

# Make budgetary allocation for working children

## Speakers urge govt

Speakers at a press conference yesterday called for allocating necessary fund in the national budget to bring a potential change in the fate of the working children.

They said the proposed fund could be utilised for the development of the working children through education, healthcare, and skill development.

The press conference was organised by 'Together With Working Children' at Dhaka Reporters Unity Auditorium, said a press release.

In a written statement Moslema Bari, executive director of Community Participation and Development, said a large number of families fail to meet up the basic

need of their children because of the dire poverty.

In the midst of this reality, a huge number of children are involved in various types of work for maintaining their livelihoods, she added.

The statement said many of these children are deprived of fundamental rights like health service, balanced food and amusement.

This deprivation is functioning as bottlenecks that stop proper human development of children.

Quoting the statistics of national child labour survey 2002-03, the statement said

out of the total children in the country 7.5 percent are working children.

Of them 10.8 percent are boys

while 3.6 percent are the girls working children, it added.

The speakers said most of the working children are engaged in various arduous jobs like agriculture, labourer, transport helper, motor garage mechanic and ship breaker.

They said acute poverty compels them to be involved in hazardous activities and

their working condition is also not child-friendly.

The press conference was informed that a child labour policy is in the final stage.

The speakers said the opinions of parents and organisations concerned with the working children should be taken into consideration to make the policy more effective

and acceptable.

They however praised the budget for its provisions for rural poor, urban slum dwellers, housing for floating population and other welfare schemes.

## Eviction of illegal occupiers on bank of Chaktai canal begins today

Some 51 pro-Awami League (AL) teachers of Dhaka University (DU) in a statement yesterday expressed concern and disappointment with the government's decision not to allow AL President Sheikh Hasina to visit the landslide victims in Chittagong and to visit her daughter in the USA, who is going to be mother soon.

At least 106 people were killed in a landslide in the port city on June 11.

The caretaker government on June 14 imposed restrictions on Hasina's leaving Dhaka, which was scheduled for next day, for USA for "the sake of investigation" into the graft cases filed against her.

"We feel that she should have been allowed to visit the places considering humanitarian ground," the teachers said in a joint statement.

"We urge the government to allow her to stay by the side of her pregnant daughter considering minimum citizen and human rights," the statement reads.

The signatories, among others, included Prof Md Hossain Monsur, Prof AAMS Arefin Siddique, Prof Dr Harun-Or-Rashid, Prof Md Rafiqul Islam and Prof Anwar Hossain.

## 'Keep vigilance on use of chemical to fruits'

Adviser for Power and Mineral Resources Tapan Chowdhury yesterday said the government is seriously keeping vigilance on the use of chemicals to fruits and other food items in the country.

"Using chemicals to fruits is a punishable offense as these poisonous substances create numerous health hazards," he said while addressing a seminar at Bangladesh Agriculture Research Council (BARC) auditorium.

Agriculture Secretary M Abdul Aziz chaired the seminar organised by BARC on 'Cultivation of fruits for economic development and prosperity' marking the national fruits tree plantation fortnight.

BARC's former research section chief Dr Kamal Uddin and Bangladesh Nursery Association President Giasuddin Ahmed also spoke on the occasion.

Bangladesh Agricultural University Professor Dr Abdur Rahim presented the keynote paper on the occasion.

The contribution of fruits and wood trees to national economy is unlimited, Tapan Chowdhury said, urging all to plant huge numbers of indigenous fruit trees with a view to reducing imports of fruits and thereby save the country's hard earned foreign currency.

We have sufficient production in the field of rice and potato but lacking other sectors, the adviser said. He said varieties of fruits and other items are necessary for balanced food.

Other speakers at the seminar said geographically Bangladesh is in a position to export fruits, spe-

cially mangoes, to other neighbouring countries if proper steps are taken.

Mango was first cultivated and developed in Bangladesh, then in India and lastly in Pakistan, he said, adding if we can produce surplus

mangoes, we can export those to earn foreign currencies.

Later, the adviser inaugurated the national fruits fair on the premises of Krishibid Institution.

## 25 DU teachers asked to return within three months

Dhaka University (DU) authorities yesterday issued letters to 25 teachers who have been staying abroad even after the expiry of the stipulated period.

Vice-chancellor Prof SMA Faiz said, "Authorities have asked those teachers to return to the country within three months, otherwise further steps would be taken according to rules."

He said these teachers have been staying abroad on different scholarships and other purposes, but did not return even after the expiry of the stipulated period.

Sources said after getting the letter, the teachers either will return to university or extend their leave or quit the job.

In case of non-response, the authorities would take necessary steps according to rules.

## Withdraw proposed VAT, tax on private varsities

Association of Private Universities of Bangladesh yesterday urged the caretaker government (CG) to withdraw the 4.5 percent value added tax (VAT) on tuition fees and tax on private universities which were newly imposed at the proposed budget for 2007-08.

At a general meeting of the association at its office, chairmen, founders and vice-chancellors of different private universities discussed the newly proposed VAT and tax on private universities and called upon the government to review the decision for the greater interest of education.

They also said it will have negative impact on education as around one lakh students are now studying at the private universities.

"As the universities are non-profit organisation, no South Asian country is yet to impose VAT or tax

on private universities. Therefore the government should review its decision," said MA Kashem, chairman of the association, who presided over the meeting.

## Polish team meets army chief
