## Ricky dislikes WC length

Australia captain Ricky Ponting has added his voice to those demanding that the World Cup be shortened from its current 47-day marathon.

"I am sure that some positive things have been said about this event this time around," said Ponting.

"In the future it can be compressed a little bit and make a better World Cup next time."

Ponting's call comes just two days after teammate Mathew Hayden also called for the World Cup to be trimmed and on the same day that Chris Dehring, the chief executive of the World Cup in the Caribbean, recognised that the event was too drawn out.

Ponting admitted, however, that finding a solution to the problem would not be easy.

"Trying to programme the World Cup and make it as short as possible must be a logistical nightmare, especially in a place like the West Indies where we are travelling all around nine different countries," said the Australian skipper.

"So if you look at it from that point of view, I wouldn't like to be in the shoes of the people who are trying to organise this type of event."

The International Cricket Council (ICC) has been criticised for the duration of the event. The current World Cup, which started on March 13 and ends with the final on April 28, covers 47 days and

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## Paul slams double hattrick

Mohammedan win Chittagong derby

Record-breaking Mwach Ukwu Paul slammed a double hattrick as Mohammedan Sporting Club returned to winning ways in the B. League with a 7-1 thrashing of Rahmatganj on the eve of the Bengali New Year.

Having slumped to ninth place with two losses and two draws after opening the campaign with a slim win, Mohammedan came alive after a two-week welcome break with their Nigerian captain slotting six goals including the fastest goal of the league. Kamal Hossain completed the biggest victory of the professional league so far on the stroke of the final whistle.

Run ragged by their mighty opponents, bottom-table Rahmatganj pulled one back through Ashraf Al-Awal.

Paul, the first foreigner to wear the black and whites armband, hit the record book to inspire their first win in five games, which came after a span of five weeks.

He also became the first man to score a double hattrick in 31 years after Brothers Union's Mohsin had scored seven against East End in

the then first division league in 1976. Earlier, Abahani striker Kazi Salahuddin and Mohammedan's Hafizuddin were the only two to strike six goals in a match in the post-Liberation era.

Mohammedan, who ignored competition rules by wearing an all-black outfit with strips of white and green, went ahead just 55 seconds after start when Paul blasted a right-footer into the far post after meeting a left-side corner by Biplab for the fastest B. League goal.

Rahmatganj escaped narrowly in the 11th minute when their defender Mahiuddin nodded the ball onto their own post while Paul shot wide a minute later.

Mohammedan's early domination fizzled out as the five-man Rahmatganj midfield took control and earned a deserved equaliser in the 34th minute. Getting the ball from Hanif from right flank, veteran striker Milton cut the ball back for Apu inside the box and the midfielder raced past Mohammedan defender Arif to place the ball with his left foot past debutant Liberian goalkeeper James Paul.

Apu, however, committed a clumsy challenge on medio Zahid to hand their opponents a penalty that brought Mohammedan back into the game five minutes from break as Paul converted the spotkick effortlessly.

In a one-man show in the sec-

ond half, the robust Paul -- who transferred from Muktijoddha this season -- found the net in the 55, 72, 76 and 80 minutes virtually on his own.

Rahmatganj keeper Apel, who replaced Amjad at the break, helplessly watched Paul make most of his non-moving feet with a headed goal, one that went into the top right corner and two low drives from outside the box.

Apel however, saved a penalty by Farhad in the 88th minute but Mohammedan fullback Kamal sealed the victory in the injury time with a 20-yard drive into the roof of the net.

With two wins, Mohammedan moved to sixth place with eight points but still remained behind their Chittagong wing.

Chittagong Mohammedan, who edged archrivals Chittagong Abahani 1-0 in the port city derby also yesterday, climbed to fourth place with 11 points after six games.

Rashed Ahmed Dipu slotted the match winner in the 33rd minute to separate the two sides at the MA Aziz Stadium.

Second from bottom Chittagong Abahani remained on three points, followed by Rahmatganj on one.

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# Vaas treble sinks NZ

Chaminda Vaas ensured Sri Lanka didn't miss Lasith Malinga by removing New Zealand's top three in a six-wicket World

Cup Super Eight match at Grenada's National Stadium.

