

Migration to Malaysia still remains costly

Although the present caretaker government has taken a number of steps to bring discipline to the overseas employment sector, the high cost of migration to Malaysia is yet to see a reduction.

The recruiting agencies are still charging Tk 1.5 lakh to Tk 2 lakh whereas the government-fixed rate for sending each worker to Malaysia is only Tk 84,000.

Following allegation of charging extra money from the job seekers, the interim government dissolved the executive committee of Bangladesh Association of International Recruiting Agencies (Baira) and arrested its president MAH Salim. Baira's Kuala Lumpur office, which allegedly extorted money from the workers, was also closed down.

Besides, Malaysian high commissioner in Bangladesh at a recent meeting with the expatriates welfare and overseas employment ministry also requested the government to look into the issue of charging extra money from the workers.

Sources in the ministry of expatriates welfare and recruiting agencies said that the cost could not be brought down because of the 'lobbyist fee' the agencies have to pay to some Malaysians for getting the job demand letters.

The issue of 'lobbyist fee' came to the attention of the authorities recently when a so-called Malaysian lobbyist admitted to the Bangladesh High Commission in Malaysia that he had agreements with six Bangladeshi recruiting agencies that pledged to pay him Tk 54,000 for managing each job demand letter from the employers.

The government also collected documents of such agreements, a source in the foreign ministry said, terming the agreements 'very unusual.'

According to sources concerned, the so-called lobbyist went to the Bangladesh High Commission in Kuala Lumpur for securing visa and admitted the fact when asked about reasons for visiting Bangladesh.

Bangladesh High Commission immediately informed the matter

to the home ministry, which then formed a committee led by an additional secretary and represented by the officials of Bureau of Manpower, Employment and Training (BMET), Directorate of Passport, intelligence agencies and administrator of Baira to probe into the matter and submit a report within two months.

Contacted, Ministry of Expatriates Welfare and Overseas Employment Secretary Abdul Mamid Chowdhury said that they have received a letter in this regard.

"We also formed a committee to identify the reasons behind the high cost of migration to Malaysia. We hope that the committee will submit its report within one and a half months at the most. We shall then take decision on the basis of the recommendations," he told The Daily Star yesterday.

Asked what steps the government would take if the probe discovers that 'lobbyist fee' in a manpower receiving country is the reason behind high cost of migration, he said, "Let's get the report

Muggers shoot trader to loot Tk 4 lakh

Muggers shot a cooking oil trader in Shyampur in the capital taking his Tk 4 lakh while a group of criminals shot an hotelier in Karwan Bazar for refusing to pay toll.

Cooking oil trader Shohagh Hossain, 25, of Jurain and manager of West Inn on Kazi Nazrul Islam Avenue Omar Faruq, 45, were rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where they were operated upon for their bullet wounds.

In Shyampur, three muggers waylaid Shohagh, a co-owner of Saju Enterprise, around 11:30am as he was going to a bank to deposit Tk 5 lakh.

Witnesses said the three muggers on a motorbike stopped the rickshaw Shohagh was travelling on around 100 yards from the bank.

Shohagh's brother-in-law and business partner Nazmul Hossain told reporters at DMCH that the

Minimum capital requirement for banks raised

The Bangladesh Bank (BB) yesterday decided to increase the amount of the required minimum capital for commercial banks to 10 percent of their risk-weighted assets from the existing requirement of nine percent.

The decision was taken in a bid to reduce the risks different banks face as well as to bring international standard in the banking system, a high official of the BB said. He said commercial banks will be notified about the central bank's decision today.

"We will ask the banks to meet the minimum capital requirement by December 31," the official added.

According to existing regulations, each bank has to retain at least Tk 100 crore or nine percent of its risk-weighted assets, whichever is higher, as the minimum capital.

The BB sources said the central bank will also make a move to amend the Bank Company Act 1991 to increase the amount of the required minimum capital to Tk 200 crore from the existing requirement of Tk 100 crore.

The council of advisers to the caretaker government already approved a finance ministry proposal in this regard, which is currently being processed by the law ministry.

With the BB's latest decision to increase the amount of the required minimum capital for banks, the banking sector will have to mobilise more than Tk 1500 crore by the end of this year.

According to the existing rules, the banking sector should have had a total capital of Tk 13,788 crore in 2006 but the amount was Tk 12,288 crore, the BB data of December 2006 show. The data also show that overall capital deficit in the sector

was Tk 1,500 crore that year.

According to the data, capital deficit of nationalised commercial banks (NCBs) was Tk 3,412 crore while specialised banks had a deficit of Tk 39 crore.

Local private banks and foreign banks operating in the country, however, as a whole showed a brighter performance as the private banks had a capital surplus of Tk 530 crore while the foreign banks' capital surplus was Tk 1,421 crore.

Among the private banks, Oriental Bank had a capital deficit of Tk 663 crore and Social Investment Bank Limited (SIBL) had a deficit of Tk 27 crore. Sources said SIBL recently got out of its capital deficiency by issuing right shares.

Ibrahim Khalid, a former deputy governor of the BB, welcomed the decision saying it will not be a

There is only a slim chance that the dashing right-hander will play the final one-dayer in the port city although his temperature has subsided slightly.

It was learnt that the team-management had decided to send him to hospital in the hope that it could help the ace batsman, who felt sick soon after the completion of the second one-dayer in Mirpur on Saturday, recover from the fever quickly.

Musharraf rules out emergency

Death toll in political violence rises to 37 amid fresh clashes

The death toll in the clashes in the southern Pakistani city of Karachi, triggered by rallies for and against suspended chief justice Iftikhar Chaudhry, has touched 37.

Three people including a policeman were the latest victims as protesters blocked the main highway with burning tyres and pelted vehicles with stones. Karachi police chief Azhar Farooqi described the situation as "very tense."

Pakistan ordered extra troops into Karachi Sunday as deadly violence over the suspension of the country's chief justice spilled into a second day, raising the death toll to 37.

Three people including a policeman were the latest victims as protesters blocked the main highway with burning tyres and pelted vehicles with stones.

Karachi police chief Azhar Farooqi described the situation as "very tense."

"The assailants set his bike on fire and tortured him before shooting him from close range," said police officer Shafiqur Rehman, referring to his dead colleague. Two other men were shot dead in separate incidents.

Heavy gunfire was also heard in the southern port city's impoverished Banaras Chowk area, where

An extortion case was filed on Saturday night against a union parishad (UP) member who recently sued former lawmaker and Sylhet district BNP chief M Ilyas Ali on similar charges.

Iran 'agrees' to hold talks with US on Iraq

Iran said on Sunday it has agreed to a request from the United States for talks on Iraq, just over a week after the two archrivals failed to have substantive contacts at a conference in Egypt.

"Iran has agreed to talk to the US side over Iraq, in Iraq, in order to relieve the pain of the Iraqi people, to support the government and to reinforce security in Iraq," foreign ministry spokesman Mohammad Ali Hosseini said.

"The time and date of the talks and the ranking of the negotiating team will be made public this week," he said according to the state-run IRNA agency.

The Mehr news agency said the talks would take place in Baghdad.

Hosseini said the talks would go ahead after the United States made
