Klose buries hatchet with Frings

German striker Miroslav Klose buried the hatchet with national and Werder Bremen teammate Torsten Frings on Wednesday over comments in the German press that Klose should quit the Bundesliga club.

The 28-year-old Klose - top-scorer at last year's World Cup - has been under pressure since failing to score in Germany's 6-0 rout over minnows San Marino on Saturday and has been linked with a multi-million euro transfer to Bayern Munich.

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Parker joins West Ham

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Happy hunting for top guns

David Beckham and David Villa produced outstanding individual performances to put England and Spain respectively firmly back in the hunt for places at Euro 2008 on Wednesday.

Beckham created two of England's goals as they beat point-less Estonia 3-0, easing the pressure on coach Steve McClaren and taking them to within three points of the top two in the group jointly led by Croatia - held 0-0 by Russia - and Israel, who beat Andorra 2-0 away.

Villa scored a brace as a less than convincing Spain edged Liechtenstein 2-0 in Vaduz but with their fourth victory in as many matches Luis Aragones' side are now in the second qualifying spot albeit having played one more game than third placed Northern Ireland.

Last year's World Cup final duo Italy and France look set for a battle to the end in their group, though, if France play as sloppily as they did in their 1-0 win over Georgia.

That would give third placed Scotland a chance to pull off a surprise.

The Scots got a monkey off their backs with a 2-0 win away in the Faroe Islands - an opponent they had drawn with on the last two occasions at their Tofthill stadium.

Beckham created goals for Peter Crouch and Michael Owen - his first goal for England since last June though he has spent most of that time out injured - and pro-

fessed that he was looking for a longer run in the side.

"Was I on trial? I'm not sure about that," Beckham told Sky Sports.

"I would love to be in the next squad and Steve (McClaren the England boss) has made it clear that I would retain my place if my form is good."

The 32-year-old - dropped unceremoniously by McClaren after the World Cup last year - said that he believed England were back on track.

"The game with Brazil (a 1-1 draw in a friendly last Friday) set us up for this," said the soon to be bound LAGalaxy midfielder.

"We did the job tonight (Wednesday) and scored some goals."

"The confidence is coming back into the squad which it should do as not only do we have some of the best players in the British Isles but also in the world."

"This is how we should play and we are now in a better position."

McClaren refused to be drawn on whether he had made a mistake in dropping Beckham so quickly after the World Cup but was full of praise for what he termed his immense contribution to the match.

"David Beckham is a very, very good player, and he deserves to be in team, as he's shown in last two games," said McClaren.

Villa gave the Spanish the perfect start with two goals in the first 15 minutes - the second a splendid overhead kick - and could well have had a hat-trick and his 13th international goal had not a late penalty not struck the bar.

However victory, their second in the past week following the win over Latvia, left Aragones happy about the state of their qualifying chances.

"I guess we should have scored more goals but that can happen in football, the chances simply do not go in," sighed the veteran Spanish handler.

"However we have two wins from the last two matches and I cannot but be happy with that and what it means for our chances of qualifying."

Italy also had a double scoring hero to thank for their 2-0 away win over Lithuania as Fabio Quagliarella repaid coach Roberto Donadoni's faith with two great strikes.

"Italy has always produced great talents and he (Quagliarella) is no exception," said Donadoni, who added he believed the side had grown since they opened their campaign with a 1-1 draw with Lithuania.

France had Marseille duo Franck Ribery - though he seems certain to join Bayern Munich - and goalscorer Samir Nasri saved French blushes in their narrow escape against a weak Georgia side.

France's sphinx-like coach Raymond Domenech was not getting carried away with either 19-year-old Nasri or that France lead the group.

"I'm not disappointed and I'm not surprised. But I keep saying this: it will go right down to the wire," said Domenech, whose only defeat in qualifying was their 1-0 setback to Scotland.

Real request security

Spanish giants Real Madrid have requested extra security for their away match on Saturday to Zaragoza after the armed Basque separatist group ETA put an end to a 15-month-old ceasefire.

"Everything went well," he told waiting reporters in Munich. "I am happy I could help Munich."

The 24-year-old spent 30 minutes with Bayern's doctor Hans-Wilhelm Mueller-Wohlfahrt, was all smiles when he left the Munich clinic following his transfer from French club Marseille.

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HENIN-IVANOVIC FINAL

Serb surge sweeps Sharapova away

M a r i a Sharapova lost her French Open semifinal to Ana Ivanovic, a Serbian teenager who soared to a 6-2, 6-1

victory Thursday to reach her first Grand Slam final.

Justine Henin beat Jelena Jankovic 6-2, 6-2 in the other semifinal. The Belgian will become the first woman to win three consecutive titles at Roland Garros since Monica Seles in 1990-92 if she defeats Ivanovic on Saturday.

In their only previous meeting two years ago, Henin beat Ivanovic in straight sets on clay in Warsaw, Poland.

Ivanovic, seeded seventh, neutralised Sharapova's power and kept her on the run. Sharapova was looking to advance to her third consecutive final in a major after winning last year's U.S. Open.

"I was thinking the game would be much closer," Ivanovic said.

"She is an aggressive player and likes to dominate. I knew she was not a great mover on the clay."

Sharapova's defeat was reminiscent of her 6-1, 6-2 loss to Serena Williams in the Australian Open final in January. Playing in her first French Open semifinal, Sharapova struggled to chase down Ivanovic's pinpoint strokes.

