


Aussie, Aussie, Aussie

Retiring Australia coach John Buchanan said it was his nation's destiny to be at the cutting edge of cricket after they'd won a third straight World Cup title.

Australia's victory over Sri Lanka by 53 runs in a rain-affected match here at Kensington Oval meant his players gave Buchanan, 54, a winning send-off in his last game as coach after eight years in charge.

Buchanan, whose first-class playing career extended to just seven matches with Queensland in the late 1970s, took charge of Australia shortly after their 1999 World Cup triumph.

Although supervising a gifted side, featuring 2007 World Cup man of the tournament Glenn McGrath, who retired as a player after Saturday's game, and Adam Gilchrist, whose 149 was the highest individual score in a World Cup Final, Buchanan has been credited with extending the team's horizons.

Buchanan, set to concentrate on what had been a motivational speaking sideline, had challenged the rest of the world to match Australia's standards after they beat India in the 2003 World Cup Final in Johannesburg.

The McGrath exit

Glenn McGrath said linking up with old comrade Adam Gilchrist was the perfect way for him to take his last wicket in international cricket after Australia had won their third successive World Cup final with a 53-run win against Sri Lanka.

McGrath, 37, and the man of the tournament after a record-breaking haul of 26 wickets, the most at a single World Cup, had a relatively subdued end to his illustrious career, having already announced he would retire after this event.

But he got in on the act, when having Sri Lanka's Russell Arnold -- also playing his last match for his country before his retirement -- caught by diving wicket-keeper

Gilchrist sprinting forward to take a catch at Kensington Oval here Saturday.

The duo, now only two out of three players along with Australia captain Ricky Ponting to have won three World Cups after starring in the 1999 and 2003 triumphs, have formed a potent combination in both Test and one-day cricket, 'caught Gilchrist bowled McGrath' a familiar mode of dismissal for many batsmen.

"I guess it was nice to finish off with a catch behind with Gilly," McGrath told reporters after Saturday's match having become during the course of the tournament the World Cup's most successful bowler of all-time with 71 wickets.

That was well ahead of Pakistan great Wasim Akram's mark of 55 in 38 matches to the Australian's 39.

"It was the perfect way to finish and I'm happy with that."

And McGrath said he hoped the

over-riding cricketing memory of the first World Cup staged in the Caribbean would be Australia's sustained excellence rather than the chaos in the final's closing moments.

Players, rightly thinking the game was over, were forced back onto the field by anumping blunder after officials wrongly ruled Sri Lanka had to bat out the day in pitch-black conditions.

"I think it would be disappointing if you focussed on 15 or 20 minutes of the whole tournament rather than the way we played throughout," said McGrath.

"In my mind we didn't just want to win every game in the tournament, but win every game convincingly and I think we achieved that and hopefully that is how this tournament will be remembered."

Ponting had wanted McGrath, Test cricket's most successful

finals.

Pakistan were the first victims when they lost by eight wickets against Steve Waugh's Australians who finished the 50-over final at the 21st over at Lord's in 1999 after a superb spell from leg-spinner Shane Warne.

Warne grabbed four wickets to

restrict Pakistan to a modest 132 before Gilchrist finished the match with a half-century.

Ponting hijacked the 2003 final against India at Johannesburg as he smashed an unbeaten 140 to set up a 360-run target, which always looked beyond Sourav Ganguly's side.

Tushar likely to return

The national selectors are expected to discuss on one change when they meet this morning to finalise the one-day squad for next month's home series against India.

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) will announce a 14-member team for the three-match series against Rahul Dravid's side.

Although the selection panel hinted at an unchanged squad from the World Cup side, middle-order batsman Tushar Imran looks set to get back his place. Rajin Saleh, who returned from the Caribbean without playing any match, is likely to make way for Tushar.

Tushar, the right-hander who recently captained Bangladesh A in the home series against England and the away series in Sri Lanka, is in good touch.

The axe can also fall on right-arm paceman Shahadat Hossain. The Test team for the two-match series will be announced during the one-day series.

Ticketing rights go to AB Bank

SL fans satisfied

Disappointed Sri Lankan cricket fans drew solace Sunday from their team's performance despite seeing them lose to Australia in the World Cup final.

The team responded well when rain forced the match to be cut short to 38 overs, which upset their momentum and favoured Australia, the fans said.

"We are a side playing very orthodox cricket with a natural flair. The overs restriction was something that was not in our game plan," said Hashan Tillakaratne, a member of the Sri Lankan team that won the World Cup in 1996.

Popular commentator Roshan Abeyasinghe said the shortened innings suited Australia's attacking

batsmen.

"We do not have the players to play the power game required in that type of scenario -- the 38 over slogan was tailor made for them," the Sri Lankan said.

Australia completed a 53-run victory on the Duckworth-Lewis method in virtual darkness at the Kensington Oval in Barbados on Saturday, winning the World Cup for a record third successive time.

Adam Gilchrist's blitzkrieg was a key factor in the match, said coach and cricket writer Ranjan Paranavithana.

"He was unstoppable and was playing the same sort of destructive innings played by Clive Lloyd and Viv Richards in previous cup finals," he said.

Sri Lanka's bowlers contained Matthew Hayden and Ricky Ponting relatively well, but Gilchrist's superlative performance took them by surprise, Paranavithana said.

The island nation's fans believe

the Sri Lankans faced a team simply too good for them on the day.

"I feel sorry for them. They did try their best and it is not a disgrace," said Sonali Perera, a bank employee.

She and her colleagues would greet the team on its return despite the loss, Perera said.

Elderly fan Stanley Weerasinghe said everyone knew the Australians were powerful and blamed bad luck.

"Sri Lankans just did not have the luck. They will be a powerful team at the next World Cup with only Jayasuriya, Muralidaran and Atapattu likely to retire by then," he said.

Sri Lanka's captain Mahela Jayawardene was unlucky with the toss and if it had not rained and Sri Lanka had batted first, then it
