

## Lobi's wife arrested

Babar's case transferred to sessions court

The arms case against detained former state minister for home Lutfuzzaman Babar was arrested yesterday to the Dhaka Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court for trial.

Khushnud Asgar, wife of detained former BNP lawmaker Ali Asgar Lobi, was arrested yesterday from a city hospital in connection with a graft case while a DCC ward commissioner Chowdhury Alam was placed on a two-day remand in an extortion case.

After scrutinising the case documents, Metropolitan Magistrate Shamsul Alam passed the transfer order of Babar's case filed in connection with possessing illegal firearms and ammunition.

## Advisory body for more urea price hike

### Approves forming North-West Power Co

Terming the industry ministry's proposed price hike of urea as insufficient, the advisory committee on economic affairs yesterday sent back the proposal to the ministry for revision.

In another decision the same meeting approved in principle formation of North-West Power Generation Company Ltd.

The advisory committee advised the industry ministry to revise its proposed hike in the price of urea in line with the real market scenario and to submit it again to the advisory committee by July 15.

The proposal of the ministry sought to raise the price of urea by 51 percent per ton in a bid to minimise the loss of government run fertilizer factories.

Meeting sources said the advisory committee predicts that the proposed price hike might help only to recover the loss already incurred but will not ensure profit.

According to the projections of the government, the six government run fertilizer factories might lose Tk 350 crore in the current fiscal.

If the government adopts the proposed price of urea, the predicted loss of the factories will be minimised, but if the government

increases the prices of power and gas in the near future, the fertilizer factories might slide back into the realm of loss again, the committee observed.

The committee thinks that fixing the price time and again is not viable rather it should be fixed for a long period of time.

Following the logic, the committee suggested fixing the price of urea for a long period after examining the production costs and capacities of all factories.

The current price of a ton of urea at the factory end is Tk 4,800, which

## Two SUVs of Bashundhara Group seized

The Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) seized two SUVs (sport utility vehicles) from Bashundhara City in the capital on Monday night.

Both owned by Bashundhara Group, one was sold illegally by former state minister for power Maj Gen (retd) Anwarul Kabir Talukder while the other was imported through under-invoicing.

Following up a tip-off, a team of Rab-2 raided the car park of the shopping mall at Panthapath at around 10:30pm and seized a Hummer H3 3500cc and a Lexus LX 470.

## ADB okays \$465m power sector grant

The Asian Development Bank (ADB) yesterday approved \$465 million loans for further development of Bangladesh's power sector.

The power sector programme has two financing components, programme loans and project loans, says an ADB press release. This programme is in line with ADB's country and strategy programmes for Bangladesh.

Of the \$465 million, project loans comprise \$400 million, programme loans \$60 million and the rest special loans.

The project loans with a 25-year term including a five-year grace period will be sourced from ADB's ordinary capital resources, while the \$5 million loan from its special funds resources will have a 32-year term including an eight-year grace

period. The \$400 million project loans will be used for expanding clean fuel generation capacity, enhancing transmission network reliability and efficiency and improving the quality of supply in the capital Dhaka and its surrounding areas, which make up the majority of the country's power demand.

The \$5 million loan is meant for capacity development of the power sector to improve utility performance and promote sustainable operations.

"The project loan is expected to reduce system losses and improve quality of supply, leading to more efficient use of energy and making more power available to support sustained economic growth, while offsetting growth in greenhouse gas emissions," Pil-Bae Song, head

## Abducted Danida staff yet to be rescued

The two kidnapped Danida (Danish International Development Agency) staff could not be rescued as of yesterday evening, 24 hours into their abduction.

Project Officer Mohammad Suman Sharif and his driver Abu Hanif were kidnapped on Monday afternoon from Kyaburi Para, a village of indigenous people under Thanchi upazila, some 100 kilometers from the district town.

The joint forces have been conducting combing operations in search of them, Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) sources said.

Locals said that 10 to 12 masked gunmen in black, picked up the two Danida staff at about 4:00 pm and took them to some unknown place in the deep forest. The criminals could be rebels from Myanmar, they added.

## Israel to set free 250 Palestinian prisoners

Israel's prime minister promised Monday to free 250 Palestinian prisoners and promised to improve life in the West Bank in an attempt to boost Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas after Hamas' takeover in Gaza.

Prime Minister Ehud Olmert made the pledges at a summit in this Egyptian Red Sea resort with Abbas and the leaders of Egypt and Jordan.

The Arab leaders hope the high-profile gathering can lead to a resumption of the long-blocked peace process, rally Palestinian support behind Abbas and isolate Hamas after the Islamic militant group's stunning and bloody victory in Gaza.

## Blair lauds reforms in Bangladesh

British Prime Minister Tony Blair has praised Bangladesh's efforts in socioeconomic reforms and pledged his government's continued support to these measures.

"I recognise and congratulate Bangladesh's efforts in social and economic reforms. The UK government continues to support these efforts," said Blair in a letter to Chief Adviser Fakhrudin Ahmed.

The letter dated June 25 was in response to Fakhrudin's May 22 letter to him highlighting trade issues faced by the Least Developed Countries (LDCs) like Bangladesh in the context of the Doha negotiations of the World Trade Organisation (WTO).

Blair has also referred to a recently pledged support of his

## Patients suffer as Birdem doctors continue strike

The strike by the doctors on contract at Birdem hospital continued for the second consecutive day yesterday leaving around 500 indoor patients almost uncared and unattended.

A special team of the striking doctors however provided emergency services to the patients. Only six to seven patients received the service till afternoon, said an on-duty doctor adding usually 50 to 60 patients took the service.

Some 168 Bangladeshi children have been brought back to the country from the UAE recently by the government, Unicef and Bangladesh National Woman Lawyers Association (BNWLA).

officers and consultants enforced the strike on Monday demanding regularisation of their service following issuance of a letter that said jobs of the doctors recruited on contract basis would not be renewed further.

In a meeting with the Board of Management at around 11:00am the striking doctors demanded regularisation of their jobs as they said they are currently feeling insecure.

A task force team conducted the raid at Abdus Sattar's house at Malotinagar in Bogra town at around 8:00am with the assistance from Bogra police and seized a few documents.

They also raided Sattar's village home at Aliarhat under Shibganj upazila in Bogra at noon.

Sources said the task force started investigation about the corruption allegations against Firoz, his wife and his brother Ashik Mahmud, who have already left the country.

Firoz was an influential figure in Hawa Bhaban, used to be dubbed as the alternative power centre of the immediate past government. A number of corruption allegations were brought against him.


