Former Bangladesh captain Akram Khan has been appointed as a member of the national selection committee to replace Golam Nowsher Prince who resigned from the post on personal grounds.

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) disclosed the appointment yesterday although the expaceman Prince, who is all set to emigrate, had tendered his resignation letter on April 18.

Akram will join the committee, headed by Faruque Ahmed, from June 1 after completing his domestic duty with the DOHS Club while Prince's resignation has been accepted with effect from May 31.

The second-term two-year contract of the current selection panel will expire at the end of July this year and it is unlikely that Faruque and former national opener Athar Ali Khan will continue the job for another term.

It was learnt that Faruque and Athar will convey a decision about whether they will renew their contract to the board within a

week.

"The fact is that the team is shaping up but still I am personally thinking about whether it would be good to quit the job at the top. But we have still more than two months in our hand," said Faruque, who welcomed the appointment of Akram, yesterday.

"It is not only a matter whether board will renew our contract rather it's also a subject of whether we will be interested to continue the job," he added.

Stadium, that he is well tuned to strike blows against the touring Indians in this month's home series.

It will be wrong to think that the 23-year old 'Narail Express' is only getting ready for fireworks with the leather. Judging from performances in the recent past a repeat of his feat against the star-studded Indian team in the World Cup, the speedster looks set to contribute significantly with the bat as well during the course of the demanding series.

The right-arm pace spearhead, who sunk Rahul Dravid's men in the preliminary round of the World Cup with a four-wicket burst to design his side's five-wicket victory, finished his ten-over spell without success but bowled with venom on a pitch where it was not an easy task for the pace bowlers.

Then the big-hearted cricketer played a magnificent knock of 49 from 63 balls that featured four

boundaries and a six in a surface that was also not too favourable for batting in the second session, with the ball keeping low.

His effort was however not good enough to save his side (Bangladesh Green XI) from an 11-run defeat against Habibul Bashar's Bangladesh Red XI.

"My main duty is to do the best with the ball but I am also ready to serve my team with the bat as much as possible. I am really enjoying the game in both bowling and batting," said a sweating Mashrafe.

Replying to a question of whether he would try to bowl in the series with similar pace (140kph or above) as he had against India in the World Cup, he said that his main concentration would be to bowl to a spot.

"It will be a big challenge for the pacers to bowl in this surface that's why my main aim will be to bowl in one spot. I will definitely be successful if I can bowl in one channel. I don't want to comment on speed right at the moment," he informed.

Bashar expressed his satisfaction over the preparation game as he said that their main objective was to familiarise themselves with the pitch and the immense heat as they were going to play the first one-day of the three-match series

on May 10 on the same surface.

"Our main objective was to see the pitch. I don't want to make any comments on the behaviour of the pitch but what I can only say is that it is not too different from our expectations," said Bashar adding that his boys were enjoying everything ahead of the series.

It was however evident in the match that it would be difficult for the team who will bat second.

Chief selector Faruque Ahmed however looked satisfied with the pitch and he believes the conditions will suit his team to show their character against India during the three-match one-day series.

"We are not unhappy with the character of the pitch and I think the match they played here today will help them a lot in the two one-dayers," said the former Bangladesh skipper who hinted that there is little chance to see out-of-form Shahriar Nafees opening the innings with young sensation Tamim Iqbal.

Mohammad Rafique, Abdur Razzak and Shakib Al Hasan, the left-arm trio who had a tremendous World Cup, had a combined six-wicket haul in the match but what is encouraging for the team think-tank is that the trio will get

What's common between the Indian cricket team and the All Blacks, New Zealand's national rugby team? What does Sachin Tendulkar share with Ryan Giggs? Yoga, the ancient Indian art.

The All Blacks do not travel without a yoga expert; Giggs swears yoga has extended his career in its twilight by helping him get over a hamstring problem he had for years. And now yoga could be helping Tendulkar sort out his various injury problems.

It's an irony that yoga, the most

quintessential and traditional Indian exercise technique, has caught up with the Indian team after it's been around the world, as it were. There was a yoga trainer during John Wright's days as India coach and at conditioning camps in the early days of Greg Chappell's tenure but it went off the radar soon after.

