Sylhet mayor held on graft charges

The police arrested Sylhet City Corporation (SCC) Mayor Badruddin Ahmed Kamran at his residence in the city's Chharpur area early yesterday.

The same day the Sylhet Sadar Cognisance Court sent him to jail when he was produced before it at about 9:00am.

Kamran was held in a graft case filed in 2003. After arrest at around 6:00am, he was taken to the Kotwali Police Station. There, he protested his innocence and told the newsmen that the case against him was lodged out of political vengeance by the then BNP government.

"I will face the conspiracy in the court and hope to get back to the people soon," he added.

The police raided houses of 17 other accused in the same case on Thursday night but failed to capture any, an official said.

Earlier on Thursday, the District and Sessions Judge's Court, Sylhet issued a warrant for arrest of the SCC mayor in the case filed for alleged irregularities in leasing out a kitchen market.

Besides, it rejected the bail prayers of the accused and sent the case to the Divisional Special Judge's Court for trial. April 12 was set as the date for charge-framing and the accused to appear before the court.

Kamran is the second elected mayor to be arrested in the ongoing anti-graft drive. On similar charges, Chittagong Mayor ABM Mohiuddin Chowdhury was detained last month.

The Cognisance Magistrate's Court, Sylhet Sadar, sent the case dossier to the District Judge's Court after the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) on February 7 filed a charge sheet against 19 people in the graft case.

The trial scheduled to begin on March 27 was deferred till April 5 due to absence of the district judge.

Asia at risk of floods, drought and disease

Asia faces a heightened risk of flooding, severe water shortages, infectious disease and hunger from global warming this century, the UN's top climate panel said yesterday.

The region is confronted by a 90-percent likelihood that more than a billion of its people will be "adversely affected" by the impacts of global warming by the 2050s, the UN's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) said.

It estimates, in a major report unveiled in Brussels, say the magnitude of climate-change effects will vary according to the size of the world's population, energy use and

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Nor'wester lashes 2 districts

Nor'wester lashed Chandapara village in Kendua upazila, while lightning killed two people at Atpara upazila of Netrakona district early yesterday.

Kendua upazila administration sources said the storm hit the village at around 5:00am and lasted for half an hour, damaging over 100 tin-roofed houses and injuring four people.

The injured were admitted to the upazila health complex.

In Atpara upazila two teenagers—Kamal Mia, 17, of village Banaijan and Nizamuddin, 12, of village Mongolsiddha—were struck by lightning while they were going to their croplands at around 6:00am.

UNB adds: Nor'wester swept over three villages in Tahirpur upazila of Sunamganj district at around 4:00am yesterday.

The storm-hit villages are Surjargao, Roypara, and Khalati. Locals said at least 20 houses in the three villages were damaged and a large number of trees uprooted by the storm.

Global warming to hit poor countries hard: UN report

Nearly a third of world's species faces threat of extinction

Climate change is set to inflict damage in every continent, hitting poor countries hardest and threatening nearly a third of the world's species with extinction, UN experts warned yesterday.

Global warming will affect much of life on Earth this century, the UN's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) said in a landmark report whose drafting was marked by an angry row.

Damage to Earth's weather systems from greenhouse gases will change rainfall patterns, punch

up the power of storms and boost the risk of drought, flooding and stress on water supplies, the IPCC said.

The consequences will be adverse or in some scenarios even catastrophic, depending chiefly on how much carbon gas is spewed into the atmosphere from burning oil, gas and coal.

"Poor people are the most vulnerable and will be the worst hit by the impacts of climate change. This becomes a global responsibility," the IPCC's chairman, Rajendra Pachauri, declared.

Up to 30 percent of animal and

plant species will be vulnerable to extinction if global temperatures rise by 1.5-2.5 degrees Celsius (2.7 to 4.5 Fahrenheit), the IPCC said.

"It is very likely that all regions will experience either declines in species or increases in costs for increases in temperature greater than 2 to 3 degrees" (C), or 3.6-5.4 F, over 1990 levels, according to a summary for policymakers agreed by the IPCC.

The summary's draft was fiercely disputed during a week of negotiations, ending with a marathon 24-hour session. Publication was delayed on the final day after several countries objected to tough wording, sparking charges of political interference from one delegate.

At US insistence, summary drafters dumped a paragraph that said North America was "expected to experience severe local economic damage and substantial ecosystem, social and cultural disruption," delegates said.

Saudi Arabia and China also insisted on other changes to water down the draft.

"Some of the objections were not scientifically based," said

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EC's reform proposals welcomed, shorter timeframe suggested

Welcoming the Election Commission's (EC) reform proposals political leaders, former election commissioners and eminent citizens yesterday said the proposed timeframe of a year and a half for holding the next election is too long and it is possible to shorten it.

They said bringing electoral reforms and preparing a voter roll should get priority but the proposals should be finalised after consulting all the authorities concerned including political parties.

The political leaders however said the ban on indoor politics should be lifted soon so that the parties may discuss the proposals among themselves for taking decisions about those.

Hailing the proposals, former law minister Moudud Ahmed yesterday said many of those are good and acceptable.

A few proposals like registration of political parties are appreciable because the practice will make political parties accountable, making way for their leaders and activists to have more say in the process of nominations, he said.

"The proposal that retired government and NGO officials would not be able to get nominations before three years of their retirements should be made five years as the new comers should first serve the parties before getting nominations," he told The Daily Star adding that the initiative taken by the EC is good.

Moudud Ahmed also said his party will send its opinion regarding the matter to the EC when it will be allowed to carry out political activities.

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Decaying old scripts

A large number of old and valuable books, including handwritten scripts are getting damaged in the old building of Woodburn Public Library at Edward Park in Bogra town while the government department concerned seems indifferent to it.

At least 7,000 of some 25 thousand books of the library were damaged during the Liberation War and the post-independence period due to lack of proper maintenance, said Md Shamsul Alam, member secretary, convening committee of the library.

Embattled Musharraf's bid to win Benazir's support

Embattled Pakistani President Pervez Musharraf is in negotiations late Thursday that a deal with Benazir's opposition Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) was in the making.

"Serious negotiations are underway between the two sides but it is not necessary that these will succeed," Rashid told AFP on Friday.

He declined to elaborate when asked what the two sides were demanding from each other.

Musharraf is currently facing multiple challenges to his eight-year hold on power.

The most serious is a crisis over his removal of the country's chief justice, which has sparked several protests backed by Benazir's party along with other opposition groups.

However Pakistan People's

Party spokesman Farhatullah Babar denied any deal was being worked out with the military regime.

"There is no question," Babar told AFP. "This is a disinformation campaign by the regime to create dissension within the opposition ranks and to confuse the public."

He also dismissed the significance of the government's move to effectively close the cell investigating the charges against Benazir—the head of which has been transferred and given a new provincial government posting.

The government still chases Benazir Bhutto and (her husband) Asif Zardari in courts both in the country and abroad," Babar said.
