

Political will needed to solve indigenous people's problems

Speakers tell Bapa roundtable

Speakers at a roundtable yesterday called for political will to solve the problems of indigenous people including the problems prevailing in forest areas of the country.

They said many projects have been taken by the forest department with the assistance of international donor agencies since 50s where the views of indigenous people were not considered at all.

Rather those who opposed the projects were harassed by false cases, and even lost their lives, they added.

The roundtable titled 'Eco park, indigenous people and environment Madhupur experience' was organised by Bangladesh Paribesh Andolon (Bapa) at Women's Voluntary Association auditorium in the city.

Vice-president of Bapa Prof Kazi Modina presided over the roundtable where its General Secretary Mahidul Haq Khan delivered the welcome speech.

Prof Modina called upon people to work unitedly for the welfare of the marginal groups and proper maintenance of environment.

Prof Khondokar Mokaddem

Hossain of Dhaka University (DU) and Prof Farida Khanam of Bangladesh Environment Network presented keynote speech at the roundtable.

Indicating the political solution of indigenous people's problems, Prof Akmal Hossain said it needs changes in state policy after preparing a set of recommendations.

Prof Hossain, ASM Atikur Rahman and Dr Mahbuba Nasrin of DU, Executive Director of SEHD Philip Gain, Sanjeeb Drong, Zakir Hossain, Pavel Partho, Dr Abdul Hai Majumder and Mihir Biswas also spoke on the occasion.

Scientists announce cancer drug breakthrough

Australian scientists yesterday said they have developed a cancer treatment which could deliver lethal doses of drugs to tumours without the usual harmful side-effects such as nausea and hair loss.

Research scientist Jennifer MacDiarmid said the cutting-edge technique uses nanotechnology to create particles which directly attack cancer cells with a "lethal payload" of drugs, without flooding the body with toxic chemicals.

Treatments such as chemotherapy typically involve subjecting the patient's entire body to the powerful drugs in order to kill the cancer, causing debilitating side-effects that the new, targeted technique would eliminate.

"Your hair wouldn't fall out, you wouldn't throw up... some chemotherapy is life-threatening in itself," MacDiarmid told APP.

MacDiarmid said scientists at Sydney-based biotechnology company EnGeneIC, where she is a managing director, used a bacteria cell stripped of reproductive powers to develop a particle capable of carrying any chemotherapy drug.

The nano-cell, which is about one-fifth the size of a normal cell, is then tagged with antibodies which are attracted to cancerous tumours. Once the cell hits the cancer, the drug is released directly into the malignant growth.

"There is no other system where you can get so much drug concentrated into a little parcel," MacDiarmid said.

The results of animal trials published this week in the US-based journal Cancer Cell show that the technique has reduced tumours in animals without toxic side-effects and by using only a very small amount of drugs.

MacDiarmid said the treatment could potentially be used on any solid tumours including those in the breasts, ovaries, colon and lungs.

In future, the treatment could allow for the creation of customised drug "cocktails" to be used on patients to counter drug resistance, she said.



Five killed in road accidents

Five people, including two children, were killed and 36 others injured in separate road accidents in Faridpur, Sirajganj and Mymensingh in the last two days.

In Faridpur, two members of a bridal party were killed and another injured yesterday afternoon.

Local sources said a brick-laden truck rammed into a motorcycle carrying three riders at about 3:30pm at Mohishala village in Boalmari, killing two on the spot and injuring one.

The dead were identified as Babul Biswas, 25, and Hafizur Biswas, 35, of Garakholi village in Madhukhali upazila.

Seriously injured Mithun was admitted to Madhukhali Hospital.

The three were leading the bridal party, which was going to Shotasia village in the upazila.

A case was filed with Boalmari thana.

Police seized the truck, but the driver and helper managed to escape.

Sirajganj

A man was killed and 35 people, including a staff reporter of Bangladesh Television, were injured in separate road accidents in the district yesterday.

Police said the first accident took place at 12:00 noon as a bus overturned at Sarutia in Sadar upazila, killing an unidentified man and injuring 30 other people.

In the second accident, a truck rammed into a microbus carrying journalists of BTV and Press Information Department (PIB), on the connecting road of the Jamuna Bridge at about 5:00pm, injuring five.

The journalists were returning to the capital after covering a

programme of Energy Adviser Tapan Chowdhury.

Fifteen people injured in two road accidents were admitted to Sirajganj Sadar Hospital and local clinics.

Condition of five injured people, including BTV reporter Perviz Hasan, was stated critical. They were shifted to Dhaka.

Mymensingh

Two children were crushed under the wheels of a microbus at Akua Bangarpol in the district town on

Thursday.

The victims were identified as Papia, 4, and Sakib, 3.

Police and witnesses said the Fulbaria-bound speeding microbus from Mymensingh town ran over the two children who were standing on roadside at about 11:00am, leaving them critically injured.

They were rushed to Mymensingh Medical College Hospital where the doctors declared them dead.

The statement demanded immediate arrest of the criminals and exemplary punishment to them.

Clash leaves 17 injured

At least 17 people were injured in a fierce clash between two rival groups over capturing a land at west Khukria village in Kazipur upazila on Thursday.

Local people said a dispute had long been prevailing between two neighbours - Abdur Rashid and Abdus Aziz - of the village over a piece of land.

Supporters of Rashid and Aziz clashed with each other at noon and threw brickbats that left 17 people injured on both sides.
