

# Tigers aim good show

## Warm-up matches starts today

Bangladesh will open their Sri Lanka tour today with a three-day warm-up match against Sri Lanka A team at the Colombo Colts ground.

Both the teams will be allowed to use 12 players with one only able to bowl and the Tigers have opted to rest key bowlers Mohammed Rafique and Mashrafe Bin Mortaza, also the vice-captain.

The young Mehrab Hossain, an opening batsman, will also be in the dressing room during the affair.

It means the visitors, who had a three-hour training session yesterday, will play two wicketkeepers in Khaled Mashud and Mushfiqur Rahim.

The squad for the warm-up match: Mohammad Ashraful, Shahriar Nafees, Javed Omer, Habibul Bashar, Shakib Al Hasan, Rajin Saleh, Khaled Mashud, Mushfiqur Rahim, Mohammad Sharif, Abdur Razzak, Shahadat Hossain Rajib and Syed Rassel.

AFP adds: Bangladesh aim to improve their Test performance in the series against Sri Lanka, which gets underway in Colombo next week, new captain Mohammad Ashraful said on Monday.

"We want to improve our performance in the Tests after our recent good showing in the one-day matches," 22-year-old middle order batsman told reporters here at the official launch of the series.

The right-hander, who hit a debut century against Sri Lanka in 2001 to

become the youngest batsman to ever achieve the feat in Test cricket, said he was looking forward to the challenge of leading Bangladesh in the Test series.

"Results do not matter to us, we need improvement in Test cricket," he said.

Ashraful, who was named captain earlier this month, was the highest scorer for Bangladesh in the World Cup, hitting 83 balls for 87 runs to help lead his team to a stunning victory over South Africa.

Bangladesh have just a solitary win in 46 Tests since becoming a Test-playing nation in 2000.

Sri Lanka captain Mahela Jayawardene paid tribute to the improved standing of the Bangladeshis in world cricket.

"We all know how good they can be and how dangerous they can be especially after the World Cup. Our guys are keen to do well because

Test cricket is the ultimate challenge," Jayawardene said.

Sri Lanka plan to use the series to test a few younger players now that several seniors such as Sanath Jayasuriya and Marvan Atapattu are not available.

"It will be a great challenge to maintain our recent high standards. We need to groom a few younger players," the Sri Lanka captain said.

Jayasuriya is considered only for the one dayers and Marvan Atapattu who was picked for the Tests has made himself unavailable.

This should pave the way for Malinda Warnapura to open the batting with Upl Tharanga.

The three-match Test series begins on June 25, while the three-match one-day international series starts on July 20.

# Mohammedans battle today

The remaining contenders, however, have relatively easier draws in the 15th week starting today with Brothers hosting Arambagh in a Dhaka derby tomorrow and

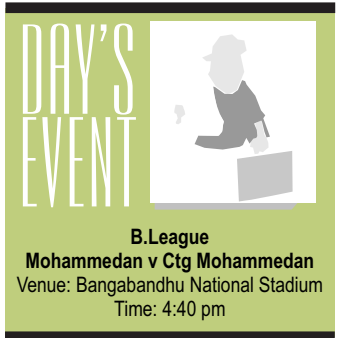

## FIFA team to inspect BNS

A FIFA inspection team will arrive in Dhaka on July 7 to scrutinise the Bangabandhu National Stadium as an international venue.

The FIFA delegation is expected to visit the national number one stadium on the next day.

The FIFA is eager to have at least one world standard venue for international matches in each country and the world football governing body had sent the guideline to the BFF six months earlier.

However, the Bangabandhu Stadium in the heart of the capital lacks standard dressing room and media facilities and also do not have adequate toilets and entrances in the stands.

# England almost there

Monty Panesar took five wickets, including West Indies marathon man Shivnarine Chanderpaul, as England neared victory in the fourth and final Test on the last day at Riverside here Tuesday.

At tea, England – looking to finish the series as 3-0 winners – were 24 for one, needing a further 86 runs to reach their victory target of 110.

Andrew Strauss was 10 not out and England captain Michael Vaughan five not out after Alastair Cook edged Daren Powell to Dwayne Bravo at second slip.

Earlier, left-arm spinner Panesar took five for 46, the sixth time he had taken five or more wickets in a Test innings, in West Indies' 222.

Chanderpaul, who had batted for over 17 hours since last being dismissed this series, was last man out for 70, bowled sweeping against Panesar.

Collingwood at first slip. That left West Indies, without a win in their 19 previous Tests, 169 for six.

Panesar struck again when Denesh Ramdin (four) was bowled by a delivery that pitched on middle and hit off-stump.

Chanderpaul completed his fifty in 127 balls with three fours.

It was his fifth successive fifty of the series after he made 74 in the drawn opener at Lord's, 50 and 116 not out in England's 60-run third Test win at Old Trafford and 136 not out in the first innings of this match.

