

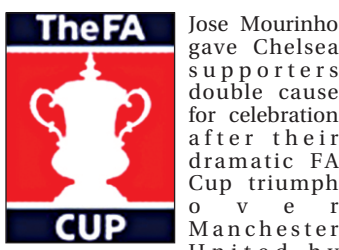

Mourinho staying

Jose Mourinho gave Chelsea supporters double cause for celebration after their dramatic FA Cup triumph over Manchester United by moving to quash any lingering suspicion that he could leave London this summer.

Speculation that the Portuguese would quit or be forced out this summer has swirled around Stamford Bridge throughout Mourinho's third season in charge, fuelled by a mid-season breakdown in his relationship with the club's Russian owner, Roman Abramovich.

But after watching Didier Drogba's extra-time winner secure the only English trophy to have eluded him in the first final at the new Wembley, Mourinho insisted he would be staying on.

"I am moving house, because you (the media) have shown my address to the whole world, but I am not going back to Portugal," he said.

"I love this club, I love living in this

country and I don't want to leave," Mourinho said after adding an FA Cup triumph to the two Premiership titles and two League Cup trophies he has won with Chelsea.

"If you have doubts, what can I do. I can't do anything about it. I have a contract, I want to stay, the club told me they want me to stay. I look at them as honourable people, not as liars, so when they say publicly they want me to be manager next season, I have no reason to doubt.

"The only way to stop this (speculation) will be on July 9 in Los Angeles (when Chelsea begin a pre-season tour) and I will be there."

Although United had enjoyed the better chances in the 115 minutes that preceded Drogba's winner, Mourinho insisted that Chelsea had deserved their victory on Saturday and could not resist a jibe at Sir Alex Ferguson's side.

"My feeling was that we could be there three hours and they would not have scored a goal," he said. "We controlled the game so well defensively. We know the way they want to play and we did not give them that game."

Mourinho's interpretation was disputed by Ferguson, who described the contest as a "stalemate" while admitting that some of his players, including Cristiano

Ronaldo, had looked jaded at the end of a hard season.

"You can't do much about goals when they come as late as that," he said. "We were too tired to mount any challenge but that is football."

"I didn't think we played well. We didn't deserve to win the game, or lose it -- it was one of those games. There was not enough attacking momentum from either side to deserve to win the match."

"We had the better chances but it was a stalemate really. The pitch was slow which didn't help and we had two or three players who looked tired. They have played a lot of matches and it is understandable. Cristiano looked a bit tired, he has had a long season for a young lad."

In a match of few clear chances, United came agonisingly close to taking the lead at the end of the first period of extra-time, when Ryan Giggs slid in to meet a low Wayne Rooney cross.

Petr Cech saved but Giggs's momentum carried him into the goalkeeper and the ball crossed the line in his arms.

Ferguson acknowledged that the linesman would have been unable to see clearly that the ball had crossed over, but he insisted referee Steve Bennett should have awarded

a penalty for what he saw as a foul on Giggs by Michael Essien.

The United boss went on to suggest that Mourinho had succeeded in influencing the official with his pre-match comments.

"He does it before every big game. There's 22 players out there and he's talking about the referee all week -- maybe it works for him. I was disappointed with the referee, for an FA Cup final I would have expected better."

Despite his disappointment at missing out on a fourth league and cup double at the helm of United, Ferguson said the club had had a fantastic season and achieved their main goal of reclaiming the Premiership title.

"To lose so late in the game is very hard to take but I have seen it time and time again in football. You can't be surprised. The thing is to accept it and get on with it. I want to wake up tomorrow and get on with life."

Even Ferguson, whose sides have always made a habit of producing late winners, was resigned to penalties when Drogba collected a pass from John Obi, played a slick one-two with Frank Lampard and then beat the sprawling Edwin

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Billy bids goodbye

AC Milan veteran Alessandro

Costacurta scored in his last home match before hanging up his boots but his goal could not prevent the Champions League finalists from losing 3-2 to Udinese in Serie A on Saturday.

The 41-year-old centre-back is to retire at the end of the season after 20 years at the club, who next Wednesday face Liverpool in the Champions League final in Athens.

Costacurta, who will stay on at Milan to assist head coach Carlo Ancelotti, was overcome with emotion.

"It was a great celebration and I want to thank everyone - the club, my teammates and the fans," said the player best known as 'Billy' who did a lap of honour after the final whistle before getting the bumps by his colleagues.

"Now the moment has arrived for me to do something new, and I think the challenge of my new profession will be enough to keep me from dwelling on the past."

"I had many other options, but I wanted to remain a part of this glorious club."

A former Italy international, Costacurta scored a penalty to make it 2-2 in the 57th minute before receiving a standing ovation from the San Siro crowd on his substitution moments later.

