HSC exam begins Thursday

UNB, Dhaka

The Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC) and its equivalent examinations, including Alim and HSC (BM), will begin across the country on Thursday.

Addressing a press conference at his office yesterday, Education Adviser Ayub Qadri said as many as 541,817 students will sit for the exams this year under Dhaka, Rajshahi, Comilla, Jessore, Chittagong, Barisal, Sylhet, Madrasa and Technical education boards.

Of the total, 129,179 students will appear under Dhaka Education Board, 104,394 under Rajshahi, 46,573 under Comilla, 80,535 under Jessore, 37,764 under Chittagong, 24,599 under Barisal and 17,204 under Sylhet education boards from 1007 centres.

Some 52,034 students will appear in Alim exams under Bangladesh Madrasa Education Board from 345 centres and 49,535 students will sit for HSC (BM) exams under Bangladesh Technical

Hawa Bhaban active again to rule BNP

A group of people close to Hawa Bhaban and Tarique Rahman have taken initiatives to persuade the BNP chief to make changes in the upper echelon of the party in an attempt to re-establish their own supremacy in the embattled organisation.

According to sources, the Hawa Bhaban clique wants to convince Chairperson Khaleda Zia to take disciplinary actions against some reformist senior leaders of the party, accusing them of not playing the expected role against the arrest of Senior Joint Secretary General Tarique Rahman and against the virtual 'house arrest' of the party chief.

The clique, which has become controversial for its members activities in the last five years, is opposing some of the senior party leaders' move to bring reforms to the organisation, saying that reforms cannot be brought while the party chairperson is not accessible and the senior joint secretary general is in jail.

Party sources said the coterie of Hawa Bhaban people in a recent meeting decided to persuade the party chief to bring changes in the party's higher echelon deposing some leaders from their posts, especially those who are interested in bringing reforms to the party.

The group also discussed the party's current predicament in a series of meetings at two newspaper offices in the last few weeks as they consider those offices as safe places for such meetings, since most of these controversial per-

sons had gone into hidings after the declaration of the state of emergency, who are now trying to make their reappearances public only after the government issued a press note denying that there is any restriction on Khaleda Zia's movement.

Following the suggestion of the Hawa Bhaban people Khaleda Zia already made her younger brother Saeed Iskandar a vice-president of the party, giving rise to a new controversy, which prompted some leaders including former ministers Osman Farruk and Hannan Shah to term the appointment as untimely.

"These people made the party chairperson's office controversial by engaging in corruption while the party was in power, now they are trying to create a gap between

China plans to divert Brahmaputra waters

Environmentalists fear huge eco disaster in Bangladesh

China plans to construct a dam at Yarlung Tsangpo point on the Brahmaputra River in Tibet province to divert 200 billion cubic metres of water annually to the Yellow River threatening a major ecological disaster in Bangladesh within the next few years.

Experts and environmentalists fear Bangladesh would turn into a desert in the near future as water flow of Brahmaputra-Jamuna river, which is about 60 per cent of the total water flow, will fall drastically if China builds the dam on the Brahmaputra.

According to morphologist Maminul Haque Sarker of Centre for Environmental and Geographic Information Services (CEGIS), one-third water flow of Brahmaputra-Jamuna would decline if the

Indian cricket team in town

India arrived here yesterday morning to play three one-dayers and two Tests against the Tigers.

The wounded Indians, who were sent packing by Bangladesh from the first round of the just-concluded World Cup in the West Indies, took a short flight from Kolkata to reach Dhaka for their second full series after they had played their first one in 2004.

India won their first series quite comfortably, clinching the Test series 2-0 and lifting the one-day series 2-1.

But after Bangladesh's glorious five-wicket victory against Rahul Dravid's boys in the Caribbean, the latest series that start with the three one-dayers got enormous attention among fans of the two neighbouring countries.

While Dravid's India, without their two great sporting icons -- Sachin Tendulkar and Sourav

Charges framed against Bangla Bhai's wife, 3 JMB men

Speedy Trial Tribunal Court-1 in Dhaka on Sunday noon framed charge against four JMB men including Fahima Farjana, wife of executed militant kingpin Siddikul Islam Bangla Bhai, in the case filed for December 8, 2005 bomb blast in front of Udichi office in the district town, Netrakona police said.

The three other accused are -- Asaduzzaman Asad alias Panir, Salauddin alias Sohel, and Yunus Ali alias Kawar Ahmed, an absconder.

Asaduzzaman, Fahima and Salauddin were produced before the court.

This is the first time a charge has been framed against Fahima.

Eight people were killed and 50 others injured in a suicide bomb blast in front of Netrakona Udichi office on December 8 in 2005.

Hold talks before, after budget in absence of JS

Former adviser to a caretaker government Akbar Ali Khan has suggested that the caretaker government hold consultation meetings before and after the budget declaration to fulfil the constitutions in the absence of a parliament in the country.

The parliament is not effective for holding budget discussions but there is no bar to holding consultations with the people, he said while addressing as chief guest at a pre-budget discussion in the capital yesterday.

Referring to Article 38 of the constitution, Akbar said there should not be any taxation without the act of parliament. "As parliament is not effective and there is hardly any chance of its being formed in next 18 months, the government should hold consultations and discussions with the people about the tax measures in the upcoming budget," he said.

The finance adviser should give at least 15 days' time after budget speech to discuss the budget measures at various forums before finally declaring the budget through an ordinance, he added.

Iraq reels from spate of blasts

Car bombs kill 20

APP, Baghdad

Suicide car bombers killed 20 more Iraqis yesterday as Iraqi and American forces battled to regain the initiative after a day of carnage left eight US soldiers and a European journalist dead.

Colonel Tareq al-Dulaimi, a senior security official in Anbar province, said Monday's first bomb exploded in a market just north of Ramadi and the second 15 minutes later at a police checkpoint two kilometres (one mile) away.

"Ten were killed in each explosion and both were from suicide car bombs," said Dulaimi, speaking by telephone from the provincial capital. "Five of those killed were police," he added.

The Ramadi blasts came after Sunday saw a fierce surge in insurgent attacks, including a car bombing in a Baghdad shopping street, a suicide assault on a Samarra police station and a deadly ambush on an American patrol.

"There are going to be these rough spots and the enemy is not just going to sit back and wait for us to clean them out and be done with it," said Major Joe Edstrom, a US military public affairs officer.

"We have to expect that there will be days like this. We are just going to do what they always do and just drive on, press forward, take measures and steps and
