World record C'Ron bid?

Real Madrid will reportedly offer 54 million pounds for Manchester United's Cristiano Ronaldo this summer.

The Portuguese winger has been in dazzling form this season and is widely regarded as the best player in the world at the moment. However, his spellbinding performance, both in the Premiership and Champions League, have also made him the hottest property in world football and United face an arduous fight to retain his services beyond the current campaign.

Having stalled on extending his Old Trafford contract, Ronaldo has been repeatedly linked with a move to the Bernabéu and it is understood that the Spanish giants have made him their number one target this summer.

According to The Guardian, "Real Madrid have stepped up their attempt to sign by meeting his agent and agreeing a course of action that directors at the Bernabéu believe will end with the Portugal winger becoming their latest galáctico.

Any such deal would represent a new world-record transfer fee, usurping the 46 million pounds spent by Madrid in 2002 on Zinedine Zidane.

Kaiser braced for Hargreaves exit

Bayern Munich president Franz Beckenbauer revealed on Wednesday that the German champions would be ready to let Owen Hargreaves join Manchester United this summer if the price was right.

"If it is right that there is an offer of 25-30 million euros for Hargreaves, then I would seriously consider it," Beckenbauer told Premiere television before Bayern's Champions League quarterfinal against AC Milan.

"I think the board also think this is the way to satisfy the needs of the player."

United manager Sir Alex Ferguson has been keen to sign the England international midfielder, even offering a reported 20 million pounds (39m dollars), but that has so far not been enough to tempt Bayern.

They believe the 26-year-old should honour the new four-year contract he signed last summer which takes him up until 2010.

Meanwhile, Beckenbauer said that it would be a "dream" for Bayern to recruit an international striker of the calibre of Italian Luca Toni (Fiorentina), Brazilians Kaka (AC Milan) or Ronaldinho (Barcelona), Portugal's Deco or Argentine Lionel Messi. "The stars won't come. To sign them is a dream," he said.

Beckenbauer added that the club had been given the green light by their board to go up to 30 million euros (40m dollars) for a big-name transfer.

'Best is yet to come'

on Wednesday night booked them a Champions League semifinal against Manchester United. Two goals in less than five minutes by Clarence Seedorf and Filippo Inzaghi midway through the first-half were enough to cancel out Bayern's slim first-leg advantage, after last week's 2-2 draw, to seal the 4-2 aggregate win.

"It was important we struck an early blow," said Ancelotti, "it was clear from the first-leg that we desperately wanted to stay in the

competition.

"Everyone played their part, both central defenders were rock solid and we have more than just Seedorf and Inzaghi to thank.

"Our team has plenty of players with big-game experience, who relish this type of challenge and know how to win tight games.

"To get to this stage of the tournament was difficult, harder than in previous years, but we can go on and do well now, I am sure."

Ancelotti revealed goal-scorer Inzaghi was struggling with an injury prior to kick-off, but the 33-year-old repaid the faith in his selection.

"He persuaded me with his desire and motivation, I wasn't sure he should play and he showed the sort of heart you need to win crucial matches."

Despite his bitter disappoint-

ment, Bayern Munich coach Ottmar Hitzfeld admitted Milan deserved the win and said the Italian side will test Manchester United in the last four.

"We didn't show the necessary quality to beat a team of the class of AC Milan," said Hitzfeld.

"The first 15 minutes were good and we had two good chances, but after we fell behind, Milan showed their class by hitting us with another quick goal, we tried to break them down in the second-half, but we just couldn't find a way through.

"Milan was the best team this evening and the Italians deserved their win. They are a very clever team, which knows how to take advantage of the slightest error and they will test Manchester United."

More worries for Maradona

Diego Maradona faces treatment for alcoholism after being released from hospital, but the Argentine football idol still hopes to attend a major game of his beloved Boca Juniors team.

Maradona, 46, will be treated at

home for at least two weeks with a medical team, a therapist and nurses on watch for 24 hours to care for the former Argentina captain.

Doctors will consider after his two-week house treatment whether to fly him to Switzerland for further care.

The former Boca Juniors, Barcelona and Napoli star, who was hospitalized in 2000 and 2004

after heart attacks following cocaine overdoses, said Wednesday he would follow the treatment.

"If I mess up, the only one who gets hurt is me," he told local media. "I'm calm."

Guemes Sanatorium director Hector Pezzella said Maradona "must follow the prescribed treatment and diet."

After Maradona was released from Guemes in Buenos Aires Wednesday, his personal doctor, Alfredo Cahe, said Maradona had made a "surprising" recovery from toxic hepatitis induced by drinking.

"His physical and psychological evolution is so good, even I am astonished," Cahe told reporters.

The star, who was rushed to the clinic on March 28, lost between six and seven kilos (13 and 15 pounds) during the hospital stay, Cahe said.

Maradona may even be healthy enough to go to Boca Juniors' stadium to watch his team take on arch-rivals River Plate in the 10th round of Argentina's Clausura tournament, Cahe said.

"On Sunday I will go (to the stadium), with IV, with my doctor, in ambulance, however," Maradona said in a telephone interview with TyC Sports channel, predicting that Boca would win.

