## Bangladesh investor confce now May 10-11

The date of the first-ever international investor conference titled, "Bangladesh - The New Investment Frontier" has been shifted to May 10-11 this year and will be held at Dhaka Sheraton Hotel, says a press release.

Dhaka Stock Exchange, the country's oldest bourse, and Citigroup, the world's leading financial institution, are jointly organising the conference to showcase the country's capital markets and its investment potential.

Key sessions in this conference will include issues on Bangladesh's overall economic potential, the untapped capital market and the reforms in the last decade, current legal and governance frameworks, public and private foreign investment opportunities with special highlights on some sectors of interest like power, telecoms, textiles, pharmaceuticals and financial services.

## New low-cost Motorola set to hit market next month

A new low-cost cell phone set of Motorola Inc, the second largest global handset producer, will hit local market early next month, company officials announced yesterday in Dhaka.

The GSM version of the handset styled 'Motofone F3' is the thinnest ever set of the company, Robert Gagnon, managing director of Mobile Devices in Emerging Markets of Motorola, said at a launching function.

"Today's launch of Motofone in Bangladesh is another big step forward in Motorola's drive to connect the next billion mobile phone users," Gagnon said.

The key features of the set include large and high contrast screen and voice prompts in local languages.

Without mentioning the exact price of the handset in local market, officials said the cost of the set will be around US\$50 in the local market.

## Political will needed to reap benefits from trade deals in S Asia

### Seminar observes

A strong political determination is needed in Saarc nations to reap maximum benefits from economic agreements, speakers at a seminar said yesterday in Dhaka.

The speakers also urged the South Asian leaders to work on opening their skies and building a road, rail and river network in the region for greater economic benefits.

They were speaking at the seminar titled "Integration in Europe: Lessons for South Asia" at the Bangladesh Foreign Trade Institute (BFTI) conference room. The BFTI organised the seminar.

Sirajul Islam, secretary to the President's Office, said political mind-set is holding back the potential of free economy in the region. "We

should resolve our political problems first to gain economic benefit," he added.

Sirajul said Bangladesh and India have so many non-tariff barriers, which are contributing to a huge trade gap between the two countries.

"Unless the nations remove their non-tariff barriers, they cannot move forward for further economic openness," he added.

## New hopes in US-ROK trade talks

Hopes rose Thursday that South Korea and the United States can reach a free trade agreement before a weekend deadline despite persistent differences over farm trade.

The agriculture disputes are the biggest obstacle to an agreement which, according to some studies, could increase two-way

trade by 20 percent over last year's 74 billion dollar figure.

But South Korean analysts and officials are confident that talks can be concluded this week.

"The two countries are showing a strong will to strike a deal. So I believe the deal will be done," Lee Kyung-Tae, head of the Korea Institute for International Economic Policy, told a radio programme.

The deadline for agreement is 7:00 am Saturday Korean time, the last working day of the week in Washington.

A trade official told AFP on condition of anonymity: "There are growing hopes of a deal, although I cannot say definitely it will be concluded by the deadline."

Yonhap news agency said an announcement may come early Saturday.

## EU warns of 'looming risks' to eurozone growth

The economic outlook for the 13 countries sharing the euro faces "looming risks" from abroad, but the bloc should grow "robustly" at 2.4 percent this year, the European Commission said Thursday.

While sticking to the Commission's 2007 growth forecast, the head of the EU executive's economic department Klaus Regling said that "in the longer run, prospects could diminish due to some looming risks in the external environment."

Those risks include slower US

growth, a stronger euro, higher oil prices and a possibly messy unwinding of global imbalances in trade and capital flows, he said in the foreword of a quarterly review of the eurozone economy.

The recent global stock market rout highlighted growing "financial market uncertainties", Regling wrote, warning: "It is too early to tell whether this reflects a mere technical correction or the beginning of a more sustained period of weakness."

The note of caution comes after eurozone finance ministers broadly voiced optimism in their economic

outlook despite risks at a regular meeting on Monday in Brussels.

Meeting for the first time since the start of the major financial market correction at the end of February, the ministers concluded that the turbulence would not have an impact on growth in their combined economy.

The European Commission report said that risks to the eurozone's "favourable" economic outlook were "balanced" in the near term with unemployment at record lows and inflation tame.
