

SA offers to be neutral venue

South Africa are willing to step in and host a one-day series between Australia and Zimbabwe but the Australian government believes it is "highly unlikely" the games will eventuate. The government wrote to Cricket Australia ordering it not to tour Zimbabwe but CA said it was considering whether the matches could be played at a neutral venue.

Gerald Majola, Cricket South Africa's chief executive, said there would be no problem if both countries wanted to play in South Africa. "I haven't heard anything from anyone," Majola said in the Sydney Morning Herald. "Obviously Australia and Zimbabwe would have to agree to move the tour first. If the two parties agreed to play there, then we would be fine with that."

The Australian government would prefer that the series was cancelled completely and Alexander Downer, Australia's foreign minister, said it would be unpalatable for Zimbabwe to play elsewhere. "It seems to me highly unlikely that the Zimbabwe Cricket Union would want to play the game in another country," Downer told the ABC.

"For them, I suspect, and at least for the Zimbabwean government, it would be seen to be humiliating to acknowledge that they're not able to play against the top cricket team within their own country. My guess is that this won't come about."

Downer said relocating the three matches to a neutral venue, such as South Africa, would be less of a propaganda win for Robert Mugabe. "The worst possible thing that could happen would be that our team would actually go to Zimbabwe," he said. "Zimbabwe would have to put up with the humiliation of acknowledging that the best cricket team won't play in their own country."

Aus rejects Zim charge

Prime Minister John Howard on Monday said it was ludicrous to suggest Australia was racist for banning its cricketers from touring Zimbabwe, as he faced questions at home about mixing sport with politics.

Howard on Sunday ordered Australian cricketers not to tour the impoverished African nation, saying the presence of the world champions would be used as a propaganda tool to support the rule of "grubby dictator" Robert Mugabe.

Mugabe's junior Information Minister Bright Matonga hit back by saying the ban was a racist ploy designed to keep Aimbabwe out of international sport.

Athletic are just one place above the relegation zone but have a four-point advantage over their fellow Basques Real Sociedad.