The practice has now been revived but, in keeping with the enigma and intrigue surrounding Indian cricket, details are at a premium. After three days of persistent questioning by the media the credentials of Sukhdev Kumar, the yoga trainer currently working with the Indian team, were revealed by Surendra Bhawe, the administrative manager. Kumar,

who has been spending about half an hour with the team after every practice session, will not travel to Bangladesh.

Kumar has been drafted in by Ravi Shastri, with whom he had worked with in Singapore, where he is based. Kumar has also worked with Ernie Els and Jyoti Randhawa, the golfers, Wasim Akram and Vijay Amritraj, the former tennis player.

Yoga isn't new to cricket; the Australian team that toured India in 2004-05 came with a yoga instructor on their support staff. That's when Justin Langer got hooked to the art. On the same tour, Langer took time out to visit

Shastri said the seniors deserved respect from the fans.

Shastri, appointed on an interim basis after Australian Greg Chappell quit as coach last month, said he had been advising the players to enjoy their game.

"If you don't enjoy what you are doing, forget about winning."

Shastri, a former Indian captain, also said the players had left behind the World Cup disappointment and were focused on the Bangladesh tour.

"We have left behind what happened at the World Cup. The players are now raring to give their best."

Dravid fit to tour

Rahul Dravid will be fit to lead India on their tour of Bangladesh despite suffering a facial injury.

Dravid was batting when he was struck between the helmet visor and grille by a ball from seamer RP Singh during a preparation camp.

He suffered bruising to his nose and face but manager Ravi Shastri said: "Rahul is fine. He will brush off that injury. He is a tough cookie."

India play three one-day internationals and two Tests against Bangladesh.

The first one-day match starts in Dhaka on Thursday.

Earlier in the week, Sachin Tendulkar injured his right ankle during a similar practice session.

Tendulkar, who was scheduled only to play in the Test matches, has yet to fully recover but has since taken part in some batting practice.

Shastri said: "He is hungry for runs and he will prove his worth."

India suffered a shock defeat to Bangladesh in the World Cup and were knocked out of the tournament at the first round stage.

Shastri urged fans to "be patient, give them a little bit of time."

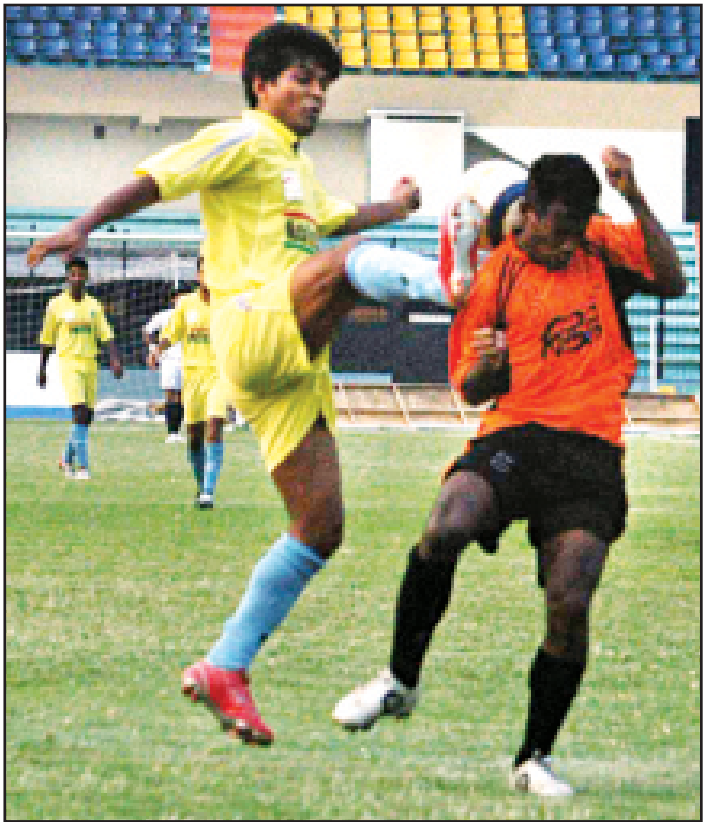