Sri Lanka, set 220 to win, finished on 222 for four to move level on eight points with New Zealand and champions Australia, who have played four games to their title-rivals five.

Sanath Jayasuriya, who made 64, and Kumar Sangakkara, unbeaten on 69, shared a second wicket stand of exactly 100 in 21 overs that all but sealed victory for Sri Lanka after left-arm quick Vaas took three for 33.

Thursday's defeat, with 39 balls to spare, left New Zealand still needing one more win from their final two Super Eight games, both in Grenada, against South Africa on Saturday and Australia a week Friday, to be certain of a semifinal spot.

And the loss also saw them fall one short of equalling their 2004 record of 10 straight one-day international wins after they'd played one of the leading contenders in this World Cup for the first time.

Sri Lanka return here Monday to face Australia.

Vaas, 33, dismissed both New Zealand captain Stephen Fleming and Ross Taylor for naught before all-rounder Scott Styris, in at four for two, scored more than half his side's runs with a composed 111 not out.

The Black Caps couldn't afford any drops but they missed Sangakkara on nine when he played early at a slower ball from spearhead quick Shane Bond only for Craig McMillan to floor the chance at mid-on.

First change Mark Gillespie saw his opening over of the tournament cost 17 runs, Jayasuriya dismissing

his first two balls for six and four in the bowler's comeback match following a right shoulder injury.

Sri Lanka posted a run-a-ball fifty before Fleming dropped Jayasuriya, on 30, at short mid-wicket off Gillespie.

Jayasuriya completed a 65-ball fifty with one six and three fours.

However, his cut off Jacob Oram

was held by Brendon McCullum, the wicket-keeper standing up, Sri Lanka 130 for two.

Left-arm spinner Daniel Vettori then became only the third New Zealander after Chris Harris (203) and Chris Cairns (200) to take 200 one-day international wickets when he had Sri Lanka captain Mahela Jayawardene caught at mid-wicket by substitute fielder Hamish Marshall for 15.

Such was Sri Lanka's dominance, Sangakkara eased his way to an 86 ball fifty with one four.

Earlier off-spinner Muttiah Muralidaran, like Vaas and Jayasuriya a member of Sri Lanka's 1996 World Cup-winning side, took three for 32 after the quick's early strikes.

Murali joined Malinga -- ruled out with left ankle ligament damage -- and Australia's Glenn McGrath as the tournament's leading wicket-taker with 15.

Vaas needed just five balls to have opener Fleming lbw for naught.

Taylor, in for Marshall after a hamstring injury sidelined him for four games, then edged Vaas and keeper Sangakkara held a diving, one-handed catch.

Styris -- who took 20 balls to get off the mark -- counter-attacked and was severe on Farveez Maharoof, Malinga's replacement and the only change to the side that beat England by two runs in Antigua.

New Zealand went 19 overs without a boundary until Oram struck spinner Tillakaratne Dilshan

Sri Lankan stylist took two days to create Sri Lankan bowler Lasith Malinga's bleached-blond unkempt hair that is attracting attention at the Cricket World Cup.

Hair-dresser Nishantha Jayasekera said Malinga wanted a new style each time he went on tour. So the locks were spruced up for the World Cup in the Caribbean.

"Malinga has his own hair ideas and he is not afraid to try out anything new," said Jayasekera who runs the Le Paris salon in Panadura, 25 kilometres (15.6 miles) south of Colombo.

The barber told the latest edition of the Rivira weekly newspaper he has so far tried out five different hair styles on the 23-year old paceman, but never expected his "light blond" creation to become an instant hit.

"It took me two days to get the look," Jayasekera said.

Malinga, who also sports a silver eyebrow ring, had flirted with the idea of a "Mohawk" that would have shaved the sides leaving a thin strip of hair in the middle.

Besides Malinga, Jayasekera also grooms spin bowler Tillekeratne Dilshan, Chamara Silva, Malinga Bandara and Hashan Tillekeratne.

"Malinga likes to stand out, so he goes for unusual styles unlike the other well-known cricketers," Jayasekera said.

