

Writ petition likely today on Hasina's safety on return

A writ petition might be filed with High Court (HC) today for a directive asking the authorities not to arrest or harass Awami League (AL) President Sheikh Hasina on her return from abroad.

A group of lawyers prepare to move in the HC in this regard, Barrister Shafique Ahmed told The Daily Star last evening.

He said, "We are almost done with our preparations. We'll seek a court directive so that she is not detained or harassed without due legal authority."

Party sources said Hasina is likely to return to the country next week.

DEATH IN COALMINE Probe body starts work, to place report in 7 days

A three-member probe committee yesterday started investigating the reasons behind the death of British consultant Albert Barnes Davis and another consultant falling ill inside Barapukuria coalmine on Thursday.

The committee was asked to submit its report within seven days, Barapukuria Coal Mine Company Ltd (BCML) sources said. The probe body arrived at the mining site on Friday.

On Thursday, Petrobangla, parent organisation of BCML, formed the inquiry committee headed by General Manager (Mine Operation) Mohammad Moslem Ahmed, according to official sources.

Colombo sealed off amid attack fears

Police and security forces sealed off Sri Lanka's capital yesterday, searching every vehicle entering and leaving the city amid fears of a Tamil Tiger attack, officials said.

There were huge traffic jams at every entry point to Colombo with motorists spending several hours before they could be allowed in. Doctors and other essential services were also stuck at roadblocks.

"This is part of the operations to prevent Tigers getting into the city," a police official said.

Sixteen people were detained for questioning after the authorities searched nearly 10,000 vehicles and checked identity papers of 16,500 people, police said.

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Bush vows to veto Iraq troop withdrawal bills

President Bush warned Congress Friday that he will continue vetoing war spending bills as long as they contain a timetable for the withdrawal of American troops from Iraq.

Speaking a day after the Democratic-controlled Congress approved legislation that requires that a troop drawdown begin by Oct. 1, Bush said as he has before he will veto it because of that demand. He invited congressional leaders to come to the White House to discuss a new piece of legislation that would not include a timetable, and expressed hope a deal could be reached.

But he made clear that if Democrats insist on including timetables again, he will not hesitate to bring out his veto pen.

"They want to try again that which I've said is unacceptable, of course I won't accept it," the president said during a news conference here with Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe. "I hope it won't come to that."

Passage of the Iraq spending legislation in both houses was not by big enough margins to override a presidential veto. So lawmakers and the White House immediately began talking about a follow-up bill.

Democratic leaders said they hoped to have one ready by June 1. Several Democratic officials have

said the next measure likely will jettison the withdrawal timetable, but may include consequences if the Iraqi government does not meet certain benchmarks, such as expanding democratic participation and allocating oil resources.

Bush has set benchmarks for the Iraqi government, but has steadfastly opposed attaching any timeframe to them or requiring any actions if they are not met.

Senate leaders said Friday that the bill approved Thursday should go to Bush early next week. The White House has not said whether Bush plans a quiet veto or a public ceremony. Spokeswoman Dana

Benazir to return to Pakistan by end of this year

Pakistan's former prime minister Benazir Bhutto will return to her homeland by the end of this year and hopes to hold office again, she said in a newspaper interview published yesterday.

Benazir Bhutto also confirmed that she had "back-channel" contacts with the regime of President Pervez Musharraf, but denied there was any "understanding" between them about her future.

"I plan to go back to Pakistan by the end of the year whether Musharraf would like it or whether he would not like it," she told the Times, calling for corruption cases against her and family members to be dropped.

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15 killed in suicide blast in Pakistan

Minister among several wounded

At least 15 people were killed and a federal minister was among several wounded in a powerful suicide blast at a political rally in northwest Pakistan, police said yesterday.

Interior Minister Aftab Sherpa was addressing the public gathering when the bomber exploded his device near the speaker's platform, provincial police chief Sharif Virk told reporters.

"We have found his severed head and he appears to be an Afghan," he said.

Witnesses said Sherpa had just finished speaking when a man was seen rushing towards the stage before a huge explosion went off.

Local police officer Jehanzib Khan said the minister and his son were among the injured, but an
