

## Lanka kept Aussies guessing

Sri Lanka's decision to keep top players from the cricket World Cup clash against Australia was a ploy sanctioned by Colombo, the island's chief selector said Thursday.

Sri Lanka, already assured of a place in the semi-finals, kept out star bowlers Chaminda Vaas and Muttiah Muralidaran for the Super Eights match in Grenada on Monday, which Australia won by seven wickets.

Their absence, and that of already injured Lasith Malinga, meant the 1996 World Cup winners went into Monday's loss to the defending champions without a trio of bowlers who have taken 41 wickets at the tournament.

Australia cruised to a seven-wicket win with 44 balls to spare after dismissing a full-strength Sri Lanka batting line-up for 226 at the Grenada National Stadium.

The controversial move, however, shocked the Australians and angered Sri Lankan cricket fans who were keen to see the home team beat Australia, the current favourites to win their third consecutive World Cup title.

"It was a decision, a ploy, to keep our key strike bowlers away from the Australian game. We wanted to bring the players out for the finals with Australia," Sri Lanka Cricket chief selector, Asantha de Mel, told AFP.

De Mel's comments contradict skipper Mahela Jayawardene's statement that Muralidaran and Vaas, two of the stars of the side that won the World Cup 11 years ago, were rested.

"Once we realised we had the semi-final spot, I thought we needed to give those guys a break," Jayawardene said after Monday's loss.

## Sarwan next skipper?

Middle-order batsman Ramnaresh Sarwan is all set to be named as the West Indies captain for their next month's tour of England replacing the under-fire Brian Lara.

The enigmatic Lara is likely to face the axe after West Indies' unimpressive World Cup performance which saw them losing four of their Super Eights matches.

There are chances Lara, who will play his last two one-day internationals this week, may not be selected at all for the tour of England in May where the West Indies play four Tests and three one-day internationals.

"I think the two names of Sarwan and Daren Ganga have appeared. Sarwan has been the vice-captain, so it's up to the Board to decide on the recommendations made by the selectors," said former captain and current manager Clive Lloyd.

Sarwan has been Lara's deputy since 2003 and many believe he is the right choice to carry the West Indies team forward.

Sarwan last week suggested he was ready for the responsibility.

"If given the opportunity I will grab it with both hands," said the 26-year-old from Guyana, who can follow in the footsteps of countrymen like Rohan Kanhai, Lloyd, Alvin Kallicharran and Shivnarine Chanderpaul as captains.

He has led the West Indies in four one-day internationals, winning three.

The 28-year-old Ganga has led the West Indies 'A' team and skippered the Trinidad and Tobago side to a domestic one-day tournament win in January this year.

When asked of Lara's chances not being selected at all, Lloyd replied: "That is up to the selectors, I am not among them."

Lara, who led the West Indies in 47 Tests with just ten wins during his three spells, has been under fire for team's failures and among his most severe critics has been former bowling great Michael Holding.

"Lara has to step aside, not necessary as player, but as a captain," Holding said earlier this month.

"He needs to co-operate with the new captain and allow him to have a free hand to take the West Indies forward," said Croft.

Even veteran commentator-cum

writer Tony Cozier sided with Holding.

"During his long and otherwise celebrated career Lara has issued seven public apologies for his own indiscretions. The eighth, last week, was on behalf of his team," wrote Cozier of Lara saying sorry after his team's 67-run defeat against South Africa in Grenada.

"Yet he has been thrice persuaded to return to the leadership," said Cozier of Lara who was first appointed captain in 1998.

Lara also took over from Carl Hooper after West Indies' first-round exit from the 2003 World Cup in South Africa and then from Shivnarine Chanderpaul early last year.

Lara was also at the centre of a contract row between players and the West Indies Cricket Board and had his tiffs with the selectors, the most recent being during the Super Eights matches.

Another former fast bowler Colin Croft feels the time is right for a change.

"Sarwan must be given the job. I would also like to think that Denesh Ramdin must be groomed for future," said Croft.



## BANGLADESH v WEST INDIES Hosts serious about Tigers

Battered and bruised West Indies take on Bangladesh in their penultimate World Cup match here on Thursday hoping to rescue their tarnished reputation.

Brian Lara's men saw their slender chances of further progress in the tournament disappear when South Africa demolished England by nine wickets on Tuesday to grab the last place in the semifinal line-up.

Defending champions Australia, New Zealand and Sri Lanka had already confirmed their places in the last four.

A win on Thursday would at least help the West Indies, winners of the first two World Cups in 1975 and 1979, avoid last place in the Super Eights table and safeguard their unbeaten record against Bangladesh.

Team manager Clive Lloyd, who led West Indies to their only two Cup titles, said Bangladesh will not be taken for granted.

"They are a formidable side and have done well in this World Cup and they have beaten quite a few good sides in Tests so they are on their way up," said Lloyd.

Bangladesh have had problems since upsetting former champions India in the preliminary round.

"They downed South Africa in the Super Eights but that remained their

only win in the second stage and they have been dogged by inconsistency.

"We don't take any team lightly, it's just that we haven't played quite as well as we could, our results have shown that," said Lloyd, who has been criticised for being too soft as part of the management team.

West Indies, winners of the ICC Champions Trophy in 2004 and runners-up in the same event last year, won all their three preliminary round matches to raise hopes of a successful campaign.

But the curse of the hosts (no home side has ever won the World Cup) came back to haunt them in the Super Eights where they lost to Australia, New Zealand, Sri Lanka and South Africa.

They are now left with England, who they play here on Saturday, Ireland and Bangladesh in the bottom half.

Bangladesh skipper Habibul Bashar termed the situation as "disappointing."

"We created our chances by beating South Africa but here we are now fighting to avoid finishing in the last two," said Bashar, whose team lost tamely to Ireland on Sunday to crush any lingering hopes of reaching the last four.

Bashar said it was combination of poor batting and fielding which let them down in the Ireland match.

"We did ourselves no favours by giving them too many chances and
