

# Police hunt for Subhan, other Pabna Jamaat leaders

## All their institutions under watch



Most of the institutions controlled by Jamaat-e-Islami in Pabna are under watch after Wednesday's recovery of 160 relief CI sheets from Al-Amana Hospital owned by front ranking Jamaat leader Moulana Abdus Subhan, a former lawmaker from Pabna-5 constituency.

After the recovery drive, police raided the house of Subhan and some other Jamaat leaders in Pabna to nab them but all went into hiding, police sources said yesterday.

There are a number of educational institutions, NGOs and social organisations in Pabna set up and controlled by Jamaat. These include Darul Aman Trust, Muslim Aid—an NGO, Imam Gazzali Scool and College, Islamia College. More government relief materials might be recovered from the Jamaat-run institutions, sources said.

"Our intelligence branch is watching Jamaat-run establishments after Wednesday's recovery of CI sheets. Muslim Aid, Pabna Darul Aman Trust and Imam Gazzali Institution have been mentioned specially on the watch list",

Officer-in-Charge of Pabna Sadar police station Iqbal Shafi told this correspondent.

Police seized 160 CI sheets from Al-Amana Hospital, an establishment of Jamaat controlled Al-Amana Foundation at Pathertala in Pabna town, owned by Moulana Abdus Subhan.

It followed filing of a case against Abdus Subhan, chairman of Al-Amnana Foundation; its vice-president Alhaj Abul Kashem, secretary Moslam Uddin and director of Al-Amana Hospital Nurul

Islam for alleged misappropriation of government relief materials.

Sub-Inspector of Pabna Sadar police station Md. Kamruzzaman filed the case Thursday afternoon. Of the accused, police could arrest only arrested Nurul Islam. He is now in jail after being produced before court. Rest of the accused including Maulana Sobhan are being hunted down, police sources said.

"Pabna police raided residences of Moulana Subhan and the other accused several times but they are absconding", OC Iqbal Shafi said.

Police have submitted application to court to transfer the case to Anti-corruption Commission (ACC).

"We have submitted application to Pabna Cognizance Court-1 to transfer the case to Anti-corruption Commission. We talked to the Assistant Director of Pabna Anti Corruption Commission office," the OC said.

The alleged misappropriation of government CI sheets by Jamaat men has become a talk of the town.

"They (Jamaat men) claimed themselves to be clean. Corruption by them is now coming out. These should be probed and persons

responsible punished," said advocate Shamsul Haque Tuku , secretary of Pabna district Awami League while talking to this correspondent yesterday.

Pabna BNP secretary Habibur Rahman Tota said, "Though Jamaat was a component of 4-Party alliance, we will not own their (Jamaat) misdeeds. We also want probe into the misappropriation of government CI sheets".

Al-Amana Foundation has refuted the allegation of misappropriation of government relief CI sheets. These were sanctioned under legal procedure, said a press release issued by Tariqul Islam on behalf of the Foundation.

"We got sanction of 20 bundles of CI sheets on April 8 last year, made by former lawmaker Moulana Abdus Subhan.

The CI sheets had been sanctioned for Al-Amana Foundation. We applied to Pabna Sadar Upazilla Nirbahi Officer on June 2 this year for permission to use the CI sheets, the press release said.

# Tuition, other fees higher in Barisal public schools

## TIB survey reveals

Students of public schools pay more than those of private schools as annual fees and other dues.

They also have to give special amounts to teachers for selection for junior scholarship examination while female students pay for getting sub-scholarship (upobritti).

These were revealed during investigation in Barisal by the Conscious Citizens' Committee (CCC) of Transparency International, Bangladesh (TIB).

The findings were presented by CCC member advocate Manabendra Batabayal at a press conference here yesterday.

The organisers said although district and divisional officials of the administration, education board and education directorate and leaders of teachers organisations were invited but none attend the program, the organisers said.

