

## Enormous challenge for Chelsea

In the theory, Valencia's Mestalla stadium has a level playing field but history suggests that a Jossé Mourinho's Chelsea side may find there are a few mountains to climb there on Tuesday.

The two sides meet in a Champions League quarterfinal second leg and the Spanish side, back-to-back finalists in 2000 and 2001, have a distinct advantage after the 1-1 draw in the first leg at Stamford Bridge.

Valencia haven't lost at home to an English club since Leeds United won in 1967 and since then only Liverpool in the 1998 UEFA Cup have managed a result, a 2-2 draw, that would see Chelsea through to the semifinals for the third time in four years. Chelsea have also won only once in their last 10 visits to Spain when testing a European competition.

Nevertheless, Mourinho's men are confident that they can not only beat Valencia but also go on to fulfil owner Ramon Abramovich's dream and finally lift the Champions League trophy in Athens next month.

"When you are down, when you are not playing as well as you can but you still win, that is what makes you a champion," said Chelsea defender Ashley Cole.

"That is why we are in football, to go to these sorts of places and get a result. We did it at Barcelona and I don't see why we cannot go there and get two goals."

"We have the type of players we will need in a testing time, like (Chelsea captain) John Terry. He would put his head through a wall for you. No one needs to motivate us," added the England international.

Chelsea's recent domestic form, two hard fought 1-0 wins, has hardly been convincing despite the London side lying second in the Premiership and only three points behind league leaders Manchester United.

However, Valencia's players are under no illusions that Chelsea will raise their game after just coming up short in their bid to lift the continent's top club prize in recent seasons.

"I expect a battle here because being knocked out will be an enormous blow to Chelsea. The intensity of the game will be much higher than the first leg," said Valencia defender Miguel.

"Mourinho is an excellent coach and I believe he will be preparing a surprise so we must not underestimate them. However, I feel we have more power," added Valencia winger Joaquin Sanchez.

Valencia's confidence, sky-high after their Stamford Bridge result thanks to a spectacular goal from David Silva, took a knock when they went down 1-0 at struggling Athletic Bilbao on Saturday.

Despite coach Quique Flores resting seven first-choice starters,

Spain to be a target of Chelsea.

Next season he might be sharing a dressing room with The Blues' strikers Andriy Shevchenko and Didier Drogba but on Tuesday his main task will be to stop the dynamic duo from scoring.

"Chelsea are an outstanding team but they aren't invincible. We have one or two options open to us and I'm sure we'll make the last four."

"We showed at Stamford Bridge and in the previous round against Inter Milan that we can become the European champions," added Miguel.

Valencia know that if they can beat Chelsea then another English club Liverpool probably await the winner in the semi-finals after the five-times European champions' emphatic 3-0 win at PSV Eindhoven last week.

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Despite coach Quique Flores resting seven first-choice starters,

including goalkeeper Santiago Canizares, it was far from ideal preparation to face Chelsea.

Flores will also still be without two men who have contributed much to them getting into the last eight, midfield playmaker Vicente Rodriguez and striker Fernando Morientes, owing to recent injuries


Valencia's central defenders Carlos Marchena and David Navarro are also suspended after their infamous punch up with Inter players.

In the wake of last week's clashes between English football fans and police, in Rome and Seville, the football's continental governing body UEFA have advised Valencia to take care in segregating the home and away supporters.

UEFA is also expected to keep a close eye on any racist abuse by Valencia supporters directed against Chelsea's black players like Cole and Drogba, after other shameful incidents in the Mestalla in recent years.



## United under pressure

Sir Alex Ferguson faces the prospect of watching his treble dream crumble under the strain of Manchester United's crippling injury crisis.

United have slumped to successive defeats for the first time this season and Roma will arrive at Old Trafford on Tuesday for the second leg of their Champions League quarterfinal confident they can add to Ferguson's misery by holding on to their 2-1 advantage.

With the prize of a semifinal meeting with AC Milan or Bayern Munich at stake, United have been hit by injuries to key defenders at the worst possible time.

The absence of Nemanja Vidic, Gary Neville and Mikael Silvestre has left the Premiership leaders exposed at the back and the cracks are beginning to show.

United have been coming under more pressure than usual as their under-strength defence struggles to control the opposition and Dutch goalkeeper Edwin van der Sar has looked increasingly fallible.

He was at fault for three of the four goals his side conceded in the losses against Roma and Portsmouth. And as if the injuries weren't enough cause for concern, United will also be without suspended midfielder Paul Scholes on Tuesday.

Ole Gunnar Solskjaer acknowledges United have left themselves a tricky task against Roma. But the Norwegian striker, who scored the goal that won the Champions League against Bayern Munich in 1999, refuses to accept his side are now underdogs.

"Losing is never a good result," Solskjaer said, "but we have to win 1-0 at Old Trafford to get into the Champions League semifinals."

We would have taken that six months ago.

"The best advantage is that we've scored an away goal. We have given ourselves a big chance.

"But they are a very good footballing side with fantastic individuals, so we know it's going to be hard."

The finely-poised nature of the tie was guaranteed to make Tuesday evening a tense occasion, but feelings in Manchester will be running higher than ever after the horrifying scenes of crowd disorder that scarred the first leg.

