The two candidates -- right-winger Nicolas Sarkozy and Socialist Segolene Royal -- closed their campaigns Friday at midnight in accordance with election rules, and began steeling themselves for Sunday's vote.

Opinion polls were banned on the eve of the election, but all

Inflation to continue hurting economy

Says BB report

Bangladesh Bank (BB) has projected continuous inflation in the domestic economy due to constant external pressure on prices and demand side.

The central bank in a study published in its October-December quarterly also assumed that Indian inflation would appear to have a more direct effect on the Bangladesh food price induced inflation than price developments in other food-exporting countries.

"The moderation of inflation in the quarter under review is mainly attributed to seasonal factors. Both the external pressure on prices and

demand side inflationary expectations in the domestic economy, however, appear to persist," the study said.

However in a rapidly globalising world, it would be important for the policy makers to monitor future development of food prices in India and in other potential trading partners, it said.

The net impact of recent fuel price is unlikely to be significant but it would have effect on poor people, whose livelihood depends on the use of kerosene and diesel. The toll is likely to be significant unless alleviated through targeted means of transfers, preferably in cash, it said.

The BB study said the gradual easing of consumer price index (CPI) inflation, which had started in the first quarter of the current fiscal year (FY) also continued in the second quarter. The December inflation figures came well within the central bank's target of up to 7 per cent set for the first half of the current FY.

In order to catch up with the cost of imported oil, domestic prices have just been announced to go up immediately, which will result in a one-shot increase in CPI followed by a round of gradual adjustment, it said.

10 army aspirants, 7 cops die in suicide blast

Ten army recruits were killed and 13 wounded on Saturday when a suicide bomber detonated his explosive vest at their recruitment centre west of Baghdad, a security official said.

The recruits were from the largely rural tribal area not far from Abu Ghraib, and part of an effort to get Sunni tribesmen into the secu-

rity forces to combat Iraq's insurgency, a Fallujah police officer told AFP.

Insurgents frequently target recruiting centres for Iraq's fledgling police and army.

Five more US soldiers have been killed in attacks in Baghdad and the restive western province of Anbar, the US military reported on Friday.

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Judicial body to probe death of indigenous leader

A one-member judicial commission has been formed to investigate the death of indigenous community leader Chalesh Ritchil reportedly in the custody of the army-led joint forces on March 18.

The commission, headed by retired District and Sessions judge Md Rafiquddin, will submit its report as early as possible, said a home ministry spokesman.

Police claimed Chalesh was critically injured during a chase by the joint forces near Kakrail of Madhupur under Tangail district in the evening of March 18. He was taken to Madhupur upazila health

UAE to give compensation to victims

The governments of Bangladesh and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) on April 25, under which the UAE government has agreed to compensate all children including the injured ones who were used as camel jockeys in the UAE, says a press release.

The MoU was signed by Bangladesh Secretary for Home Mohammad Abdul Karim and his counterpart from the UAE government.

Under the agreement, the UAE government has agreed to pay a minimum of \$1,000 to all the Bangladeshi children who had worked as camel jockeys since January 1, 1993. The amount could

Drug policy lacks control over price

Experts have urged scrapping the drug policy formulated in 2005 as the policy lacking 'specific price control mechanism' has led to the retail price hike of drugs, much to the suffering of the patients.

The policy formulated in 1982 had clearly said that the government would control the retail price of drugs and publish it in a gazette form to prevent selling of drugs at additional prices but the obligation to control the retail price of drugs was withdrawn in the policy of 2005.

Taking the advantage of new drug policy, different pharmaceutical companies are selling the same drug at different prices,

experts said.

Although a top source of Bangladesh Association of Pharmaceutical Industries (BAPI), who was also a member of Drug Policy Committee 2005, said retail price of 500 mg Ciprofloxacin is Tk 10.00, the correspondent found consumers buying it for Tk 14.00. Production cost of this antibiotic is only Tk 1.70.

A drug policy is supposed to direct how the prices of drugs would be fixed on the basis of raw materials and packaging materials.

But except in case of some 117 commonly used essential drugs, there is no control over price whereas around 200 companies are manufacturing drugs of more than 14,000 brand names, said

Sayedur Rahman Khosru, an associate professor of the Department of Pharmacology, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University.

"The drug policy formulated in 2005 does not respond to the people's interest and it is not a policy at all," said Dr Zafrullah Chowdhury, Projects Coordinator of Gonoshasthya Kendra, who was also a member of Drug Policy Committee in 1982.

The faulty policy creates anarchy in drug market that has been flooded with unnecessary and harmful drugs, he said, adding that while the increased price of drugs leads to smuggling of drugs worth Tk 700 to 1,000 crore every year only from India, the average yearly

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Kenyan plane crashes with 114 on board

A Kenya Airways passenger plane with 114 people on board crashed yesterday after taking off from Douala airport in Cameroon on a flight to Nairobi, officials said.

An airline official said rescue teams were trying to find the site of the crash, and there was no immediate word on any casualties.

"We are trying to get to the area of the crash, but the weather is really bad. We are getting help from the army," a Kenya Airways official told AFP in Cameroon.

Air traffic controllers picked up a distress signal from the missing airliner just after it took off from Douala during a violent storm, a

source linked to the Agency for the Safety of Aerial Navigation in Africa said.

Two Cameroonian army helicopters began searching a wide area south of the line between Douala and the capital Yaounde, 250 kilometres (180 miles) to the east, to try to locate the aircraft.

"The plane has crashed," an official with the Kenyan Civil Aviation Authority, who asked not to be named, told AFP.

However, the chief executive officer for Kenya Airways, Titus Naikuni, said he could not confirm the crash.

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