Barisal CCC members Nurjahan Begum, Mujiaba Mahub Morshed, Mahfuz-UI-Alam and TIB Programme Officer Khairul Bari explained the findings at the press conference.

The TIB survey covered students and secondary schools in 198 mahallas in 30 wards of Barisal city and 90 wards and 137 villages in 10 unions in 307.59 square kilometer area of Barisal Sadar upazila.

A total of 382 households in the city and 181 in 30 villages were interviewed.

Among the surveyed students, 58 per cent were female and 42 per cent male. Of them 14 per cent study in public and 86 per cent in private schools.

They acknowledged that National Flag is not hoisted and National Anthem is not sung regularly in their schools.

The survey revealed that at secondary level, each student of class six to ten at public schools have to pay on an average Tk 1116 a year under different heads while students in private schools pay Tk 1087.

Students of public schools pay Tk 362 a year as 'regular monthly fees', which is Tk 208 more than government approved monthly fees.

In private schools, students pay Tk 590 a year as regular monthly fees' which is also much more than the approved amount.

Eighty-two of the students and guardians alleged to the survey team that they have to pay 'special amounts' to teachers, especially to class teachers for selection for junior scholarship examination and getting sub-scholarship (upobritti), preserved for female students.

Some Secondary School Certificate (SSC) examinees alleged that they were forced to attend coaching classes run by school teachers and to pay Tk 661 per head as coaching fees and Tk 218 as practical examination fees on an average.

Fifty per cent guardians alleged they have to pay donation for admission of their wards to school.

Fifty-one per cent of the students surveyed alleged that teachers often disclose school examination questions in the name of suggestions.

# Frame water policy to avoid eco-disaster

## Speakers tell Kushtia dialogue

Speakers at a dialogue in Kushtia yesterday emphasised framing a national water policy and a water management plan covering all aspects including irrigation, fisheries, environment and ecology.

Too much dependence on underground water for irrigation, particularly in northern district, may cause an ecological disaster if precautionary steps are not taken right now.

They regretted that in 35 years, a policy could not be formulated to check intrusion of salinity in southern region, which is badly affecting agriculture in the area.

The dialogue on Integrated Water Resources Management (IWRM) in Southwestern Region (SW region) and Protection of Padma-Gorai River was organised jointly by Bangladesh Water Partnership (BWP) and Folklore Research Institute in cooperation with the Global Water Partnership in Sweden.

It was chaired by Water Development Board (WDB) engineer Glaus Uddin Ahmed.

Former vice-chancellor of Dhaka University Prof Dr. Maniruzzaman Mia attended the discussion as chief guest.

Water resources expert Dr. Ainun Nishat; Prof Dr. Shomser Ali, VC of Southeast University; Prof Foyaz Mohammad and Kushtia Islamic University vice-chancellor Serajul Haque attended the dialogue as special guests.

Discussants included former Law Faculty Dean Prof Dr. Abdul

Karim Khan of Islamic University, Dr. Sahidur Rahman of Rajshahi University and Nazibul Haque of Islamic University.

Government officials, civil society members, NGO representatives, local body leaders and media men attended the dialogue.

Dr. Ainun Nishat presented the keynote paper.

Prof Nasim Banu and Dr. Rabeya Begum of Islamic University moderated the dialogue.

The speakers said flow of Padma has decreased alarmingly due to withdrawal of water at Farakka point in India, leading to drying up of at least 15 tributaries including Gorai.

The Gorai is the most important tributary of the Ganges and serves the need of people of entire southwestern region of Bangladesh.

More than 30 million people and 27 rivers in the region depend on the flow of Gorai. At least 27 rivers are drying up as the Gorai is being silted but no government took any effective step to dredge it, they said.

On the other hand, use of underground water for irrigation has increased in the region due to decrease in flow of surface water, which is damaging soil structure and posing a threat to ecology.

This situation will be disastrous if not checked right now, they said.

They suggested construction of Ganges Barrage immediately and creating awareness on various water-related issues.
