding 16 in the first such air strike by the rebel
