United hold off celebrations

Sir Alex Ferguson has slapped an alcohol ban on his players until after Wednesday's trip to Chelsea, regardless of whether they have clinched the Premiership trophy by then.

Saturday's 1-0 victory over derby rivals Manchester City at Eastlands meant Chelsea had to beat Arsenal at the Emirates Stadium on Sunday to keep the title battle alive.

But after watching Cristiano Ronaldo notch his 23rd goal of the season with the match-winning penalty on Saturday, Ferguson informed his players that he did not want any celebrations ahead of the trip to Stamford Bridge.

The Scot, who cancelled a trip to Spain in favour of spending the rest of the bank holiday on the golf course, said: "Hopefully Arsenal can do us a favour now and we can get the result we want. A draw would be fine."

"If we have to go to Chelsea and get a result then we'll look forward to it, but we have a great chance (of winning the title)."

United, meanwhile, will ask the Premier League and the Football Association to launch an investigation into a crude challenge by Michael Ball on Ronaldo in the second minute of the game.

Ball waited until referee Rob Styles had turned his back before stamping on the chest of the Portugal international.

Ferguson was furious that the incident went unpunished and is keen for the matter to be dealt with this week.

Ronaldo left the field with a stud

mark across his stomach and Ball will now face a trial by video.

If charged with violent conduct and subsequently found guilty, the former Everton and Rangers defender will face a ban for the start of next season.

City manager Stuart Pearce said: "People have mentioned this tackle to me but I've not seen it. These things can happen in football matches like this one."

"We will review the incident by video and take a decision from there. I'm also sure the authorities will do what they have to do."

Provided Pearce remains in charge for next season he will be desperate to clear-out some of his strikers and make new signings in the wake of a poor season.

Georgios Samaras, Paul Dickov, Bernardo Corradi and Darius Vassell could all find themselves surplus to requirements this summer.

City have set a new club record for the lowest number of home league goals scored in a season with just ten, including just one since New Year's Day.

Pearce could be handed a significant transfer kitty should chairman John Wardle sell the club to a Thai consortium and he said: "Scoring goals has been our Achilles heel all season. We haven't had enough cutting edge in attack and this is something we will have to look at."

Ferguson, meanwhile, has warned Ronaldo that he wants a chance to win his money back from the bet he lost to him over how many goals he would score this season.

Ferguson added: "I want my money back so it all depends on what I set my target at for next season, but he's had a wonderful campaign."

Ronaldinho guides Barca

League leaders Barcelona threw down the gauntlet to their main rivals for the Spanish title, and pushed Real Sociedad closer to relegation, with a 2-0 win over the Basque side on Saturday.

Spanish international playmaker Andres Iniesta and Samuel Eto'o, last season's top scorer in the Spanish first division, got second half goals to edge the Catalan club closer to their third successive La Liga crown.

"This was an important victory not just because we stay on top of the league but also after our recent bad results away from home," said Barcelona coach Frank Rijkaard, whose team now have a four point lead with five games to go.

Rijkaard was well aware that Barca had lost four of their last five away trips prior to their win on Saturday, which has left the door open for their nearest rivals Sevilla and Real Madrid.

"What also pleased me was the

way we played. Every player was deserved a hug and to celebrate this victory," added Rijkaard.

Nevertheless, the Dutchman will know in his heart that despite his diplomatic words the main plaudits should go to Ronaldinho whose vision and creativity made both the Barca goals.

After dominating the first half, Iniesta ended the deadlock barely a minute after the break.

Ronaldinho showed just why he has twice been voted as the World

Player of the Year with an outstanding pass from just outside his own box, the Brazilian spotting Iniesta was lurking unmarked on the edge of the opposition area.

The midfield playmaker ran onto the long pass and then went around Sociedad goalkeeper Claudio Bravo before slotting the ball over the crossbar.

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"Barcelona were worthy winners but we are not down-and-out. We didn't play like condemned men," reflected Real Sociedad coach Miguel Angel Lotina, whose team remain second from bottom.

Real Sociedad have not been outside of the top flight of Spanish football for 40 years, since they won the Spanish second division in 1967.