Significantly, he missed West Indies innings and 283-run defeat, their heaviest innings loss in Test cricket, in the third Test at Headingley with a knee injury.

Fast bowler Stephen Harmison, on his Durham home ground, then struck twice when Powell, for the second time in the match, irresponsibly holing out before Fidel Edwards's off-stump was uprooted.

Harmison bowled at sharp pace after the England and Wales Cricket Board announced Tuesday he

would have to undergo surgery for a "non-serious hernia".

Panesar wrapped up the innings to leave England with 54 overs to get the runs they needed at a rate of under three an over.

West Indies resumed Tuesday on 83 for three, still 30 runs behind.

Chris Gayle was 52 not out and Chanderpaul was unbeaten on 16.

Gayle exited for his overnight score, the opener's best of the series, when he drove loosely outside off-stump against Matthew Hoggard (three for 28) and edged to wicketkeeper Matthew Prior.

England, who'd been in trouble at 165 for six, saw Durham all-rounder Collingwood score 128 in their first innings 400.

Together with Prior (62), he put on 169 for the seventh wicket.

West Indies' first innings had also featured a lower-order recovery after they'd collapsed to 55 for four. Chanderpaul and Bravo (44)

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## Vaughan quits ODI captaincy

Michael Vaughan resigned as England's one-day captain with immediate effect here Monday.

But Vaughan, in a statement issued by the England and Wales Cricket Board after close of play on the fourth day of the fourth Test against the West Indies, said he would continue as a one-day international cricketer.

And the ECB also added he would remain England's Test captain.

Vaughan's successor as one-day captain will be announced when the squad for the two forthcoming Twenty20 matches and three limited overs internationals against the West Indies is named on Friday.

However, Vaughan indicated he might miss these matches while the new captain established "his own authority over the team".

Vaughan, who has struggled to reproduce his Test form in one-day cricket, was England's captain at the recent World Cup in the Caribbean where they failed to qualify for the semifinals.

The 32-year-old Yorkshire batsman said: "I reached this decision some time ago. But due to intense speculation in the media about my future, I feel it is important to make

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## SAFF football on schedule

Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) general secretary Anwarul Hoque Helal yesterday confirmed that the 5th SAFF Football Championship will be held on schedule this December.

For the first time in the history of the biennial event, which was last hosted by Pakistan in 2005, two nations -- Sri Lanka and Maldives -- will jointly organise the eight-team competition of South Asian region.

One group of four teams each will play in Colombo and Male in the December 10-22 meet.

Bangladesh, who won the 2003 championship at home, finished runners-up in Karachi 2005. The national team are expected to play in the Nehru Cup in India as part of preparation although the BFF has yet to appoint a new coach.

The BFF has also received an invitation to send a club to India's famous tournament Barduloi Trophy in Assam.

# Big challenge for Rahul

On March 23, India's World Cup challenge ended. In July, India opens its tour of England. Ample time existed to find a new coach.

The BCCI's inability to do so is further confirmation that no one in the Indian board knows, or seems to care, how to build a world-class team. As a group they remain unfamiliar with excellence.

John Buchanan told this writer after the World Cup that Indian cricket had the potential to be the "new Australia", that "India would just dominate world cricket for so long". Of course, only if it organised itself. But it is unlikely a team can turn itself into the best in the world if it constantly has to settle for second best in its preparation.

Travelling to England without a coach is not the best option. But the team may be relieved because it is

not the worst option. Which would have been selecting a coach in a hurry when Graham Ford refused the job. "No coach" is thus a makeshift solution, a bearable compromise. This is not a known route to greatness.

Indian cricket has been good for its followers in one way. It has taught them to master the art of looking on the bright side. Thus, the England tour must be seen somehow as opportunity. In this case it is a chance for the captain to bloom. Unhindered by a coach, Rahul Dravid must show that this is his team.

Among the errors in Rahul Dravid's first instalment as captain was allowing for the perception that Greg Chappell directed the team to flourish. In such matters, the truth is irrelevant. The coach was not absent of virtues, but if his major fault was talking too much, then the captain's was in failing to control him.

David's intelligence, thorough-

ness and respect within the team led many to view him as a potentially excellent captain. He has not met those expectations yet.

Not that he has been a failure, for dissections of his leadership reveal strong positives. He has worn troubled times as captain and yet his batting has stayed mostly firm (56.61 as Test captain, 57.46 career; 45.12 as one-day captain, 40.11 career).

He has earned a Test series win in West Indies, managed a Test win in South Africa, showed he has his own mind in using five bowlers and opening with Karik, and fought mightily for Sehwag.

But Dravid also knows captains, like athletes, are only as good as their last games, and a failing World Cup, the final two unappetising Test performances in South Africa, and the slow leak of spirit from the team, all left an unappealing taste.

No doubt this team is not high on discipline and short on consistency, and some might argue
