

ICC clears Baisya to leave

Bangladesh have been given the go-ahead to replace injured pacerman Tapash Baisya with all-rounder Forhad Reza at the World Cup, the International Cricket Council announced on Saturday.

Baisya suffered an ankle injury during Bangladesh's Super Eights defeat against Australia in Antigua last week.

"The reports indicated Baisya will require six to eight weeks of rehabilitation before he regains full fitness so the (World Cup) technical committee has approved Reza as replacement," said an International Cricket Council statement.

The 20-year-old Reza, who has played 12 one-day internationals, is the eighth replacement player to be called up for the tournament so far.

Pakistan replaced Abdul Razzaq, Shoaib Akhtar and Mohammad Asif, while New Zealand brought in replacements for Daryl Tuffey and Lou Vincent --

The Board of Control for Cricket in India's (BCCI) reaction to India's early exit from the World Cup, and its bitter fallout with senior players voicing their displeasure over the team leadership, has been swift and strong.

The working committee, meeting in Mumbai Saturday, took several key decisions aimed at bringing senior players into line, including replacing the graded system of contracts with a standard fee for all and imposing stringent curbs on player endorsements.

It also appointed Rahul Dravid team captain for the next three

tours, to Bangladesh, Ireland and England and asked the selectors to pick a "young side" for the first of those tours. Dravid's retention of the captaincy had been under question, with senior players airing their opposition to him.

"All of us are very disappointed that the team was knocked out in the first round and the captain and coach admitted that the whole team was responsible for the loss", N Srinivasan, the BCCI treasurer, said.

"But it is not the end of the world. We have to move forward and I am sure we will do well in future. By retaining Dravid as captain, we want to send out a signal that there is no cause for panic."

The board has gone further in backing Dravid by acting on his

suggestions on coaching personnel for the upcoming Bangladesh tour. The hole left by Greg Chappell's exit will be filled by specialists for each department: Robin Singh, the former all-rounder, has been appointed fielding coach, while Venkatesh Prasad, the former fast bowler, will take over as the bowling coach.

Ravi Shastri, one of the former captains invited to the meeting on Friday, will go as cricket manager. Another move that will send out a message to the senior players is the decision to issue notices to Sachin Tendulkar and Yuvraj Singh, asking them for an explanation of recent comments made by them in the media.

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Pak academy side arrives

Fixing part of Bob's book

The book Bob Woolmer was working on at the time of his death is to have a special section on match-fixing added prior to publication.

And co-author Tim Noakes, professor of sports science at Cape Town University, said the print run is to be increased from 5,000 to 100,000.

Woolmer's original version did not include a section on match-fixing.

But Noakes claims he would have agreed to the additions which will look at one-day games played by South Africa.

"We would have mentioned match-fixing if Bob and I had thought in the past (that) there was a science about it," he said.

Woolmer coached South Africa during the 1990s, working closely with captain Hansie Cronje, whose admission in 2000 that he received money from bookmakers shocked the cricket world and led to him being banned for life.

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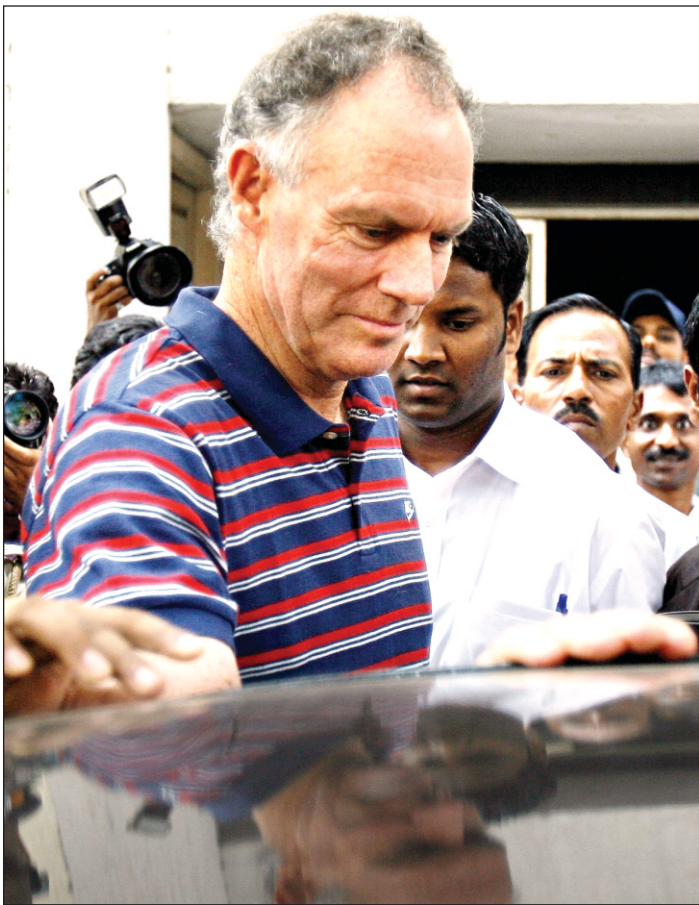

England on the edge

England head into Sunday's Super Eights clash with defending champions Australia knowing defeat will deal a huge blow to their hopes of reaching the World Cup semifinals.

