

# Election by end of 2008

Fakhruddin unveils roadmap in address to nation, says steps to be taken for honest, competent candidates' poll participation

Chief Adviser (CA) Fakhruddin Ahmed yesterday said the ninth parliamentary elections would be held before the end of 2008 as the present caretaker government is committed to handing over power to an elected government.

"I would like to categorically state that we [the present caretaker government] will not stay in power a day longer than it is necessary. I strongly believe, it will be possible to hold the much-awaited parliamentary elections before the end of 2008," he said in his second address to the nation since being sworn in as the CA three months ago.

The ninth parliamentary elec-

tions, previously scheduled for January 22, were cancelled following the declaration of the state of emergency on January 11.

The CA said the government and the Election Commission is currently mulling holding upazila elections to make local government more effec-

tive. Stressing the government's commitment to fighting crime and

## RAMNA BLAST Case brought out from hibernation

Investigators have resumed probe in the Ramna blast case following the home ministry instructions to speed up the investigation that was paid scant attention for reasons political in the last six years.

The government on February 28 included the case in the home ministry monitoring cell's list of sensational cases and formed a three-member task force comprising high officials of Criminal Investigation Department (CID) and Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) to oversee the probe.

The investigation into the Ramna blast took a new turn after Harkatul

Jihad Al Islami (HuJI) chief Mufti Abdul Hannan last year admitted to carrying out the heinous attack that left 10 people dead and scores injured during Bangla new year celebrations at Ramna Batamul on April 14, 2001.

In his confessional statement, Hannan named 10 HuJI leaders and activists to have been involved in the blast. Besides him, former HuJI leader Moulana Abdur Rouf is behind bars now. Rouf however had split off from HuJI and formed a militant outfit during the intervening years.

Investigators said they have already submitted a prayer for Moulana Rouf to be remanded and

Her leadership challenged; she is reportedly under pressure to leave country

## ACC to glean info about Hasina

Declines to confirm any such move against Khaleda

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) is going to start collecting corruption and wealth-related information about former prime minister and Awami League chief Sheikh Hasina, and if necessary will ask her to submit wealth statement, ACC Commissioner Abul Hasan Manzoor Mannan told journalists

yesterday.

But he declined to reply when asked if the ACC is taking a similar move concerning immediate past prime minister and BNP chief Khaleda Zia.

Tajul Islam Farook, chairman of Westmont Power Company, filed an extortion case against Hasina on Monday.

## JMB tops suspect list in PP murder

Bomb like the one used in killing of Jhalakathi judges recovered

Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) is on top of the law enforcers' list of suspected killers of Jhalakathi district court Public Prosecutor Hyder Hossain although investigators did not find any clue to the murder as of last evening.

Meanwhile, the joint forces yesterday recovered a powerful live

bomb—identical to the one used for killing the two Jhalakathi judges on November 14, 2005—around half a kilometre off the scene of Hyder's murder.

"Hyder Hossain's conducting of the Jhalakathi judges killing case against the militant kingpins might have triggered the murder," said Lt
