

Tigers charged up

Mashrafe set to return

A good game slipped away from their hands but the Bangladesh team were not ready to latch on a reprieve rather seemed charged up to bounce back in the three-match series against India when the two meet in today's second one-day at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium.

Rahul Dravid's men won the first battle by five wickets on Thursday but there had been something for Tigers in the loss, which home captain Habibul Bashar believes will work as inspiration.

But the fact is non-performing Bangladesh skipper, who wants to win the all-important toss also in the second match, should lead his side from the front to stay alive in the series against their next door neighbours, who have recharged after their World Cup disaster to come hard in the first game.

In the 2004 home series, Bangladesh also lost the first game but came back in the second to taste their first ever one-day success against India but Bashar was not interested to draw comparisons.

"In 2004 nobody expected us to win but now everyone expects it in every match. I firmly believe that we

are capable of beating India. We had a definite chance in the first game but we could not grab it. My team put a tremendous fight and we were very close of victory, so we can even take inspiration from the game," said Bashar yesterday.

But what made the Bangladesh captain most happy is that pace spearhead Mashrafe Bin Mortaza, whose absence was badly felt in the series opener, looks all set to play today after recovering from back pain.

"Mashrafe is a very special player, so it's good news for the team that he is feeling better. We are very optimistic about him but we have not taken the final decision yet as team physio will give his final report in the morning. So we have not made the playing eleven yet," said a delighted Bashar.

If Mashrafe comes back, Shahadat Hossain will make way for the Narail Express. Meanwhile, Abdur Razzaq looks a doubtful starter due to an attack of flu. If he is not fit enough to meet the demands of hot and humid conditions, all-round Forhad Reza will replace him.

Mashrafe took part in yesterday's training in Mirpur before watching the pitch where he looked quite well. There was hardly any evidence that the team's morale was down after a five-wicket loss.

"We just hope that we can get everyone fit tomorrow because the second match is very important for

us as India took the lead in the series. We will try hard to come back into the series but I don't want to brand it a do-or-die battle because we are not thinking on the series but only the second game," said Bashar.

"It is encouraging for us that despite the defeat, the mood of the camp is positive. We feel that we are in the right track. The strategy is simple as we want to play better cricket than the last game. For that we will try to do our basics rightly," he added.

The Tigers skipper was a bit surprised as his bowlers did not get the expected help from the wicket in the second part of the innings.

"The wicket looks more or less same. Actually it is very difficult to judge the nature of the black soil. To win the toss is important because it would be too difficult to bat second in these tough conditions."

Praising Javed Omar's effort in the first game, Bashar however said that he expected a big innings from young left-handed opener Tamim Iqbal.

"Tamim played a blistering innings against India in the World Cup. That is obviously a special knock. Yesterday's innings was also special because for the first time he played in front of such a big crowd in home. On both occasions, he set the tone although he could not carry the innings. But Tamim is more than capable of playing a big innings. So I expect some really big innings from him," he explained.

'A shocker'!

Just better performance would not be good enough for Bangladesh to win the second match against India today. Because there is an umpire named Asoka de Silva.

If the country's cricket fans anything forgot him for all the bad reasons, then the Sri Lankan, who recently returned to international fold after more than a year in the wilderness, made no mistake to revive the bitter memories in his first chance against the Tigers.

The 51-year old former Test cricketer simply brought back the Multan memories into the minds of millions after ruling down a confident Abdur Razzaq lbw appeal against Mahendra Dhoni, the dashing India batsman who took away the game from Bangladesh on Thursday with a 91 not out.

TV replays suggested how badly he judged against the home side and just think that Dhoni, struck lbw in front, was then 10.

He has given a number of bad decisions against Bangladesh in the past but what was most pathetic the way he played a role to deny the Tigers tasting their first Test victory in Multan in 2003 after ruling down a few close lbw appeals against then Pakistan captain Inzamamul Haq, whose hundred helped the home side snatch a one-wicket victory from the jaws of defeat.

Once he was called 'a shocker' by a Caribbean newspaper after giving eight lamentable decisions during a Test match between Australia and West Indies in the Caribbean in 2003. He came to the spotlight again, also for all bad reasons, when he gave as many as four funny decisions during the Lahore Test between West Indies and Pakistan in 2006. That virtually saw his omission from the scene for a long time.

So, the common feeling would be whether Bangladesh can survive from the fingers of a man who was once very popular while playing club cricket in Dhaka.

"They also took Tamim (Iqbal) which shows how much our cricket and youngsters are being appreciated," concluded Rafique.

CEO of Asian Cricket Council Syed Ashraful Huq presented the squads at a press conference at a local hotel yesterday alongside Chetan Chauhan of India, Mohsin Khan of Pakistan, Lalith Kaluperuma of Sri Lanka and ASM Faruque from Bangladesh, the selectors handpicked by the four respective cricket boards.

The veteran left-arm spinner is part of a 14-member squad that will play three official one-day internationals against the Africa XI in Bangalore on June 6 and in Chennai on June 9 and 10.

Sri Lankan captain Mahela Jayawardene will lead the Asians who have a number of his fellow countrymen including openers Sanath Jayasuriya and Upul Tharanga and pacemen Chaminda Vaas and Lasith Malinga. India great Sachin Tendulkar will make an appearance while stylish Mahendra Dhoni has been chosen for wicketkeeping duties.

Upon hearing about his selection, Rafique was humble as usual, citing Bangladesh's performance off-late as the reason for his pick.

"At the fag end of my career, I think this is a special achievement and I am proud to be selected," said the 37-year-old left-arm spinner.

"More than just taking Rafique, they recognised Bangladesh's good show at the World Cup," said the

Tamim Iqbal, Abdur Razzaq and Mashrafe Bin Mortaza from Bangladesh.

Pakistan's new captain Shoaib Malik will lead out this side that play against their African counterparts in Bangalore on June 5. On the same day, a women's Twenty20 match will also take place.

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Howard 'jammed' on Zim tour

Zimbabwe's ambassador to Australia Stephen Chiketa said politics has no place in sport and cancelling the tour would hurt cricket's development there.

"You have young players in Zimbabwe who want to emulate great cricket players in Australia," Chiketa told Seven Network television.

Howard, strong critic of the regime of Zimbabwe President Robert Mugabe, said it was not entirely clear whether his government could legally direct the national team not to tour the strife-torn southern African nation.

"I am jammed between my distaste for the government getting involved in something like this and my even greater distaste for giving a propaganda victory to Robert Mugabe," Howard told Australian radio.

"Obviously, if there is a way legitimately that the tour can be cancelled and there not be an exposure by Cricket Australia to any fine, then we'll go down that path."

Foreign Minister Alexander Downer met Thursday with officials from Cricket Australia, which face a two million US dollar fine imposed by the game's governing body if they abandon the tour.

Cricket Council has responsibilities, yes," Howard said. "But they're like any other body -- they're answerable to their constituents."

"Now, I think there is some evidence emerging that even in those countries that would be very reluctant to see the ICC do anything, that something ought to happen."
