Police raid Harris Chowdhury's residence, confiscate household items

## EC goes all out for polls by 2008

Wants to approach US, UK, Canada for funds

Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) ATM Shamsul Huda yesterday said the Election Commission (EC) is going all out to hold the national election by 2008 and will complete necessary preparations within the next 18 months.

The commission at an inter-ministerial meeting yesterday asked the Economic Relations Division (ERD) to approach the US, UK, Canada and Japan immedi-

ately for funds needed to prepare a voter list with photographs and national identity cards (ID).

"There's no time to waste. The ERD will write to the four countries tomorrow [today] seeking financial assistance," the CEC told reporters after the meeting at the EC Secretariat conference room.

The mega project might cost around Tk 400 crore, he said adding that the task of preparing the voter roll would have to be wrapped up



## Ireland crush Tigers

The bubble finally burst for Bangladesh in the Cricket World Cup when they crashed to a stunning 74-run defeat to ICC associate members Ireland in their Super Eights match at Kensington Oval yesterday.

Chasing a challenging 244-run target, Mohammad Ashraful's 35 off 36 balls including five fours and a six was the only signs of resistance for the Tigers who skittled out for 169 in 41.2 overs.

Ireland's first victory in the second stage was shaped by their military medium pace bowling, which not only stopped the flow of runs but also produced wickets at regular intervals. Boyd Rankin, Dave Langford Smith, Trent Johnston and Kyle McCallan each chipped in with two wickets to

ensure their overall second win after ousting Pakistan in the group stage.

But the credit must go to opener William Porterfield's sedate but effective 85 off 136 balls that inspired Ireland to post 243-7 in 50 overs after captain Johnston's brave decision to bat first on a bouncy Barbados pitch.

After eliminating India from the tournament and defeating World No. 1 South Africa, the defeat came as a shock for Bangladesh, who suffered early blows to slump to 48-3. Tamim, who scored an unusually slow 29 off 59 balls, was the fourth man out after adding 45 runs with Ashraful. He played on Johnston while trying to make room and hit on the off-side.

## Food items go pricier

Govt rushes to import soyabean oil

Trading Corporation of Bangladesh (TCB), the only state-run trading organisation, yesterday floated a tender for importing 3,000 tonne refined soyabean oil to lessen the upward trend of the edible oil's price.

They feared that the prices of edible oil will further increase if the government does not reduce the tax on import.

Soyabean oil, which sold at Tk 70 per litre a week ago, is now selling at Tk 75. The price of palm oil also increased by Tk 5 per litre, according to Hatirpool Kitchen market sources.

"Today we have floated tender