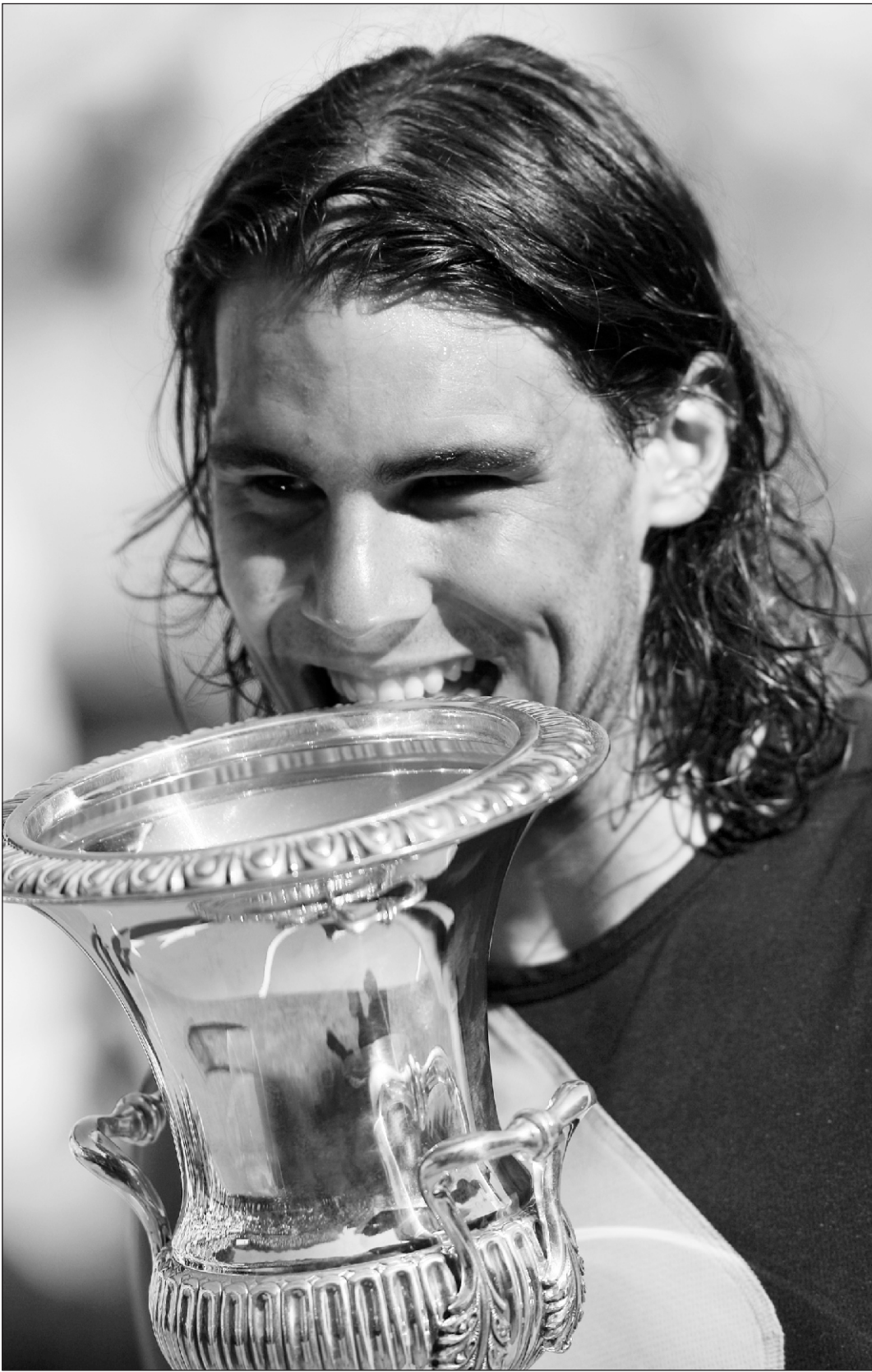

Nadal's record third

High-flying Rafael Nadal continued his record clay-court run after lifting a third straight Rome Masters title on Sunday in beating Chilean Fernando Gonzalez 6-2, 6-2.

Nadal looks like reaching Roland Garros with a running start after playing four events in the five weeks which lead to the May 27 kick-off of the clay-court test.

The undisputed king of clay has extended his unbeaten run on the surface to 77 matches, his last loss coming in April, 2005, in Valencia to Russian Igor Andreev.

During that massive span, Nadal, winner of the last two editions of Roland Garros, has lifted 13 titles.

If his fitness holds up, the world number two and his uncle-coach Toni will look like master planners, with the 20-year-old having lifted

titles at Monte Carlo, Barcelona and the Foro Italico this spring.

He joins Austrian Thomas Muster with three trophies at the Foro Italico but becomes the first to win his three in a row.

Nadal remains undefeated in Rome with 17 straight wins after triumphing in his 16th consecutive clay-court final for a flawless undefeated record in that category.

The title was the fourth of the season for Nadal, who also won Indian Wells, Monte Carlo and Barcelona.

But the Spaniard admitted that his exertions over three and a half hours in winning a marathon semifinal against Nikolay Davydenko did colour his preparation.

"Normally I have one hour of practise but today I had 15-20 minutes," he said. "I was a little bit tired, but prepared. I didn't know how I would feel in the match, but I tried to come in with the best chances."

Moody leaving Lanka

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Moody will return to the Australian state where he began his first-class career in 1985-86, taking over the post vacated by Wayne Clark at the end of last southern summer.

Reports said Moody would receive a salary from the WACA similar to Clark's, but it would be topped up by a sponsorship deal with Indian industrialist Vikas Rambal, who lives in Perth.

It is believed to be the first exclusive sponsorship deal of its type in Australia.

Delhi-born Rambal said after being welcomed to the state he wanted to give something back.

"Nothing is free... it is a substantial investment by my family for the next couple of years," Rambal said. "I believe every cricket fan in WA will be delighted, excited at the news."

WACA chief executive Graeme Wood said securing Moody was a coup.

"We have been able to secure an internationally-respected mentor with an impeccable record and in the prime of his coaching career," Wood said.

Moody's contract with Sri Lanka ends on May 31. Before then, he is due to tour Abu Dhabi with the team for a one-day international series with Pakistan.

The former Worcestershire all-rounder was appointed Sri Lanka's national coach in 2005, succeeding compatriot John Dyson.

Under Moody's coaching, the Sri Lankans have had a remarkable run overseas.

They wiped out England 5-0 in a one-day series while drawing the Test series 1-1 in 2006, and earlier this year drew 1-1 in Tests in New Zealand.