Unfortunately his goal wasn't enough to earn a point as Udinese's Brazilian striker Barreto scored the winner in the 61st minute.

With Milan having already clinched a place in the third qualifying round of next season's Champions League and the Athens final just four days away, Ancelotti picked a side that will bear no resemblance to the one that takes the field in the Greek capital.

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Valencia move into third

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Stuttgart springs a surprise

Although VfB Stuttgart were crowned Bundesliga champions for the third time on Saturday, it was not a smooth ride for Armin Veh's

men whose early-season form

showed little title-winning potential.

The new German champions got the season off to a terrible start when they were beaten 3-0 at home to Nuremberg on the first game of the season on August 12.

It took until week two of the Bundesliga to pick up their first win when they poached a 3-2 win at Arminia Bielefeld as Brazilian striker Cacau netted two second-half goals.

But a 3-1 home defeat by Borussia Dortmund followed at the end of August which left Stuttgart hovering just above the relegation zone, only before an impressive 3-2 win at Werder Bremen on September 16 turned their fortunes around.

Having gone 2-0 down, Stuttgart fought back with 21-year-old striker Mario Gomez hitting the winning goal three minutes from time.

Draws against Eintracht Frankfurt and Hertha Berlin were followed by a 3-0 hammering of Bayer Leverkusen on October 14 which lifted them up the table to eighth.

Lamps salutes spirit

Frank Lampard hailed Chelsea's never-say-die spirit as his side snatched the FA Cup from Manchester United.

Jose Mourinho's side claimed their second trophy of a dramatic campaign as Didier Drogba's late extra-time goal earned a 1-0 Cup final victory over United on Saturday.

It was a season-saving triumph for Lampard and company after they had surrendered their Premiership title to United and crashed out of the Champions League in the semifinals.

Failure to win either of those trophies had fuelled speculation that Mourinho would be sacked if Chelsea lost at Wembley. But Lampard's astute pass set up Drogba to poke in the winner and send the Blues off to their holidays in high spirits.

"It's great to go out on a high," Lampard said. "The FA Cup is a huge trophy and one that I and this group had never won."

"To win it is a fantastic feeling and there were some big celebrations in the dressing room."

"That's the strength of this group. We showed it today and a lot

of times this season. We've fallen short on a couple of occasions but not for the want of trying. We've been very stretched today and we kept going."

"There was a real determination with the lads after what's gone on this season. After losing the league to United, this was a game for us to go out on a high."

"I felt we deserved to win the game. It was tight and there was no clear winner but we had enough chances that I felt we would score."

Lampard admitted Chelsea's failure to win the Premiership or Champions League had placed an extra burden on them going into the final.

"There is always pressure but understandably more today because people would probably enjoy the fact that Chelsea have spent millions and had only won the League Cup. That is the reality of life."

"But we have gone out there today and shown that we are a strong bunch who will keep going until the end and I think people will respect that."

"We will be happy with the two cups. If you want to disrespect those competitions then you shouldn't be in football."

"We have had great experiences in the League Cup and the FA Cup was the one outstanding trophy I

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Juve back in the big time

Juventus reclaimed their place in Serie A after one season in the second division following their 5-1 win at Arezzo on Saturday.

The famous Turin club were demoted to Serie B last summer for their part in the Italian match-fixing scandal.

Alessandro Del Piero and Giorgio Chiellini both scored twice for the visitors, while French striker David Trezeguet grabbed the other goal.

Juve coach Didier Deschamps was delighted to see the club, who have won 27 Serie A titles and two European Cups - back in Italy's top division.

"I am really pleased for the

players and I am proud to have taken Juve back where they belong," he said.

"This promotion cannot be compared with some of the club's other achievements in the past, but it will be part of our history and it's right to celebrate it."

Despite media reports that Deschamps may not be coach next season due to an alleged fall-out with some board members, Juve's general manager Jean-Claude Blanc insisted the former France international would stay.

"Today is a day of joy and a new journey starts and it continues with Deschamps," he said. "I've always said it."

"There are no disagreements. Deschamps stays with us."

The scandal, known as 'Calciopoli', involved five Serie A clubs, referees and high-ranked

Italian football federation (FIGC) officials.

As the club at the centre of the furore, Juventus received the severest punishment.

The club were stripped of the league titles they won in 2004-05 and 2005-06 and denied entry into the Champions League. They were also deducted nine points for their Serie B campaign.

Their demotion led to the departure of many of their star players, including French defender Lilian Thuram, wingback Gianluca Zambrotta, French midfielder Patrick Vieira, Swedish striker Zlatan Ibrahimovic and Italian World Cup-winning captain Fabio Cannavaro.

Coach Fabio Capello also jumped ship, returning to Spain for a second spell with Real Madrid.