Several United fans needed hospital treatment after being stabbed before the match and the evening got even uglier when Italian police baton-charged the visiting supporters during the first half.

With so much at stake it is safe to say that Slovakian referee Lubos Michel will need to show the diplomatic skills of a UN peace-keeper if a potentially explosive clash is to pass off without incident on the field.

Roma will certainly draw optimism from United's poor record of finishing off European ties at Old Trafford.

Four times in the last 10 years, they have failed to advance in the Champions League when a second leg win at Old Trafford was required. Borussia Dortmund, Monaco, Real Madrid and Porto have all been able to get what they needed to eliminate United at the Theatre of Dreams.

Luciano Spalletti's side maintained the momentum from their win over United in the Eternal City with a 2-0 success against Catania on Sunday. One of the goal-scoring heroes of the first leg victory, Mirko Vucinic, was on the scoresheet again at the weekend, with Francesc Tavares notching the other.

Roma captain Francesco Totti was rested for the Catania match as he struggles to shake off a sciatica problem in his lower back, but the talismanic striker is certain to start on Tuesday.

Totti wasn't the only Roma star wrapped in cotton wool, with Cristian Chivu, Daniele De Rossi, Christian Panucci and Mancini all on the bench.

Spalletti's decision made sense since the Serie A title is already beyond them. He will hope it pays dividends against a United side showing signs of cracking physically and mentally under the pressure of Chelsea's relentless pursuit in the Premiership.

The Coach could also choose to give a chance to in-form striker Mirko Vucinic, who confirmed his excellent form after scoring the second goal in the 2-0 win against Catania.

## Kaka plots Bayern fall

Kaka is confident that Milan will beat Bayern Munich to book a place in the semifinals of the Champions League.

The Rossoneri will play the second leg of the tie on Wednesday and are likely to need a win after a 2-2 draw at the San Siro last week, but the Brazilian star is not overly concerned.

"I don't think there is any need for desperation," he told UEFA.com. "As much as Bayern deserve respect, not only because of their history but also because of the quality players they have, Milan can win."

"I have a feeling this game will be one of those historic European nights."

Milan were unable to win the first leg despite taking the lead twice and they now find themselves requiring a positive result away from home.

"We had victory in our hands against Bayern and the we let it slip through our fingers with the last kick of the game meant we didn't leave the San Siro happy," explained Kaka.

"We are convinced we can outplay them in front of their supporters. It's important for us to keep our heads up."

The 24-year-old found the back of the net against the German outfit last week to secure his place at the top of the Champions League scorers' chart with seven goals from nine matches.

"Goals are scored for the team and I want to score more to take us further and further," concluded Kaka.

The winner of the tie will go through to face either Roma or Manchester United in the semifinals on April 24/25 and May 1/2.

## Roma duo declared fit

Francesco Totti and Rodrigo Taddei both recovered from injury to be at Roma's disposal for the Champions League clash against Manchester United.

The Giallorossi travel to England on Tuesday for the return leg of their quarterfinal, having earned a narrow lead thanks to the 2-1 win at the Stadio Olimpico last Wednesday.

Totti and Taddei had missed Saturday's Serie A tie with Catania after picking up minor injuries, but both players have recovered and trained with the rest of the team on Easter morning.

Coach Luciano Spalletti will, however, be without Max Tonetto, who is still suffering with a muscular problem in his left thigh, and the suspended Simone Perrotta.

The tactician has yet to decide which formation to use, but is expected to field Christian Wilhelmsson next to Taddei and Amantino Mancini.

# Alonso rules in Sepang

Hamilton, 22, of Britain, confirmed the dazzling potential he demonstrated on his debut in Australia last month, when he finished third, by driving a perfect race in support and defence of his team-mate on his own way to a well-deserved second place, 17 seconds behind Alonso.

Alonso's victory also ended a long 20-races McLaren drought.

It was their first win since they won in Japan in October 2005 and the first one-two since the Brazilian race that same year.

The result hoisted 25-year-old Alonso to the top of the embryonic world drivers' championship ahead of Raikkonen, who finished third for Ferrari ahead of German Nick Heidfeld in a BMW Sauber.

Raikkonen fought hard in the closing stages to close the gap on Hamilton, but the young tyro held him off to finish seven-tenths of a second ahead as they crossed the line.

"That was the toughest race of my life," said Hamilton afterwards. "It was so difficult, so hard to defend. I ran out of water -- and now I feel overwhelmed."

"It is a perfect result, a dream," said Alonso. "This is such a tough race and you never know about tyres, but we were relaxed in the end. I lost radio communications from lap ten, like Kimi (Raikkonen) in Australia, so it is a lucky thing!"

"But they fixed it and to win is absolutely fantastic and it is a wonderful surprise to achieve this after such a short time with the team. Everyone has worked so hard. So much has been done by the whole team."

"It was the 16th victory of Alonso's career, his first for his new McLaren team in only his second race with them, and his second in Malaysia.

He won in 2005 and finished second last year, both results achieved while driving for Renault and en route to two successive world titles.

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