SLC begins coach hunt

Sri Lanka's cricket authorities said Monday they would immediately start the search for a new foreign coach to replace Tom Moody, who is leaving at the end of his contract this month.

"We will look for a foreign coach from tomorrow," Kangadaran Mathivanan, secretary to Sri Lanka Cricket (SLC), the governing body of the sport, told AFP.

Tom Moody, who guided the islanders to the World Cup final last month, told the SLC on Monday that due to family and personal commitments he was unable to continue in the job.

Mathivanan said the SLC would continue the policy of obtaining a foreign, as opposed to a local, coach and said it was too early to name possible contenders for the job.

Moody has recorded a high rate of success with the Sri Lankan team, particularly its performances overseas since he took up the job in May 2005.

He guided the Sri Lankans to drawn Test series in England and New Zealand and is largely credited with carrying Mahela Jayawardena's team to the World Cup final with Australia.

He was the fourth Australian to be in charge of the Sri Lankans after Dav Whatmore, Bruce Yardley and John Dyson.

India'll play

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Bangladesh-India series.

Super League starts with uncertainty

Sonargaon win, two matches unfinished

The Kai-Altech Premier Cricket League plunged into uncertainty on its resumption after three months as inclement weather and player crisis hit the Super League yesterday.

Only one match was completed on the opening day of the second phase with Sonargaon Cricketers snatching a one-wicket victory in a rain-interrupted match against Victoria Sporting Club.

Title contenders Abahani and Mohammedan both were kept waiting as their unfinished games, weather and the recent crisis permitting, will restart today.

With a cyclone expected to hit the coastal belts of the country early this morning, the fate of the two games looked doubtful.

However, leaders Abahani and bottom-table Old DOHS, who were pitted against each other at the Fatullah Stadium, faced another problem with no possible solution but postponing the super league for an indefinite period.

Abahani vice-captain Tushar Imran -- who scored a 48-ball 46 in

the side's 224 all out in 49.2 overs after electing to bat -- and DOHS batsman Mehrab Hossain both got surprise calls for the national team's third and final one-day international against India slated for today in Chittagong as cover for the injury-plagued Tigers.

Mehrab was yet to bat for DOHS, who were 18 without loss after four overs when rain stopped play. He and Tushar along with Rajin Saleh left Dhaka for the port city last night.

Abahani, who lost their last five wickets in the space of 12 runs and 20 deliveries, fielded Sri Lankan international Upul Chandana, who topscored 60 off 65 balls, while DOHS had Kenyan ace Steve Tikolo in their line-up.

The Cricket Committee of Dhaka Metropolis (CCDM) could not respond to the situation immediately but called an emergency meeting late last night to solve the issue.

According to a claim by their officials, Abahani -- who will not have more than seven players after yesterday's match due to injury and examination of players apart from the involvement of three cricketers in Test series against India -- were already expected to

appeal for delaying the rest of the league.

In the other incomplete game, Mohammedan reached 22 without loss in 4.2 overs in reply to Biman's 257-8, built around Nafis Iqbal's 80 off 88 balls, at the Dhanmondi Cricket Stadium.

At BKSP, Sonargaon topped third-placed Victoria in the table when they stormed to 183 for nine for a last-ball victory after being set a revised target of 181 in 31 overs. Sonargaon, chasing a challenging 268 for victory, were 130-4 after 26 overs when the match was interrupted due to rain and they needed 51 runs in five overs after the resumption.

Mahbub Alam Robin's last-ball six in the ultimate delivery of the game took Sonargaon's collection to 17 points, level with Mohammedan and three behind Abahani, after opener Mehrab Hossain Opee gave a good start during his 57 off 80 balls.

Earlier, opener Imrul Kayes struck 78 off 107 balls and Mahmudullah Riyad hammered five fours and as many sixes in an explosive 88 not out off 69 balls as Victoria made 267-9 in 50 overs after deciding to bat.

Pressure mounts on Veeru

Daredevil batsman Virender Sehwag faced renewed calls for his ouster as India bid for a 3-0 sweep of the one-day series against Bangladesh here on Tuesday.

Sehwag's foolhardy approach to batting stood out in the first two games in Dhaka last week which India won to soften the pain of their World Cup defeat against Bangladesh in March.

The opening batsman hit 30 off 21 balls on Thursday when he holed out against seamer Syed Raseel after smashing four boundaries earlier in the same over.