They could lose to their oldest foes at the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium and still make it through to the last four.

But they would need to win their remaining matches against Bangladesh, South Africa and hosts West Indies while hoping other results elsewhere went their way.

Australia have been in dominating form at this World Cup, winning all five of their matches and are still to be dismissed for under 300 as they pursue an unprecedented third straight title.

Yet for all their lacklustre displays in the Caribbean so far, there is evidence that there is no side England would rather be playing in their current position than Australia.

After their recent 5-0 Ashes trouncing, their tour of Australia appeared in a far more desperate state than their campaign does now.

England, thanks to the batting of Paul Collingwood, rallied with one-day wins over New Zealand and Australia that saw them achieve a stunning 2-0 triumph over Ricky Ponting's men to win the CB series.

That England respond well to the challenge of playing classy opponents when in trouble was evident in Wednesday's dramatic two-run defeat by Sri Lanka where their bowling attack restricted the 1996 champions to 235 all out.

"Every game for them (England) is a knockout game and that puts them on the razor's edge," said Australia coach John Buchanan, who believes a victory for his side will "virtually eliminate" England.

"Any side that's playing for its life, understands fairly well what it has to do."

Yet the plain fact is that, despite Ravi Bopara's gutsy 52 against Sri Lanka, England lost when the all-rounder was bowled off the last ball by Dilhara Fernando.

Sri Lanka had found a match-winner just when they needed one -

England, who lost a warm-up match against Australia, hadn't quite.

England's top order have failed to give the team a solid platform at this World Cup and that could see opener Andrew Strauss recalled in place of Middlesex teammate Ed Joyce this weekend even though he hasn't played a match since the Australia tour.

Opener Vaughan said he and all-rounder Andrew Flintoff, who've each yet to make a telling contribution with the bat, were desperate for runs.

"He's like me, he wants a score for the team," said the skipper.

And Vaughan said it was vital new-ball duo James Anderson and Sajid Mahmood repeated their effective display against Sri Lanka.

"They are going to have to be at their best again because Matthew Hayden, Adam Gilchrist and Ricky Ponting are playing very well."

The only dilemma facing Australia appears to be who replaces injured paceman Shane Watson, who has a calf problem.

But with fellow Queensland all-rounder Andrew Symonds -- who

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Bashar plays it down

Bangladesh captain Habibul Bashar insisted on Friday that coach Dav Whatmore's interest in taking charge of the India team has not been a distraction at the World Cup.

Whatmore, who has been instrumental in guiding Bangladesh to the Super Eights for the first time, has declared his interest in replacing Greg Chappell, who quit as India coach after their shock exit in the Caribbean.

But Whatmore, also an Australian like Chappell, has upset the Bangladesh Cricket Board with his public declaration of interest in the India job and officials in Dhaka

have convened an emergency meeting to discuss the issue.

Bashar, whose team face South Africa on Saturday, said Whatmore has kept his thoughts on his future plans to himself.

"He (Whatmore) has been working very hard with us, and has given no indication that he's not enjoying himself here," said Bashar of the coach whose contract expires next month.

"I don't want to talk too much about his thoughts. It's purely for him to decide. But our performance shows what kind of hard work he has put in," said Bashar whose team defeated India by five wickets to progress to the Super Eights.

In the second round, however, Bangladesh have been thrashed by Australia by ten wickets and were handed a nine-wicket mauling by New Zealand.

The defeats have sparked an extreme reaction among

Bangladesh fans who before last week were celebrating their team's rise.

Bashar shrugged off the public reaction.

"It's not so much pressure, it's more expectation. We expected to do a lot better in the last two games because we have been playing good cricket. The pressure should not be used as an excuse," said Bashar whose effigies have been burnt by fans in Dhaka.

"If you don't do well, criticism will be there," added Bashar, who has so far managed just 105 runs with one half-century in the tournament. Also out of form is vice-captain Shahriar Nafees who is likely to be rested for the South Africa match. He was dropped for the defeat to New Zealand and replaced by Javed Omar

Greg's parting shots

India's outgoing coach Greg Chappell on Saturday slammed the unprofessional set up in the country, saying, "If you want to be like Australia, you can't run your cricket like Zimbabwe."

The former Australian captain, who quit as India coach after the team's first round exit in the World Cup, said long-term planning was needed to take India to the next level in international cricket.

"The Indians must adopt a 10-year plan, spelling out the aims and objectives and go about attaining those goals in a professional manner," Chappell, 58, told the Times of India in an interview.

"Any half measures or cosmetic changes at this stage would be like putting Band-Aid on cancer. If you want to be like Australia, you can't run your cricket like Zimbabwe."

Chappell rued the team's first-round ouster in the World Cup after

India were stunned by Bangladesh and also lost to Sri Lanka in the preliminary stage.

"I think we should have done much better in the West Indies with the squad we had," he said.

"We batted poorly against Bangladesh, but we should have still squeezed out a win. History

says India's record in defending low totals has been quite poor.

"We could have done with a few young legs, but I believe that we still had the ammunition to at least reach the semis."

Chappell said he had enjoyed coaching India despite a contro