Second-placed Sevilla have a game in hand over Barca as they play at Real Madrid on Sunday.

Real are in third place, one point further back.

Barcelona nearly went further ahead just after the hour but Eto'o was judged to be offside and last season's top scorer in the Spanish first division had his goal annulled.

Lionel Messi and Ronaldinho also nearly added to the Barca tally before Eto'o notched up his 10th goal of the season two minutes from the whistle.

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Ronaldinho, who put behind him some mediocre performances recently, provided a defence-splitting pass for Eto'o to latch onto and the Cameroon striker was deadly accurate with a right foot shot from the edge of the area.

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The Spanish football association's competitions committee decided on Thursday to cancel the yellow card that Beckham had picked up during Real's 4-1 win at Athletic Bilbao last Sunday.

"In European football the rules are serious but in Spain it is a joke. Everyone else has to obey the rules so I don't understand why Real Madrid don't have to do the same," Sevilla's angry coach Juande Ramos said on Friday.

Valencia stay in fourth and on course to return to the Champions League next season with a 2-1 win at Deportivo La Coruna.

The only Spanish team in this season's Champions League drew first blood after 39 minutes when David Silva's shot spun off the back of Deportivo defender Alberto Lopo and Hugo Viana was on hand to score from close range.

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BUNDESLIGA Schalke still top

Kevin Kuranyi kept Schalke 04 on course for a first Bundesliga crown since 1958 with the winning goal in a 1-0 victory over Nuremberg on Saturday.

Stuttgart, however, are keeping close to the German league leaders. A 2-0 victory over Mainz 05 leaves them just a point adrift and well on target for automatic qualification for the Champions League group stages.

Werder Bremen, knocked out in the semi-finals of the UEFA Cup on Thursday, lie five points behind Schalke in third spot but have a chance to reduce their deficit at Hertha Berlin on Sunday.

Bayern Munich meanwhile could only draw 1-1 at relegation-bound Borussia Monchengladbach, that result leaving the reigning champions in fourth spot, which would prove enough for UEFA Cup football next season, 11 points behind Schalke.

Fergie wants Mourinho stay

Alex Ferguson admits he would be sorry to see the back of arch-rival Jose Mourinho despite the two managers' recent war of words.

Mourinho's future has been thrown into doubt at Chelsea following the London club's exit from the Champions League and failure to keep track with Ferguson's Manchester United in the Premiership title race.

Failure to beat Arsenal at the Emirates Stadium 24 hours after United beat neighbours City in the Manchester derby will bring an end to Chelsea's two-year reign of champions ahead of Ferguson's side's visit to face Mourinho and his players on May 9.

Chelsea's recent slips have been accompanied by a growing number of Mourinho outbursts that had already announced this season would be her last.

Clijsters announces retirement

"After the fantastic and moving farewell in Antwerp all good things must come to an end."

Clijsters admitted she could have carried on but the hunger was gone.

"It would have been easy for me to compete in several more tournaments and earn more money but my health and my enjoyment of life are more important for me than the money," said Clijsters, whose father Leo had a stellar career as a Belgian international footballer reaching the 1986 World Cup semi-finals where they lost to Argentina.

Clijsters lost in the Antwerp final to Frenchwoman Amelie Mauresmo, but the Belgian said that concerns over injury and the constant effort to remain at the top had finally taken their toll.

"It has been more than beautiful. But it's time to hang up my racket for good," said Clijsters, who had already announced this season would be her last.

"The constantly returning injuries, the laborious crawl out of bed in the morning and the time it

takes to warm up tired muscles ... make it all the more difficult to continue."

The 23-year-old Clijsters won her last WTA crown at Sydney in January and was eliminated from the Warsaw WTA event this week in the first round by Ukrainian qualifier Julia Vakulenko in straight sets.

She is due to marry Lynch in July.

"I am now going to devote my time to organising my wedding on July 14," she said.

"With all that going on it will become increasingly difficult to focus on tennis."

The league leaders went in front in the 34th minute when Ronaldo scored from the spot after being fouled by Michael Ball.