On Saturday, Sehwag made 21 before mistiming a skier off Raseel two deliveries after lofting the same bowler for a six.

Indian batting great Sunil Gavaskar said Sehwag was unlikely to win the selectors' favour in future if he continued to "commit cricketers suicide."

"How much sympathy he will retain after this performance remains to be seen, but the way he is getting out indicates that he is looking to commit cricketers suicide," said Gavaskar.

"Unless he learns to temper his game, he will find himself in the cricketers wilderness. If he is not willing to show some patience, then the skipper and the selectors will also lose patience with him."

The tourists may field Uthappa

Sehwag gets a final chance on Tuesday -- weather permitting -- to cement his place for the upcoming tour of England in July and justify captain Rahul Dravid's continued faith in his match-winning abilities.

The 28-year-old has already been axed for the two upcoming Tests against Bangladesh despite boasting an average of 49.46 from 52 Tests and being India's only triple centurion.

Sehwag, who crossed the 5,000-run milestone during Thursday's one-dayer, has managed just 440 runs in his last 20 games, including a 114 against minnows Bermuda in the World Cup.

Fellow opener Gautam Gambhir showed the way with a gutsy century in Saturday's game while the other contender, Robin Uthappa, may play his first match in the series on Tuesday.

The tourists could be frustrated by wet weather as they prepared to sweep the one-dayers ahead of the first Test starting in this port city on Friday.

Heavy overnight rain waterlogged the Ruhul Amin stadium and more rain has been forecast for the rest of the week, threatening not only Tuesday's match but also the first Test.

"We are keen to play because we have Bangladesh in our grip and don't want to ease off now," said India's tough-talking interim coach Ravi Shastri. "We are definitely looking at 3-0."

The tourists may field Uthappa

and left-arm seamer Rudra Pratap Singh, who both missed the Dhaka matches, in place of Dinesh Mongia and Munaf Patel.

Bangladesh, meanwhile, will be without vice-captain Mohammad Ashraful who is suffering from viral fever. Allrounder Farhad Reza, 20, may get a look-in for his 13th one-dayer.

Outgoing coach Dav Whatmore said he was looking for an improved performance from the hosts ahead of the Test series.

"It will be nice to pull one back before the Tests," he said. "There is no doubt India have played the better cricket in the series, but it is also a fact that we have allowed them to do so."

Too much

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But that didn't draw any complaint from anyone, let alone the players, who had to wiggle their way through the imposing security net.

The arrangement would surely impress security experts but some people must remember that this is a cricket ground. Sanctity must be restored and if there are hundreds of policemen roaming around the ground, it just doesn't feel good, especially for journalists who were brutally assaulted by the law-enforcing agency in Chittagong last year during the Bangladesh-Australia series.

Tevez saves Hammers

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Warnock was particularly bitter about the weakened line-up Manchester United boss Sir Alex Ferguson put out to face West Ham, presumably with one eye on next weekend's FA Cup final against Chelsea.

"I must admit I thought Sir Alex would play a stronger team than that but it was not to be," Warnock said. "To see them celebrating (the title) on the pitch leaves a bitter taste in your mouth."

Wigan boss Paul Jewell admitted he had been left "physically and mentally drained" by Sunday's events. "It was a long, long 45 minutes, that second half."

First-half goals from Dimitar

Berbatov and Robbie Keane allowed Tottenham to beat Manchester City 2-1 at home and ensure that Martin Jol's side matched last season's fifth-place finish.

Despite Emile Mpenza pulling a goal back five minutes before the break, City were unable to take anything from what may have been manager Stuart Pearce's last match in charge.

Everton, who drew 1-1 at Chelsea, finished one place back while Bolton claimed seventh place and the final UEFA Cup spot after a 2-2 home draw with Aston Villa.

Didier Drogba's equaliser for Chelsea after James Vaughan had

given Everton the lead extended the club's unbeaten home run in the league to 63 matches, equalling the record set by the great Liverpool side of the late 1970s.

A last-minute penalty by Harry Kewell earned Liverpool a 2-2 draw at home to Charlton and ensured that the Reds edged out Arsenal, who could only manage a goalless draw at Portsmouth, for third place on goal difference.

Elsewhere, Benni McCarthy scored his 24th goal of the season as Blackburn shared the points in an entertaining 3-3 draw with Reading while Mark Viduka marked what may well have been his final game for Middlesbrough with a double to help his side to a 3-1 win over Fulham.