Her performance was riddled with unforced errors and five double-faults, and she lasted little more than an hour on centre-court. Sharapova trailed 5-0 in the second set, before holding for 5-1. Ivanovic closed the win with her fifth ace. Sharapova had 25 unforced errors to 11 for Ivanovic and hit only four baseline winners.

Ivanovic started quickly, holding her opening serve and then broke Sharapova immediately with a strong forehand flick down the line. Sharapova double-faulted to go 5-1 down, broke back for 5-2, but lost the first set in 32 minutes when she double-faulted for the fourth time.

Ivanovic broke Sharapova in the second game of the second set. In the next game, Ivanovic

was briefly in trouble at 0-30 down before rallying to win the next four points to move 3-0 up. That was as close as Ivanovic got to being under pressure.

"I think I played a pretty good match," Ivanovic said. "I knew I had to be aggressive from the beginning. I didn't make many unforced errors. My serve worked well."

Henin improved to 6-0 against Jankovic head-to-head, including a win in the semifinals of last year's U.S. Open. But it was the first time the Serb had lost in straight sets to Henin, who also won in Paris in 2003.

Jankovic rallied midway through the second set, and Henin had to save a break point before moving ahead 5-2. Jankovic double-faulted to go 15-40 down on her serve and give Henin two match points.

She won at the first attempt when Jankovic's forehand sailed long. Henin clenched her fist and blew a kiss to the crowd.

McClaren hails Beckham

England manager Steve McClaren hailed as "immense"

David Beckham's contribution as the Real Madrid midfielder set up two goals in England's 3-0 victory over Estonia in their Euro 2008 qualifier here on Wednesday.

McClaren had left Beckham out of the squad since the World Cup, but even before the heroics in Tallinn, he set up England's goal on his return in the 1-1 draw against Brazil on Friday.

"That's three of the four goals he's set up, and that's why he's in team," McClaren said.

"David Beckham is a very very good player, and he deserves to be in team, as he's shown in last two games."

He refused to be drawn, though,

on whether he regretted leaving Beckham out for 11 months, or what will happen when Beckham leaves Real Madrid for LA Galaxy in the summer.

Beckham was bullish about his future.

"I will definitely be at the Euros," he said.

"I believe I can carry on playing for a long time. The Galaxy will do everything possible to keep me playing for my country. Things can change, but I'm proud of playing for my country. I just love playing football."

Estonia coach Jelle Goes also highlighted Beckham as the difference between the sides.

"It was clear from the first half that England were trying to find Beckham, who was putting in great crosses," he said.

"That's why Beckham's back in the team - two great deliveries and

the game is closed.

"Beckham at Real Madrid has started to play marvellously, and he has returned to the national team; then you see what happens. The team makes good use of Beckham waiting there on the line."

Beckham was unmarked as he crossed for the second and third goals - the first a Peter Crouch header, the second a sidefoot from Michael Owen - but Goes was critical only about the defending for the first, as Joe Cole was allowed to spin onto a Crouch flick.

"But then," he reflected, "how do you defend against an Eiffel Tower like Crouch?"

McClaren was delighted with the professionalism of his side's display.

"We won that game in the first 20-25 minutes," he said.

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Italy's new star

Fabio Quagliarella admits he could not have asked for a better end to the season than bagging his first Italy brace.

Although this was his third cap, the Sampdoria hitman had previously only played a handful of minutes at international level, but snatched both sensational goals in a 2-0 win in Lithuania on his first start.

"I tried to repay the faith that the Coach and my teammates put in me. I tried to give my best and it went well. With two good goals I could not have asked for a better way to end the season," said Quagliarella.

Famous for some stunning strikes in Serie A, he also impressed in Kaunas with two splendid finishes.

"I enjoyed the second goal more, as it was not easy to let it dip precisely where I wanted it to."

It was a vast improvement upon the 2-1 victory in the Faroe Islands on Saturday in the other Euro 2008 qualifier.

"I think that today we proved that the performance against the Faroe Islands was not easy as our opponents clammed up, but this was much closer to the real Italy."

"The coach let us all relax, as we cannot always play to the best of our abilities, especially at the end of the season when the energy is flagging."

Francesco Totti's return in September could push Quagliarella back out of the Azzurri starting XI, but he is not concerned.

"If Totti returns then that can only be a good thing for the Nazionale. I just slowly try to work my way into some space here and earn the faith of the tactician."

He has also impressed with his versatility, as Quagliarella can play in wide midfield, as a second striker or even a centre-forward.

"I have always played as a support striker, so that means cutting in and shooting. Walter Novellino tried me out in a wider role and I still scored a lot of goals from there."

"Unfortunately, towards the end of the campaign we were missing a lot of players so I had to be the

centre-forward with my back to goal and that made it tricky for me. I try to adapt and do my best in any role where I am placed."

"Roberto Donadoni asked me to start wide and cut in to the centre for a shot or assist, but it is within my characteristics as well."

Already hot property on the transfer market after 13 Serie A goals, Manchester United target Quagliarella's price-tag has just skyrocketed after this performance.

"I am on holiday from tomorrow and cannot wait to rest. There is time for the transfer market. I am on a co-ownership deal between Sampdoria and Udinese so that may be renewed. The important thing now is for me to play consistently."

Quagliarella's explosion has given Donadoni more options upfront, even if Totti does not decide to return for the 'important games' against France and Ukraine in September.

"Italy has always provided great talents and will not cease to do that. We try to raise our young players in the best way possible and then take it from there," expressed a delighted Donadoni.