Maradona, who has a special booth at the "Candy Box," as the fans call the stadium, vowed to go see Boca "until I use the last drop of my blood."

"Diego is very intelligent, extremely intuitive," Cahe said. "It is difficult to maintain with him a dialogue with questions and answers, but he knows how to listen."

Maradona "is lucid, coherent, calm," said Daniel Tejada, one of the top psychiatrists who looked after him at the hospital.

According to a source close to his family, Maradona is staying in a country house in Ezeiza, a town south of the capital where his girlfriend Veronica Ojeda lives.

England-Brazil in Wembley curtain-raiser

England will take on Brazil in their first match at the new Wembley Stadium on June 1, the Football Association (FA) confirmed Wednesday.

England's first match at Wembley for seven years will provide a test for Steve McClaren's side ahead of their Euro 2008 qualifier in Estonia five days later.

The 90,000-seater national stadium has been rebuilt at a cost of 800-million pounds (1.45 billion dollars).

FA chief executive Brian Barwick said: "We're delighted to be able to announce that Brazil will be the first team to take on England at the new Wembley.

"It's a fantastic match to mark the team's return to the stadium after nearly seven years on the road around the country.

"Brazil featured in some memorable matches at the old Wembley. The new stadium is a fantastic football arena and I'm confident there will be many new memories created there for England fans over the coming years."

England were beaten by Germany in a World Cup qualifier in their last match at Wembley in October 2000.

Football returned to Wembley last month as England Under-21s played out a 3-3 draw with their Italian counterparts in front of a crowd of 55,700.

The success of that match allowed the FA to confirm that the ground would be able to stage this year's FA Cup final as anticipated on May 19.

Five-time World Cup winners Brazil played at the old Wembley on nine occasions, most recently in May 2000 which ended in a 1-1 draw.

The FA have also confirmed that from next year the semifinals of the FA Cup will also be played at Wembley.

Italians released

Four Italian men charged after clashes with police marred Manchester United's Champions League quarterfinal victory over AS Roma, walked free from court Wednesday.

Magistrates in Manchester handed conditional discharges to two of the men. A third was bound over to be of good behaviour while the fourth pleaded not guilty to possessing an offensive weapon.

He was bailed to return to trial in the north-west English city on June 28.

Twelve English fans were also charged after violence flared briefly between up to 100 rival fans outside the Old Trafford stadium in Manchester before Tuesday evening's game, which United won 7-1.

Crouch completes formalities

second half strike sealed a 1-0 quarterfinal second leg win over 10-man PSV Eindhoven on Wednesday.

Crouch's tap-in came moments after PSV's Dirk Marcellis was sent off and completed a 4-0 aggregate victory that capped a memorable week for English teams.

Crouch admitted the match had been a bit of a damp squib.

"It wasn't much of a spectacle but we did what we had to do. It was a strange game but nevertheless all the lads were up for it."

Liverpool manager Rafael Benitez said it had been hard to get the players motivated.

"We had more control in the second-half especially after the sending-off," said the canny Spaniard.

His PSV counterpart Ronald Koeman agreed that the sending-off had been pivotal in giving PSV any chance of getting back into the tie.

"We did better than last week," said the former Dutch international defender.

"We gave nothing away to Liverpool. The sending-off was an incredible decision.

"I told him (Marcellis) don't be disappointed because you did fantastic. I don't understand the referee, it was a yellow card but not a red one. However, Liverpool were too strong for us over the two games."

Liverpool followed Manchester United and Chelsea's victories - the latter beating Benitez' former club Valencia - on Tuesday to become the third Premiership club to reach the last four.

It is only the third time a single country has had three clubs at this stage of the competition. But Benitez's side will be focused on emulating their 2005 Champions League semifinal victory over Chelsea, which was the prelude to a fifth triumph in Europe's elite club competition.

Liverpool and Chelsea are becoming familiar opponents on football's grand occasions and this will be the increasingly bitter rivals' third semifinal meeting in three seasons.

The chance to secure a trip to Athens for the final in May would be enough to ensure a ferocious encounter. But extra spice is added by Luis Garcia's controversial Champions League winner against Chelsea two years ago - a goal that still rankles with Blues manager Jose Mourinho.

"It will be a special occasion against Chelsea, and hopefully it will be the same outcome (as in the semifinal two years ago)," said Crouch, who is a season ticketholder with Chelsea.

Benitez said that the previous semifinal showed that they could beat the Premiership champions.

"At least we know we can beat Chelsea when we are at our level.

"It could be an advantage playing away in first leg (Liverpool go to Stamford Bridge). Could also be an advantage that they are playing in more competitions but they have a very good and big squad."

PSV had been woeful in the first leg and Koeman had conceded there was little hope of PSV becoming the first team ever to overturn a three-goal Champions League deficit away from home.

An early goal was vital if the visitors were to have any chance and they were quickly on the offensive, with Jefferson Farfan's header bringing a good stop from Jose Reina.

Liverpool suffered a blow when Welsh striker Craig Bellamy was stretched off after he suffering a knee ligament strain while trying to charge down a corner in the 16th minute.

