

Selim-Rosey: Heart to heart

How they first met

Rosey: Selim was quite established as an actor. Before we got to know each other well, one winter morning I saw him riding his bike. Call it a woman's intuition, but I immediately felt that we were going to have a relationship of some sort, not necessarily romantic, but some connection.

Selim: We were part of different theatre groups back in early 90's. We used to watch each other perform and I first noticed Rosey when she was playing this character -- *shidur* (vermillion) daubed on her forehead -- looking breathtakingly beautiful.

Rosey: Obviously Selim!

Selim: Me. One day after shooting I took Rosey to an ice cream shop. She was laid back and I approached her directly; told her that I wanted to marry her and if she refused I would never marry. Initially Rosey was speechless. Then she asked me to talk to her father. The following Friday I went to her dad and asked for her hand. Though I was very polite I didn't forget to mention that if he didn't consent to that we would simply elope. Fortunately he agreed immediately. On December 16, 1993 we got married.

Selim: As Rosey said, no one really sacrificed. I have always believed in one's freedom to choose. Yes, Rosey has reduced her workload but then again she gets to spend more time with the kids. I miss that.

Do you criticise each other's work? What do you dislike about each other?

Rosey: Though Selim is almost 10 years older to me, I have always criticised him when necessary. If I had been the silent type then we

probably would have fought less. I remember the early days of our marriage where I would say things, which Selim wouldn't like, and we would end up not talking for days. His temper is something I am not fond of. However, it is natural for any couple to fight and we have both grown in this relationship. We have come to accept each other's negative aspects.

Selim: I do try to guide her if she needs it. Rosey was brought up in a more pampered environment. I am completely respectful of her professional decisions but she is quite indecisive. I don't generally discourage her, but at times I end

up lecturing her. She has often complained I am like the principal of her school. There is almost nothing I dislike about her. I understand and respect her individuality.

Interesting habits?

Rosey: Selim is particular about not messing up things. He ties the ends of his handkerchiefs so that when he needs one he can untie one and keep the rest in place. He is so precise at times it's like he is a robot.

Selim: Rosey always has this fear factor working for her and goes to extremes. Even if she has a common flu she will immediately make a diagnosis that she has some grave illness.

What has been your mantra for 14 years of marital bliss?

Rosey: Though Selim is hot tempered he generally is right. He is outspoken and brutally honest. I love this about him though often people misunderstand him. I also believe in being close to one's roots. Though both of us have attained stardom we come from modest middle class families. We try to incorporate our values in our children.

In conversation with Shoma

With her impressive performance in the movie *Nondito Norok-e*, Shumona Shoma made her presence felt in the film industry.

She followed that up with a more conventional role in the commercially successful movie *Na Bolona*. Currently several filmmakers are keen to cast her in their films. In a recent interview with *The Daily Star* (TDS) the talented actress talked about her budding film career and more. Excerpts from the interview:

TDS: Your role as Rabeya in *Nondito Norok-e* was well appreciated. However, you haven't signed that many movies since then. Why?

Shoma: Since *Nondito Norok-e*, I have done another movie -- *Na Bolona*. Like any committed artiste, I want to act in quality films. If I receive offers for such movies I will certainly be a part of it.

TDS: Do you currently have any such offer?

Shoma: I have received quite a few offers recently. But I've tried to set a standard with my roles in *Nondito Norok-e* and *Na Bolona*. I don't want to disappoint my audience with run of the mill work.

TDS: You are also very active in television...

Shoma: I made my entry in the media through Television. After taking part in the *Anandadhar Photoshundori* pageant, I got offers to act in TV plays. Later I joined the theatre troupe Aranyak Natyadol. I've also worked in several TV commercials.

TDS: Did your background encourage you to become an actor?

Shoma: I'm from Khulna. As a child I grew up in an environment surrounded by healthy cultural and political practices. In school and college I was involved with Uidchi Shilpi Gosthi and Bangladesh Student's Union. Conse-

quently, I participated in several cultural and political programmes on a regular basis. One day an advertisement in the magazine *Anandadhar Photoshundori* pageant grabbed my attention and I sent my photos. My success in the contest increased my level of confidence.

TDS: Have you experienced a shift?

Shoma: I am not sure if I actually felt the shift. But after spending some time here I could feel that a strong attachment for

the medium is growing in me. Now it has become my passion.

TDS: How did you prepare yourself for your breakthrough performance in *Nondito Norok-e*?

Shoma: In the movie, my character Rabeya was a young woman whose psychological state was that of a 9/10 year old. I read the novel by Humayun Ahmed several times. While doing the movie director Belal Ahmed would explain the whole situation to me and I tried to follow his instructions.

I read about her in the column *Manush Manusher Jonno* in a daily newspaper and went to visit her with a few other artists.

The first thing that came to mind on seeing her: If we truly have a conscience and are supportive of the people who tirelessly work to uphold and promote our culture, we will show our support to Camellia apa at this stage of her life.

I would like to request our artistes, cultural organisations and the people of this country to extend a helping hand to Camellia apa. Whatever little you can contribute can make a world of a difference. I do thank Dr. Ashish and the Ayesha Memorial Hospital for their support. However, that alone is not enough to save Camellia Mustafa.

Letting committed artistes fade away is a national shame. I hope everyone realises that.


