Torture marks found on victim's body, protests go on

Thousands of locals brought out a procession at the Rajshahi city suburb of Chhotobongram Purbopara yesterday as the body of Quamrul Islam Majnu, who was allegedly tortured to death by Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) personnel, was handed over to his family 36 hours after his death.

Meanwhile, the Court of Chief Metropolitan Magistrate yesterday sent three people who were

arrested in connection with the Majnu murder case filed on Saturday night with Boalia Police Station to jail custody.

Investigation officer (IO) of the case Sub-inspector Manjurul Haque Akhund arrested Zahurul Islam, Basir Ali and Ali Hossain of Chapainawabganj and produced them before the court.

A magistrate-led probe body prepared Majnu's inquest report noting that his body had innumerable marks of torture.

The body of Majnu was taken to his home around 2:15pm yesterday after an autopsy by a three-member medical board. His loved ones burst into tears and locals, who gathered at his home since morning, became angry when the body reached there.

Minutes later a huge procession paraded the 2 km under-construction bypass with his body chanting slogans against Rab and the caretaker government. They

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Investment package good enough for oil companies

Says outgoing Chevron chief

Outgoing Chief of Chevron Bangladesh Andrew L Fawthrop believes that Bangladesh's investment package is good enough to attract oil companies in the third round bidding -- but it would have to ensure an efficient employment of the current policies.

"The basic investment policy of Bangladesh is very well thought out and there is a good set of working conditions. Unfortunately that slows down due to too much bureaucracy," said Fawthrop, who has also been the longest serving chief executive officer (CEO) of Chevron Bangladesh [previously Unocal Bangladesh].

In an interview with The Daily

Star last week prior to his departure from the country, Fawthrop pointed out that the government has to understand that the bidding

round is a marketing issue and therefore Bangladesh will have to have a good understanding of the world market.

He noted that Bangladesh has been immensely benefited by the production sharing contract (PSC) with his company, which took all the risks and invested everything needed. Under PSC, with free gas given to Petrobangla as profit share, Chevron's gas, from all its fields, costs less than a dollar for most of the lifetime of gas production from these fields.

Serving in Bangladesh from late 2002 amid a gas export controversy created by his company, Fawthrop led Chevron to become the biggest and the most cost effective foreign

7 US soldiers killed in Iraq bombing

Seven US soldiers and their interpreter were killed by two different roadside bombs in Iraq, the US military said yesterday.

In western Baghdad, six soldiers and an interpreter were killed in a single blast on Saturday while patrolling the capital in search of weapons and bombing materials.

Increased US patrols as part of the new Baghdad security plan to regain control of the violent capital have resulted in a sharp spike in military casualties over the past few months.

In the southern city of Diwaniyah, a roadside bomb tore through a US military vehicle killing one soldier and wounding two others also on Saturday.

At least 15 US servicemen have been reported killed just this weekend and 76 so far this month,

putting May on track to be one of the bloodiest months in the four-year-old conflict.

The deaths bring the total US casualty toll since the March 2003 US-led invasion to 3,419 according to an AFP count based on Pentagon figures.

Earlier two people were killed and another 10 wounded when a car bomb went off next to a gas station near the Iraqi interior ministry in central Baghdad on Sunday, security officials said.

Hours earlier, another car bomb exploded in northeastern Baghdad near the Shia stronghold of Sadr City, wounding five people, one of them seriously.

Two Iraqi policemen were wounded in a roadside bomb attack and an Iraqi army soldier was injured in clashes outside the northern city of Kirkuk, officials said.

Benazir vows to return for Pak elections

Exiled former Pakistani prime minister Benazir Bhutto vowed to return to the country for the forthcoming elections, in an interview published yesterday, despite President Pervez Musharraf ruling it out.

Pakistan's military ruler insisted Friday that Benazir Bhutto and fellow exiled former prime minister Nawaz Sharif would not be allowed to return ahead of the general election due later this year or in early 2008.

But Benazir Bhutto, who leads

the popular Pakistan People's Party, told the British newspaper The Sunday Telegraph: "No matter what, I'm going back this year."

The 53-year-old went into exile in 1998 over corruption cases pending against her and her husband. She faces arrest and possible imprisonment if she returns.

Musharraf, 63, suspended chief justice Iftikhar Muhammad Chaudhry on March 9 on misconduct charges, which provoked a wave of deadly protests.