PSV had nowhere near enough firepower to trouble Liverpool, who were content to maintain a grip on possession without over-committing to rash attacks. PSV keeper Gomes was finally tested in the 27th minute when Crouch met Jermaine Pennant's cross with a volley that the Brazilian pushed over the bar.

That miss was as close as the Anfield crowd got to real excitement in the first half, although Boudewijn Zenden was narrowly off-target with a curling free-kick from 25 yards just before the break.

If PSV had the slightest belief they could get back into the tie, it was extinguished by Italian referee Roberto Rosetti after 64 minutes.

Marcellis' lunge at Zenden was rash but hardly a serious danger to the Dutch winger, but it still brought the 18-year-old debutant right-back an immediate red card from Rosetti.

Liverpool went for the kill straight away and got their reward in the 68th minute.

Crouch looked to have wasted the chance when he failed to connect cleanly with John Arne Riise's left-wing cross. But Robbie Fowler turned the ball back into the six yard box for Crouch to shoot past Gomes for his fifth goal in four games.

Fowler is likely to leave Liverpool at the end of the season and it was fitting that the striker, a hero to the Anfield faithful, played a part in the winner on what will be one of his last European nights for the club.

But this victory ensured he still has a chance to write one more chapter in the Liverpool history books against Chelsea later this month.

No love lost between old foes

against Chelsea by claiming Jose Mourinho is only friends with managers he does not fear.

Benitez's side set up a semifinal meeting of the increasingly bitter rivals by completing a 4-0 aggregate win over PSV Eindhoven in the last eight.

Liverpool had done the hard work in the Netherlands a week ago and Peter Crouch's second half goal, moments after PSV's Dirk Marcellis was sent off, clinched a low-key 1-0 victory in Wednesday's second leg at Anfield.

But Benitez has already turned his attention to Chelsea manager Mourinho, who stands between him and a second Champions League final in three seasons. The feud between two bosses who are anything but close friends will hardly have been helped by Benitez's surprisingly personal comments about Mourinho.

The Portuguese coach has riled Benitez on several occasions as their teams have fought it out in the games' grandest occasions.

Mourinho took first blood when Chelsea won 3-2 in the 2005 League Cup final, but Benitez exacted revenge a few months later as Luis Garcia's controversial goal enabled the Reds to eliminate

Chelsea from the Champions League at the semifinal stage. Garcia's goal at Anfield still rankles with Mourinho, who claims the ball never crossed the line. Liverpool followed that success by dumping Chelsea out of the FA Cup semifinals last season and Benitez believes those results are at the root of the animosity.

"We were good friends until we start beating them. Then that changed his mind," Benitez said of his Chelsea counterpart. "But it is the same with all the managers of the top sides.

"He has very good relationships with the managers of teams that normally he beats. When he starts fighting with managers of top sides it is normal."

Liverpool have the advantage of playing the return at Anfield on May 1 after the first leg in London on April 25.

But familiarity has bred contempt between these contrasting managers and Benitez was happy to put pressure on Mourinho by insisting Chelsea's huge transfer investment means they must win several trophies or else the campaign will be a failure.

"We know Chelsea are a good team. In the last five years they have spent big money on a lot of players and they have a very good squad," Benitez said.

"If you want to be in the finals you must have a very good squad and they have a very good squad. I think that is the reason they must be there and compete for every competition.

"We know Chelsea and they know us, but you must always have confidence as a manager and a Liverpool team should always be confident.

"We know it is a difficult team to play against. The only thing is we will play the second leg at Anfield and if you can do something at Stamford Bridge then maybe you have an advantage.

"But you saw against Valencia they are very dangerous playing counter-attacking football. I think it will be difficult for both of us."

Liverpool were in cruise control for long periods against a PSV side who showed little belief that they could turn the tie around.

Italian referee Roberto Rosetti ended their slender hopes after 64 minutes when he showed Marcellis a red card for a lunge at Boudewijn Zenden that was rash but hardly a serious danger.

Liverpool went for the kill straight away and got their reward in the 68th minute.

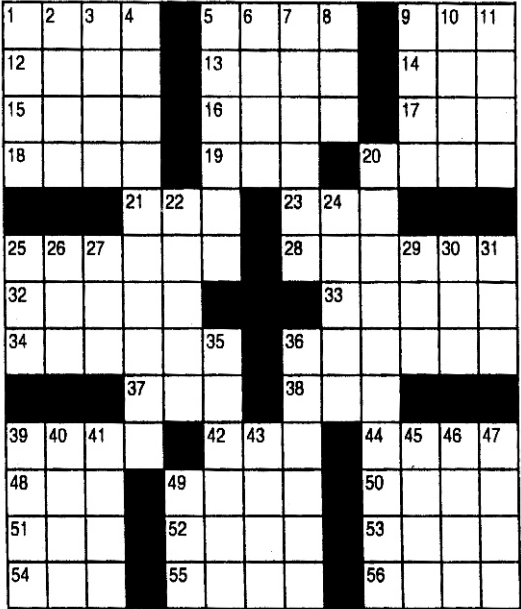
