

Road crashes kill six

At least six people were killed and 46 others injured in separate road accidents in Manikganj, Sirajganj and Kishoreganj yesterday.

Our correspondent from Manikganj adds: One was killed and four others were injured in a road accident on Dhaka-Singair-Manikganj Road in the early hours of yesterday.

The accident occurred when the driver of a Singair-bound taxicab from Dhaka lost control of the vehicle that fell into the roadside ditch at Joymantap at around 2:30am.

The victim was identified as Shah Alam, the driver of the ill-fated taxicab.

He hailed from Badda Natun Bazar in Dhaka.

The body of the driver was sent to Manikganj Sadar Hospital morgue for autopsy.

The injured were admitted to different clinics at Savar.

Quoting the passengers, local people said the driver lost control of the vehicle as he tried to save them from a gang of robbers who tried to barricade the cab.

A case has been lodged with Singair Police Station.

Our correspondent from Sirajganj reports: At least two people were killed and five others injured in two separate road accidents in Shahzadpur upazila of Sirajganj district yesterday.

Police and witnesses said an unidentified person aged about 32, died on the spot, when a Nagorbari-bound bus from Bogra hit him from behind on Nagorbari-Bogra highway at Dilruba bus terminal area in Shahzadpur upazila. On the other hand, another unidentified person died on the spot and five others were injured at around 10:30am, when an auto-tempo (popularly known as Bhutvuti) turned upside down on the road as its driver lost control over the steering at Jigbari area in the same upazila.

Police rushed to the spot and rushed the injured to Shahzadpur Upazila Health Complex and

Sirajganj General Hospital. Shahzadpur police sent the bodies to Sirajganj General Hospital morgue for autopsy.

A correspondent from Kishoreganj adds: Two people were killed and 25 others critically injured in a road accident at Achmita area on Kishoreganj-Dhaka highway in Kotiadi upazila yesterday.

The injured were rushed to Kishoreganj Sadar Adhunik Hospital and Dhaka Medical College & Hospital, locals said.

The accident occurred when a Dhaka-bound BRTC bus hit a covered van of Igloo Ice-cream Co. coming from opposite direction, leaving a salesman and driver of the van dead on the spot and 25 bus passengers injured.

Of the injured, 10 were identified as Milon, 45, Mannan, 40, Jahangir, 35, Arif, 30, Helal, 40, Jahangir, 40, Jewel, 25, Shohag, 40, Liton, 45, and Jamal, 43.

Khulna reports: One person was killed and 12 others were injured in a road accident near Kendua bridge on Khulna-Dhaka highway at Fakirhat upazila of Bagerhat district yesterday.

The dead was identified as shrimp trader Mohammad Ali, 45, who hailed from Bhola district.

The injured, also shrimp traders from Bhola, were admitted to different clinics at Bagerhat.

The accident occurred when a car carrying them from Bhola turned upside down and fell into a ditch near the bridge as its driver lost control over the steering.

Bridge collapses as overloaded truck hits railing

A bridge collapsed when an overloaded truck crashed into its railing in Majherchor area at Sonargaon in the district early morning yesterday.

The accident suspended bus services on Dhaka-Araihaazar and Narayanganj-Araihaazar routes.

Road and Highways Department (RHD) said the bridge known as 'Baily Bridge' collapsed as the truck was carrying three times more than its capacity.

Sources said, the loading capacity of the Baily Bridge was ten ton and it collapsed when the speeding ten-wheeler weighing 40-ton hit the railing of the bridge with a great force.

Sonargaon Police Station told The Daily Star that the bus driver and the helper are absconding since the incident.

Dhaka-Seoul bilateral trade should increase: President

President Iajuddin Ahmed has underlined the need for enhancing bilateral trade between Bangladesh and Republic of Korea (ROK).

The remark came when the newly appointed Ambassador of the Republic of Korea to Bangladesh Park Sun-bum presented his credentials to the President at Bangabhaban yesterday.

Welcoming the new Ambassador, Iajuddin said Bangladesh greatly values its friendly and cooperative relations with Korea.

He termed the existing bilateral relations between Bangladesh and Korea as excellent and hoped that it would be further strengthened and deepened in the coming days.

He said Korea is one of the most important development partners of Bangladesh and hoped that the ROK would continue to provide financial and technical assistance for the development of Bangladesh especially in the field of ICT.

He thanked the ROK government for the inclusion of Bangladesh in the list of workforce sending countries under employment permit system.

The president requested the

ROK for more investment in the fields of leather goods, gas exploration, tourism, fertiliser, jute and jute goods products.

He appreciated the Korean government for making contribution at the 14th Saarc summit as an observer.

Iajuddin requested the ROK government through the ambassador to take measures for reducing trade imbalance, which is against Bangladesh, by allowing more duty free and concessional tariff for Bangladeshi products to their market.

He mentioned that Bangladesh produces quality pharmaceuticals, garments, melamine, ceramic and leather goods and the ROK might import these products at very competitive prices.

He told the envoy that Bangladesh is endowed with

huge population and have experienced teachers, doctors and engineers.

Iajuddin said ROK might utilise Bangladesh's skilled and non-skilled manpower for their development.

He assured the Ambassador of all support and cooperation in discharging his duties in Bangladesh and wished him good health and happiness.

The president, through the envoy, conveyed his greetings to ROK President Roh Moo-hyun and invited him to visit Bangladesh.

He also thanked UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon, who is from the Republic of Korea.

The ambassador said the relations between ROK and Bangladesh are excellent and would be further strengthened in the future.

He told the president that

Korea has invested a huge amount in Bangladesh especially in the exporting processing zones (EPZ). He hailed the government of Bangladesh for giving its decision regarding the EPZ at Chittagong.

The envoy underlined the need for enhancing the exchange of business bodies between the two countries for exploring all avenues of cooperation in the field of trade and commerce.

He requested the government of Bangladesh to further improving the management of receiving and sending manpower to the ROK. He said government to government cooperation is needed in this regard.