# Spanish trio in semis

Spanish clubs repeated the feat of English clubs in the Champions League earlier this week by booking three of the final four berths in the UEFA Cup on Thursday.

Holders Sevilla led the way as they held Spurs 2-2 to progress 4-3 on aggregate and edge nearer to becoming only the second side to retain the trophy - the other being Real Madrid.

Barcelona's lesser known club, Espanyol, also went through with a tremendous 0-0 draw away at Benfica - winning 3-2 on aggregate - while Osasuna beat Bayer Leverkusen 1-0 at home to wrap up a surprising but comfortable 4-0 aggregate win.

However Leverkusen's German rivals Werder Bremen ensured there was some non-Spanish representation as they cruised to an impressive 4-1 win over Dutch side AZ Alkmaar with German international striker Miroslav Klose ending his goal drought of 1158 minutes and finishing with a double.

Sevilla got a dream start with two goals in the first 10 minutes - including one from former Spurs

marksman Fredi Kanoute - and even though Spurs hit back with two in the second-half the English side had left themselves with too much to do.

However Sevilla's enterprising coach Juande Ramos - who has been touted as a potential replacement for Jose Mourinho should he leave Chelsea in the summer - admitted there had been slight moment of uneasiness.

"It was very clear we made things a bit difficult for ourselves after the second goal but we were never in any real danger of losing the match," said Ramos.

"The first minutes of the match are always very important and I think my team showed Tottenham we had clear intentions to score and play a good match."

Spurs manager Martin Jol admitted they had shot themselves in the foot as he saw his side crash out of a cup competition for the third time this season when they were within sight of the final.

"I don't know if the best team won but of course Sevilla is a good team but it is easier when you don't give away goals and they certainly rocked us," said the Dutchman.

"However if you consider the penalty awarded against us last week we were unlucky but we could have done better today."

"In the second-half we won against a team that had rocked us early on and beat them 2-0."

However Jol insisted his team

has improved this season despite becoming the nearly men of cup competitions and failing to mount a challenge for the Premiership title.

"I felt we achieved a lot this year," said the former no-nonsense Dutch international midfielder.

Osasuna may be 14th in the Spanish championship but they made light of that to grind out a 1-0 win over Leverkusen with Juanlu Gomez wrapping up affairs in the 62nd minute and landing his side their first ever semifinal spot in the competition.

Espanyol are five places above Osasuna but were fortunate to withstand a second-half onslaught by Benfica, who had looked to be in the box seat after coming back from 3-0 down last week in Spain to lose 3-2.

However, Nuno Gomez was defied by a brilliant save from Gorka Iraizoz and then two of his teammates including veteran Rui Costa saw their efforts denied by the woodwork to keep alive Espanyol's dreams of reaching their second ever UEFA Cup final, having lost in the 1988 final.

Benfica coach Fernando Santos could only shrug his shoulders in despair.

"We dominated the match totally from the 10th minute but what can one do. We will just have to focus on the title."

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## 'Lasith wasn't risked'

Sri Lanka captain Mahela Jayawardene insisted his side's six-wicket win against New Zealand proved they could cope without Lasith Malinga.

Fast bowler Malinga, the World Cup's joint most successful bowler with 15 wickets, was ruled out of Thursday's Super Eight match after injuring ankle ligaments in practice.

But despite the absence of the 23-year-old, who has made a major impact during the past year with his distinctive, sly action, Jayawardene's men were still able to restrict New Zealand to 219 for seven.

Left-arm quick Chaminda Vaas, who removed the entire top three on his way to 3-33 and off-spinner Muttiah Muralidaran (three for 32), two of the survivors from Sri Lanka's 1996 World Cup winning team, did the damage.

Vaas's figures also included dismissing New Zealand skipper Stephen Fleming, lbw for naught for the fourth successive time.

Victory was all but assured when another of the 1996 heroes, opening batsman Sanath Jayasuriya (64), shared a century second-wicket stand with Kumar Sangakkara (69 not out).

"We are not a one-man team. We have quality performers like Vaas (Vaas) and Murali. The last 12 months we've had our injury problems but we've played as a team and that's why we've won matches," said Jayawardene.
