



## 16-TOWN POWER DISTRIBUTION PROJECT PDB spends Tk 271cr without approval

Power Development Board (PDB) spent an excess of Tk 271 crore in a power distribution project without approval of the authorities while a severe power crisis persists in the country.

An investigation report by the Planning Ministry's Implementation, Monitoring and Evaluation Department (IMED) cited pressure from lawmakers and high officials in the past for the 'excess spending' on the 16-town power distribution project (second phase).

The amount originally approved for the project was Tk 225 crore but the PDB spent Tk 496 crore on it. Of the Tk 271 crore excess spending, the PDB is yet to pay Tk 169 crore outstanding bills to contractors, the report said.

The committee visited seven of the 16 towns and submitted its report at last week's National Economic Council meeting.

Under the project, the PDB was to build 749 km of new power lines but ended up building 2,371 km.

While the PDB was to repair 742 km of old power lines with the approved funds, it repaired 2,911 km, according to the report.

There were other irregularities also in implementing the project.

The inquiry team found that additional Tk 2.8 crore was spent to

UNDP official stabbed to death, mob kill three bandits

An official of United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and three robbers were killed during a highway robbery in a bus on Tangail-Jamuna bridge road at Alenga in Kalihati upazila Friday night.

The robbers stabbed UNDP Programme Officer Soumitra Kumar Dev, 35, and three others including the driver and supervisor of the bus. Soumitra later died in hospital.

The three robbers died of mob beating and four of their cohorts were arrested as they were

Typically, Aftab took the game by the scruff of the neck as, for about 45 minutes, he looked to take the game away from the visitors but after he fell while trying to heave off-spinner Ramesh Powar, the run-rate started to climb due to the fall of regular wickets out in the middle.

19-year-old leg-spinner Chawla, making his one-day debut, bowled effectively as he used the lack of pace in the wicket with good variation of flight and spin. He was the best of the Indian bowlers as he took the wickets of Mohammad Ashraful, Habibul Bashar and Mohammad Rafique and only gave away 37 runs in his 10 overs.

CG's reform move good but delay will harm democracy

Speakers at a discussion yesterday said the country's democracy will suffer if the military-backed caretaker government stays in power for a long period of time, but they endorsed its reform initiatives.

Saying that democracy cannot be sustained or advanced without an elected government, they also called upon the caretaker government to hold a free, fair and credible election after bringing necessary electoral reforms.


The speakers made the remarks on BBC Bangla Sanglap held in Bangladesh-China Friendship Conference centre in the capital.

"If the present caretaker government stays in power for a long period of time, democracy will be hampered. But we will have to give them time to carry out necessary reforms for holding a free and fair election," said Awami League (AL) leader Advocate Abdul Hamid, who was also a deputy leader of the opposition in the last parliament.

BNP leader and former whip Ashraf Hossain termed the present caretaker government 'undemocratic'. "As the present government is not elected, it is of course undemocratic," said the BNP leader. He also observed that the present government is a hindrance to flourishing of democracy.

## PROTEST OVER TOP JUDGE SACKING 34 killed in violence ahead of rally in Pakistan

Fierce gun battles between rival political activists left 34 people dead and 100 wounded yesterday in the worst violence since President Pervez Musharraf suspended Pakistan's top judge two months ago.

Most of the victims were opposi-

tion party workers headed for a rally in the volatile southern city of Karachi by Chief Justice Iftikhar Muhammad Chaudhry, who was trapped at the airport by road-blocks set up by Musharraf supporters.

Chaudhry, increasingly a symbol of defiance for those opposed to Musharraf's eight-year military
